Did you know?

- Dementia is NOT a normal part of aging
- Every 65 seconds someone is dianosed with dementia
- 5.8 million Americans live with dementia
 - By 2050 there will be 14 million
- 80% of the care is provided by family & friends
- 2/3 of cases are women
- After age 65 risk doubles every 5 years
- Exercise, diet, levels of cognitive activity, & social engagement all affect risk

5.8 million people are living with dementia and by 2050 this number is expected to rise to nearly 14 million.

There are 3 Stages:

- Early/Mild
- Middle/Moderate
- Late/Severe

"Alzheimer's disease runs rampant in my family, with my mom, my aunts and uncles, and now my brother and me, living with it. It was frightening to learn of my diagnosis in 2016 and without my husband, Mark, I could not have thrived as well as I have.

I'm one of the lucky ones – I've been in a drug trial and the progress of my symptoms has certainly been slowed. We decided from the start that we needed to adapt to the new normal and do whatever we could to live as best we could.

We've done everything as a team, from advocating with legislators for research funds to assisting with support groups to partnering with medical students who want to learn more about the disease. Yes, it's difficult at times, but we are determined to enjoy every day and take the future as it comes."

"They say dementia can be a long goodbye. I can personally attest to that, having lived this journey with my mom, Betty Miller. I first noticed signs of the disease in 2011. Others started to notice when she lost her signature "sparkle in her eye". We slowly watched her slip away from us until she passed in 2020.

To a degree, Mom knew she was losing parts of her memory. That was really difficult to observe, but strangely inspiring as well, because she had a very special way of directing the conversation so others did not realize she was suffering with dementia. To the end, she always had a sense of comfort and compassion about her when interacting with others. We were lucky that the dementia did not change her personality. She remained the same patient, loving, smiling, beautiful mom we all knew, just with a few less memories.

As her advocate and caregiver throughout her journey, it was frustrating to see such huge gaps in support right here in our own community. My dad, Hugh, decided just prior to his death last year that he and Mom would help jumpstart improvements in dementia care in the Sauk Valley area." Dementia Project Outreach Planned

- Organize caregiver support groups in area towns with simultanous activity sessions for loved ones
- Host community forum to gather suggestions on program resource development
- Provide education for professional staff, caregivers and the public
- Promote community awareness of the disease
- Create assistance fund for individuals/families in providing resources for care
- Support area agencies in their dementia activities
- Present workshops on legal and financial planning
- Provide music therapy instruments for memory care facilities

Here's what your gift can do for an area child or adult:

"My mom, Beate, was always a model of health and strength, but Alzheimer's disease crept in and changed many things. It's a cruel thing, dementia, one I can only maybe understand as Purgatory on Earth.

Mom remained incredibly strong and fit when her mind failed her, and was quite a handful. We would often joke that she would win the Alzheimer's Olympics, hands down. "Escaping" and running miles, scaling fences, whatever it took, Mom was always on the move. She had the same energy and intensity as before, only maddeningly without purpose, and so hard to keep safe.

She is finally at peace now, and while we will miss her each day, her legacy of searching for the best in each situation endures. Both in my practice and in behalf of the CGH Health Foundation, I carry her example with me in hopes of helping others on their dementia journey."



Clubs Division Chair Bob Sondgeroth, retired Regional Superintendent of Schools for Whiteside, Lee and Ogle counties, was very involved in his dad's care before he passed in 2009.

"One of the most difficult aspects of my dad's dementia journey was that instead of him taking care of our family, we were taking care of him – it was a role reversal. In 2005, we started noticing that my father, Donald, was getting forgetful. Just minor things at first, but then he was forgetting to eat. It was the day that he could not remember how to put gas in his Jeep that was the turning point. He gave me his keys and decided to stop driving.

I wish our family would have had the support of others that could have told us what to expect and what signs to look for. The word dementia was not something people would talk about, there was a stigma. Our family had to figure out many things on our own. We can all help smooth the dementia journey for others by learning more about this disease and supporting the Foundation project."

"The hardest part was watching him decline, being there 24/7 and watching my life partner slowly leave. I relied on God, my family and church to get through it, but it would have been great to talk to someone about how to handle some of the difficult situations we encountered."

"Finding a safe and affordable facility is definitely a hard part of dealing with this diagnosis. It is difficult to talk to your loved one when you know they do not have any idea who you are and they do not look at you like they used to. You have no idea what all is involved before you reach that moment – it was a learning by doing experience.
