SRHR is central to gender equality and key in poverty reduction

- Approximately 218 million women of reproductive age in low- and middle-income countries have an unmet need for modern contraception
- 5,500 young women aged 15 to 24 years become infected with HIV every week; in 'sub-Saharan Africa', adolescent girls account for five in six new infections
- 49% of pregnancies in low- and middle-income countries (111 million annually) are unintended resulting in:
 - > 30 million unplanned births
 - > 69 million abortions, of which 35 million are unsafe
 - > 12 million miscarriages




The Donor Tracker uses OECD data to track donors' development funding

• We analyzed donors' funding to sector code 130: 'Population Policies/Programmes & Reproductive Health', broken down into:

- 13020: 'Reproductive health care': reproductive health, prenatal and postnatal care including delivery, prevention and treatment of infertility, prevention, and management of consequences of abortion, and safe motherhood activities
- **13030: 'Family planning':** counseling, information, education and communication activities, delivery of contraceptives, and capacity building and training, abortion services
- 13040: 'STD control including HIV/AIDS': all activities related to STDs and HIV/AIDS control such as testing, prevention, treatment, care information, education, and communication




After a peak in 2017, ODA to SRHR appears to have declined to US\$7.9 billion in 2019



- After two years of decreases, total ODA to SRHR in 2019 was US\$7.9 billion
- Bilateral ODA from donor countries accounted for 79% of total SRHR funding between 2009 and 2019
- Reduction in funding is primarily attributable apparent decline in US spending, particularly in STD control
- However, US funding to SRHR has not fallen as sharply as 2019 OECD data appears to show




The US, UK, and Netherlands are the largest donor countries to SRHR; the Netherlands most strongly prioritizes SRHR in its health ODA



- The US, UK, and Netherlands allocated largest funding levels to SRHR in 2019
- The Netherlands, US, and Denmark gave SRHR highest priority within total health ODA
- DAC donors spent average of 23% total health ODA on SRHR



In the last ten years, almost three quarters of SRHR ODA went to STD control, including HIV/AIDS



- Total ODA for STD control in 2019 was US\$5.0 billion; 63% of total SRHR funding
 - <u>Top donors</u>: US, UK, Germany
- Total ODA for reproductive health in 2019 was US\$1.7 billion; 21% of total SRHR funding
 - o <u>Top donors</u>: US, UK, Netherlands
- Total ODA for family planning in 2019 was US\$930 million; 12% of total SRHR funding
 - <u>Top donors</u>: US, UK, Canada

- Current reports present 2019 funding data, the most recent year available




HIV Funding from Donor Governments, 2002-2019






Donor Governments as a Share of Funding for HIV, 2019







HIV Funding from Donor Governments, Other than the U.S., 2010-2019






Snapshot of U.S. Bilateral Funding for HIV, 2005-2019




Family Planning Funding from Donor Governments, 2012-2019






Donor Governments as a Share of Funding for Family Planning, 2019





Trends in Donor Government Funding for Family Planning, 2012-2019






Snapshot of U.S. Bilateral Funding for Family Planning, 2012-2019






NOTE: KFF analysis of data from the U.S. Office of Management and Budget, Agency Congressional Budget Justifications, Congressional Appropriations Bills, and U.S. Foreign Assistance Dashboard (www.foreignassistance.gov). Based on current U.S. dollars in millions. In FY19, a comparable figure for funding disbursed was not available due to adjustments made in USAID's accounting system. Instead, the FY19 total is based on Congressionally appropriated amounts, which include US\$575.0 million in funding for family planning as well as US\$17.5 million transferred to family planning from the Congressional appropriation to UNFPA. It is important to note that U.S. appropriations for a given year may be disbursed over a multi-year period. Appropriations have remained relatively flat for several years while disbursements have fluctuated largely due to the timing of payments.







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
