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
Roxane is the epitome of an employee who exceeds all CGH Standards of Behavior. She goes above and beyond to ensure patients are receiving the best quality care and service.

Reminder: CGH Employee Mandatory Education for FY 2021-2022 completion is required by April 30.









"Memories Matter," Campaign Has a Personal Connection

The "Memories Matter." CGH Health Foundation Annual Appeal campaign is very personal for CGH Employee Division Co-Chairs Mimi Hicks, Daycare Director, and Sandy Williams, CGH retiree.

well as the past 35 years of Foundation successes as Your Partner in Good Health. Proceeds from the April 29 to May 3 virtual Silent Auction will go toward the dementia initiative.

Both Mimi and Sandy have been involved for years with Foundation employee activities, but this year is very special to them. Sandy lost her husband, Eldon, in January 2020 because of dementia. "The hardest part was watching him decline, being there 24/7 and watching my life partner slowly leave," said Sandy. "I relied on God, my family and church to get through it, but it would have been great to talk to someone about how to handle some of the difficult situations we encountered."

Already, three new support groups are in the works in Sterling, Polo and Prophetstown, with more planned so that caregivers don't have to travel far to meet. Accommodations are being made for the loved one to take part in activities while the support group is going on. In addition, educational programs are being planned throughout the service area with the help of the Alzheimer's Association staff from Rockford.

"Along with raising funds, we want to know what else the Foundation can do to help those going through this difficult journey," said Mimi. "Our goal is to make it easier to find information, to add or expand resources and services in the area and to raise awareness about dementia and how it changes lives so dramatically."

Mimi's mom, Isabel, is in the late stage of dementia and is living in a memory care facility. Her family of eleven siblings took turns staying overnight with her for two years and then arranged for 24-hour care for their mom. But last June they made the painful decision to seek nursing home care.

"Finding a safe and affordable facility is definitely a hard part of dealing with this diagnosis. It is difficult to talk to your loved one when you know they do not have any idea who you are and they do not look at you like they used to," said Mimi. "You have no idea what all is involved before you reach that moment – it was a learning by doing experience. There were so many things we had to get, such as a shower chair, no slip rugs, lift chair, gait belts, bed alarm, baby monitor, easier to get on/off clothing, not to mention puzzles, games, and laminated pictures of all the family members."
