The Honorable Kimberly A. Reed has held senior leadership roles at the intersection of global trade, finance, food and agriculture, and U.S. economic policy. She served as the first woman Chairman of the Board of Directors, President, and CEO of the Export-Import Bank of the United States (EXIM)—the nation’s official export credit agency, with \$135 billion in financing authority to help the world buy American—from 2019 to 2021, after being confirmed by the U.S. Senate with overwhelming bipartisan support.

During her EXIM tenure, Ms. Reed led efforts to reopen the independent federal agency after four years of near-closure and secured the longest-ever congressional reauthorization. With respect to national and economic security, she launched the “Program on China and Transformational Exports” and helped advance Abraham Accords priorities around the world. She was presented with the U.S. Department of Defense’s highest civilian award for her efforts.

Ms. Reed currently serves on the boards of Takeda Pharmaceutical Company (TSE: 4502/NYSE: TAK), Hannon Armstrong Sustainable Infrastructure Capital (NYSE: HASI), Momentus (NASDAQ: MNTS), and the American Swiss Foundation. Additionally, she is a Distinguished Fellow at the Atlantic Council Freedom and Prosperity Center and the Council on Competitiveness.

Earlier in her career, Ms. Reed was President of the International Food Information Council Foundation, where she worked with multinational food, agriculture, and nutrition companies and public health officials and represented the organization before the United Nations, World Health Organization, and American Medical Association. She previously served as Senior Advisor to U.S. Treasury Secretaries Henry Paulson and John Snow; CEO of the Community Development Financial Institutions Fund; and counsel to three committees of the U.S. Congress, where she conducted oversight and investigations.

Recognized as one of the “100 Women Leaders in STEM” and Washingtonian’s “Most Powerful Women in Washington,” Ms. Reed is a life member of the Council on Foreign Relations. She holds a J.D. from West Virginia University College of Law and both a B.S. in Biology and a B.A. in Government from West Virginia Wesleyan College.
