65 years ago, Sue Ryder and Leonard Cheshire had a mission that was all-encompassing—to relieve suffering. From 1959 when Raphael started in tents to house the leprosy cured, now in 2024, while we continue to care for the handful who still live here, our focus is on disability and health.







Raphael celebrated its 65th Founders' Day with events spread over three days, culminating in the

traditional cultural programme. We were delighted that our overseas friends made the journey to spend the three days with us. The events over three days included a breakfast made by the students of the vocational training

centre, a community lunch with all the staff, a 4 .5-hour drive (one-way!) to visit one of Raphael's outreach centres, and culminated in the traditional cultural programme on the evening of 5th April. The students played to a packed house of almost 900 people, sharing Raphael's journey through the years and remembering the stalwarts who have contributed to Raphael's journey.

To quote many-time volunteer Johanne Sunnex 'Today Raphael stands as a testimony to the visionary goal of the founders, Sue Ryder and Leonard Cheshire. It is a sprawling complex that cares for over two hundred adults and children in residence......To be at Raphael is to share in the fullest sense in the lives of the individuals living there....'



On 3rd July this year Sue Ryder would have turned 100. At Founders' Day this year, Raphael put up an exhibition to showcase her relentless and untiring efforts.

Born in 1924 to a wealthy family in Yorkshire, Lady Sue Ryder was a humanitarian who was inspired to work for people by the work of her mother, her experiences on the frontline in Nazi-occupied Europe and her faith.

When war broke out, she left Benenden School in Kent and volunteered to serve in the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry (the FANYS). She was only 16, but managed to keep that inconvenient fact from the authorities. Within a few years she was recruited to the Polish section of the highly secret Special **Operations Executive.**





What she witnessed from that time to the end of the war, especially the selfless, cheerful courage of young men and women embarking on the most hazardous operations, left her not only with a passionate, enduring love of the Polish people, but also with a determination to relieve the suffering of a devastated continent.

From 1945 onwards, Sue Ryder devoted herself to the service of individuals from the camps, prisons and hospitals where Displaced Persons were held in Europe. She was their one true friend. Thousands of uprooted men, women and children were given a new start in life by her efforts.

Raphael was the first Ryder – Cheshire project, of Lay Sue Ryder and Leonard Cheshire. They got married in Bombay, India in 1959 in a small and unfussy ceremony and project Raphael was their wedding gift to each other. They emphasised that they saw their marriage as a deepening of their joint commitment to their work and of extending it.
