Virtual MedQuest


Future Health Professionals of Oregon

Virtual Health Speaker Series

Another successful collaboration with EOU, this program is focused on the pre-professions health club at the University. NEOAHEC gives the undergraduate students access to health care providers, current resources, and "a day in the life" presentations from local health care providers.

Campus for Rural Health

Health professions students began clinical rotations throughout the region during summer term and in fall term. Using the delivery method piloted by the Northeast, students from all 3 campuses (Northeast, South Coast, and Klamath Falls) engaged in an Interprofessional Education course discussing topics like living and working in a rural area, access to care, and coordination of care with local health care providers.

Distance Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner Program

In 2019, NEOAHEC received \$1 million grant from the Healthy Oregon Workforce Training (HOWTO) grant sponsored by the Oregon Health Authority to expand the Oregon Health and Sciences University (OHSU) 3-year Doctor of Nursing Practice PMHNP program to distance delivery serving Eastern Oregon.

Success will be achieved through this grant project by identifying qualified students rooted in the region, educating them in place, and retaining them as licensed PMHNPs in Eastern Oregon. In 2020 the first cohort of 3 students from Eastern Oregon matriculated into the OHSU School of Nursing PMHNP Program. The next cohort of students will be determined in the spring, and begin the program in the Fall of 2021.
