### Plain Language Emergency Codes to be Implemented May 1st

Code Green...Code Silver...Code Black...Code White...For many years, hospitals, including CGH, have used color-coded terms to announce emergencies within the hospital. The use of color codes was intended to convey essential information quickly with minimal misunderstanding to staff, while preventing stress and panic among patients and visitors to the hospital. Unfortunately, studies have shown that the risks of using color codes now outweigh the benefits.



#### Currently, there are no regulatory standards for these

codes, so many hospitals make up their own. They can be confusing and unclear, not only to employees, but also to patients and visitors during emergency situations. In addition, some members of our staff, including medical students, interns, locum tenens physicians, and traveling physicians, work at other hospitals that have their own codes that may vary greatly from hospital to hospital, leading to more confusion.

"Hospitals across the country have received feedback from their patients stating that color codes increase their stress level," said Shirley Wolford, CGH Emergency Management Director. "Patients and visitors want to be informed and have asked hospitals for transparency, especially during crisis situations."

Therefore, in another step to improve and provide a safer workplace environment for our employees and higher quality care for our patients and visitors, CGH Medical Center is beginning the process of transitioning from the use of code words to announce an emergency to the use of plain language.

"Plain language is communication your audience can understand the first time they see or hear it," said Wolford. "People know what actions are required based on the information they receive." For example, codes will now begin with the Type of Alert (Facility, Medical, Security or Weather), followed by a Description of the Alert (fire, person with a weapon, tornado warning), followed by the Location of the Alert (ED Waiting Room, Medical Floor, Main Clinic – OB), followed by Instructions on what to do (if not determined by policy, such as seek safe shelter immediately, stay away from windows and take cover immediately). The only codes that will remain, but in the new format, are Code Blue, Stroke Alert, Trauma Alert, Code White, Code STEMI, Code PALS, Code Red, and Rider 26.

"In the past, if there was a person with a gun in the building, visitors would not know what a 'Code Silver' means, and there would be the possibility of them going to the area where the perpetrator is located," concluded Wolford. "The use of plain language will lessen confusion and may give innocent people an opportunity to get to a safer location."

"Nationally, the Joint Commission has recommended the standardization of emergency codes," said Dr. Paul Steinke, CGH President and CEO. "It is important that we all become familiar with the format of the new codes. I appreciate your help and support through this transition."

### Regional Patient Surge/ Evacuation Exercise

Be prepared! CGH will be participating in a regional patient surge/evacuation exercise in conjunction with IDPH. This exercise will take place the week of April 15 and will simulate two hospitals (CGH and OSF St. Anthony – Rockford) evacuating their patients to other facilities in the region.



"This exercise will be a simulation of moving patients, but please remember - NO patients will actually be moved," said Shirley Wolford, CGH Emergency Management Director. The key points of this exercise include:

- All departments with patients (both inpatient and outpatient) will send their patient lists and acuity levels to the Hospital Command Center (HCC).
- The HCC will have a team which will find locations for these patients in other hospitals or Long-Term Care (LTC) facilities.
- Methods of transport will be found to simulate transporting these patients to other facilities.

"This will be an excellent opportunity for CGH to review certain aspects of its evacuation plan and build on what we learn for future events."

Please note: This exercise will NOT include the CGH Main Clinic or outlying clinics.
