Lyndsey Weber, a registered nurse in the CGH Ambulatory Surgery Department, was recently recognized in front of her friends, family and co-workers, as a recipient of the prestigious DAISY Award for extraordinary nurses. An international program, the award is presented to nurses around the world who go above and beyond for their patients and demonstrate extraordinary compassionate care.

"Lyndsey was very calming to me as I prepared for surgery," said the patient's nomination for Weber. During the preparation, Lyndsey assisted with finding a proper vein for an IV while the

patient's husband looked over her shoulder. "She interacted so nicely with him, telling him about the instrument. She was very professional throughout our experience, and her discharge instructions were thorough."

The patient concluded, "Being an RN, and especially one that has trained CNAs, I was most impressed with Lyndsey's personable skills as well as her work ethic and professionalism."

The DAISY Award - an acronym for "Diseases Attacking the Immune System" - was established by the DAISY Foundation in California in memory of J. Patrick Barnes, who died at age 33 of an autoimmune disease. During his hospitalization, they deeply appreciated the care and compassion shown to Patrick and his entire family. When he died, they felt compelled to say "thank you" to nurses in a very public way. The DAISY Award continues to recognize and celebrate the outstanding professionalism and compassion that nurses bring to patients and their families every day.

Do You Know Your New Plain Language Alert Codes?

In another step to improve and provide a safer workplace environment for our employees, and higher quality care for our patients and visitors, CGH Medical Center will begin using Plain Language Alert Codes on May 1. Plain language is communication that everyone can understand the first time they hear it, and the use of these codes will simplify emergency response from physicians and staff who may work in multiple hospitals.

As you can see on the Plain Language Emergency Codes handout included with this Communique, all codes will now begin with an alert – either a Facility Alert, Medical Alert, Security Alert, or Weather Alert. The alert notice will then be followed by a description of the alert, the location of the alert, and brief instructions on what to do (if not already determined by policy). For example: "Security Alert + person with a weapon + location + Seek safe shelter immediately."

Please note that the following eight code names have not changed, but will be announced in the new format:

- Code Blue will now be Medical Alert + Code Blue +
- Stroke Alert will now be Medical Alert + Stroke Alert +
- Trauma Alert will now be Medical Alert + Trauma Alert + **ETA** (estimated time of arrival, if indicated)
- Code White will now be Medical Alert + Code White + location
- STEMI Alert will now be Medical Alert + STEMI Alert + location
- PALS Alert will now be Medical Alert + Code PALS + location
- Code Red will now be Facility Alert + Code Red + location
- Rider 26 will now be Facility Alert + Rider 26


Also remember that the steps to activate an emergency code have NOT changed. If in the hospital or Main Clinic, call 5511 to reach the Switchboard to implement the code alert, or if in the off-site clinics/buildings, call 911.

Surge/Evacuation Exercise



On April 17, CGH and its community partners participated in a patient surge/evacuation exercise. This was an exercise coordinated through IDPH and the Northwest Illinois Preparedness and Response Coalition (NIPARC) which is Illinois Region 1.

The goal of the exercise was for the (simulated) evacuation of 20% of the Coalition's bed capacity within 90 minutes. CGH and OSF Saint Anthony in Rockford were the two facilities who simulated evacuation; the remaining regional facilities received the simulated patients.

The areas emphasized in this exercise were: 1.) Patient tracking and finding a transfer destination for all patients who were not able to be discharged, and 2.) Finding transportation from area ambulances and other transport means to get the patients to their new destination. CGH simulated the discharge of 105 patients and transfer of 27 patients.

This was an excellent test of our evacuation processes and will enable CGH to further develop our evacuation
