Cook Healthplex expansion and the Physicians Office Building expansion.

Sadly, Sue passed away earlier this year. Her husband Donald and her family, knowing how important being a Partner was to her, has decided to continue her commitment. Effective immediately, a bonus scholarship in the amount of \$1,000 will be added to the Partners Scholarship, in memory of Sue Alberti.
