#### CGH Medical Center Unveils New Behavioral Health Unit



Sauk Valley Area Chamber of Commerce members, community leaders and CGH staff joined Kristie Geil, Vice President and Chief Nursing Officer; Dr. Paul Steinke, President and CEO; and Lorri Mostad, Behavioral Health Nurse Practitioner in the ceremonial ribbon cutting for the Behavioral Health Unit.

CGH unveiled the new Behavioral Health Unit via a private partnership open house on Friday, March 19, and an employee open house and a chamber and board ribbon cutting on Wednesday, March 24. A total of approximately 200 attendees were able to socially distance and meet the staff and tour the new 10-bed unit, which is set to open for patients in April.

"It doesn't matter how many times a patient with mental illness comes into the Emergency Department ... they can't get better with that care alone," said Sarah Alvarez-Brown, CGH Emergency Department Director. "To have this unit here at CGH — and to be able to establish that continuity of care without sending the patient out of the area — will be a huge asset to our community and to our patients."

Sometimes called a psychiatric unit, a behavioral health unit (BHU) is an area of the hospital designed specifically for providing care for reasons related to mental health. These issues can include minor episodes of stress, anxiety and depression, along with alcohol dependence or drug use. This also includes more serious conditions such as major depression, panic attacks, bipolar disorder, obsessive compulsive disorder (OCD), post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and even more severe issues such as suicidal or homicidal thoughts. People typically need care in a BHU because their symptoms are serious and unstable, or they are at risk for harming themselves or others. The main goal of the unit is to provide a safe, secure setting where adults can receive treatment and move beyond the immediate crisis.

"The Whiteside County Community Health Plan indicated that mental health admissions were the most needed service that CGH was currently unable to provide," said Kristie Geil, Vice President and Chief Nursing Officer. "The goal of the new unit is to help care for patients closer to home and closer to family that can help be involved in the patient's care."

The unit will consist of 10 beds (four semi-private rooms and two private), along with inpatient therapy groups run by all levels of professionals. Anupama Upadhyay, MD, and Lorri Mostad, RN, MS, APN, PMHNP-BC, will be available seven days a week to provide psychiatric diagnostic and prescribing services to adult inpatients.

"We are delighted at the goodwill shown by the folks at Candlelight as well as the amazing support from their customers," said Joan Hermes, Executive Director of the Foundation. "This year especially we have funded numerous COVID-19 related projects that were not in our budget, so this gift makes a huge difference in our ability to make life easier for kids and adults in the Sauk Valley."

Hermes said pulse oximeters have been purchased to give to COVID-19 patients who are discharged from the hospital. "This handy tool tracks their oxygen levels and pulse rates when they go home. Many times, individuals don't realize how close to crisis they might be with reduced lung capacity from the virus."

Owner Matt Prescott said, "We were happy to work with CGH Health Foundation on this project, involving our customers and benefiting our community."

The Foundation also sponsors rides to get patients to and from hospital and clinic appointments, as well as transportation to out-of-town specialists; a B-CALM help phone line for youth and families suffering from the pandemic; pediatric mental health services in area schools; medication assistance; and comfort bags and meals during treatment for chemotherapy patients, to name just a few projects.
