SIGNED INTO LAW IN THE LATE 1700S, THE CONSTITUTION AND THE BILL OF RIGHTS PROTECTED THE RIGHTS OF CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES.

But this did not include the rights of everyone who lived in the United States. Women, Indigenous people, and Black people were not seen as citizens, so they were not protected by these laws.

Many people worked hard to pass additional laws that improved life in the U.S. for everyone. These important changes were driven by social movements where people advocated for equal rights and fairness.
