


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
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MESSAGE TO THE COMMUNITY


OUR MEMBERS

Member profile

Narendra Pathak, SCFHP DualConnect & Consumer Advisory Board member

SCFHP member Narendra Pathak is no stranger to a discussion. His wife joked that “once the faucet is on, it doesn’t go off.”

In 2019, however, the faucet nearly stopped. Pathak suffered a stroke which limited his mobility. Soon after, the trained lawyer and economist lost mobility in his right side, requiring the use of a walker.

Still, that didn’t stop Pathak from his involvement in the community.

In addition to his involvement with the SCFHP DualConnect Consumer Advisory Board (CAB) – where he personally boasts a perfect attendance record – Pathak is also a four-term appointee of the Santa Clara County Human Rights Commission and a member of the state’s In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) Public Authority Advisory Committee since 2021. He previously served as a commissioner on Sunnyvale’s library and human rights commissions.

“Members should have a voice, and with CAB, our voice makes a big difference for SCFHP,” Pathak said. “That is one of the most important and valuable things.”

It was his involvement with the IHSS Advisory Committee that led him to SCFHP. At an event where both IHSS and SCFHP were present, Pathak learned about SCFHP’s benefits to help people with disabilities, like himself.

Since joining SCFHP, Pathak has received assistance with setting up transportation and appointments. He’s given rave reviews about SCFHP’s overall service and, in particular, the accessibility he now has to his healthcare team.

Pathak has used SCFHP to help him access services such as: occupational therapy, physical therapy, and speech therapy. He’s also popped into the SCFHP Blanca Alvarado Community Resource Center’s yoga class, diabetes class, and high blood pressure class on occasion.

“I needed some kind of medical intervention to improve my life,” Pathak said. “When my doctor referred me to physical, occupational, and speech therapy, I went through Valley Medical and received excellent service. SCFHP has been there to provide services like that for me. I’m not 100% recovered from my stroke, but I’m very satisfied with my service through SCFHP.”

What is CAB?

The SCFHP DualConnect Consumer Advisory Board (CAB, pronounced “cab”) engages members and caregivers to provide input and feedback to SCFHP to improve services and to support SCFHP in achieving its mission. CAB’s responsibilities include:

- Providing feedback on services, benefits, providers, issues, and ways to improve program management
- Providing feedback on events, activities, communication, and member materials
- Participating in quality management programs
- Helping SCFHP find gaps in the health care of members

CAB members include SCFHP DualConnect members, family members, and caregivers, and consumer advocates. The CAB membership and representation reflect the diversity of the dual eligible population.

Q&A with Yesenia Ochoa, Member and Family Engagement Group member

Yesenia Ochoa, a Gilroy resident and SCFHP Medi-Cal member, has taken charge of her health by joining one of our committees. Ochoa is currently a member of the South County Member and Family Engagement Group (MFEG). So far, Ochoa says she's learning about new things SCFHP provides each time she goes to a meeting.

“I hope I can apply all my knowledge about my health and develop a trusting relationship with SCFHP and break any barriers that might be in place,” Ochoa said in Spanish through an interpreter. “I really enjoy attending the meetings and like to listen to other's feedback and points of view. **”**

What made you want to join a committee?

My family's health is my main interest, and I wanted to learn more about it through this committee.

Learning different subjects in these meetings helps me understand my benefits and allows me to share my knowledge with family and friends so they can get good care, too.

How do you think SCFHP has listened to your needs since you've joined MFEG?

I feel that our facilitators really take the time to listen to each one of us individually, and they make us feel welcomed with our kids, and provide us with food while we're in session.

What kind of input do you provide in the committee meetings?

I'm free to give any input I want and I enjoy that. For example, I can give suggestions on how we as members can understand flyers or better use the tools SCFHP provides us.

Can you sum up your experience on MFEG so far?

It's been interesting! I really enjoy the new things the health plan provides and learning about them.

About Member and Family Engagement Groups

SCFHP hosts five **Member and Family Engagement Groups (MFEG)** throughout Santa Clara County (North County, East County, South County, West County, and Downtown San Jose) to receive ongoing feedback about the plan's operations and services.

- All groups are open to SCFHP Medi-Cal members, family members, and/or caregivers of our Medi-Cal members.
- MFEG members serve a one-year term, with the option to be reappointed by the MFEG Selection Committee.
- Monthly meetings are held at different locations across Santa Clara County.



Empowering the next generation of healthcare leaders: The Health Career Connection internship program

In order to make meaningful change in addressing health disparities and improving community well-being, having diversity and representation in our healthcare leaders is crucial. The Health Career Connection (HCC) intern program allows many future health care workers the opportunity to learn about and address those disparities and equip them for the future.

SCFHP is proud to have hosted HCC intern Sameya Afzali in our Marketing & Communications Department in summer 2024. Afzali brought her fresh perspective and public health expertise to SCFHP over a 10-week program focused on the world of managed care.

“It has been exciting to apply my public health skills and knowledge to the real world so that I, too, can positively impact the health of SCFHP members,” Afzali said. **”**

Afzali’s internship involved conducting market research on emerging marketing communications trends; working on social media projects to enhance member experience; gaining insights into various career roles within managed care organizations; and applying her public health skills to real-world scenarios. She researched SCFHP’s social media statistics and gave recommendations on how to better reach our members through media.

A spring 2024 graduate of San José State University with a degree in public health, Sameya plans to work in public health, with an emphasis on low-income and minority populations, and eventually get her master’s degree in public health or health care administration.

“I learned so much about public health in Santa Clara County, which allowed me to understand the diverse needs of the county and its members,” Afzali said. “It was an insightful and rewarding experience. My internship here has further fueled my motivation and passion to work in the field of public health and help priority populations achieve their optimal health and wellness. I’m eager and excited to utilize the skills I’ve learned for my next role.”

Through experiences like Afzali’s, SCFHP is nurturing the next generation of health leaders, one intern at a time, leading the way for change in healthcare and public health sectors across the county.

Her hard work during her internship has not gone unnoticed: SCFHP is thrilled to share that Afzali was hired full time in the Community Based Programs Department in November as a Health Navigator.

HCC is a national non-profit that inspires and empowers undergraduate students, recent graduates, and HCC alumni, particularly those from under-represented or disadvantaged backgrounds, to choose and successfully pursue authentic healthcare and public health careers. It has given more than 5,000 students the opportunity to become leaders in medicine, public health, health management, mental health, and business. According to its numbers:

- **98%** of HCC interns come from communities of color
- **62%** are first-generation college students
- **80%** have experienced economic hardship
- **More than 60%** are bilingual

Provider Profile: Nayyara Dawood M.D., pediatrician, a child's best friend

For children, just walking into a doctor's office can be a lot to process. It's why Dr. Dawood practices a unique approach: treating children like friends.

"When you explain health care, quite often we find ourselves telling everything to the parent and not really explaining it appropriately to the child," Dawood said. "I try to include the child in my conversation. I tell them if there's going to be pain, and that we are going to do our very best to make sure that we make it easy on them. I think these small gestures make a big difference. I'm hoping all pediatricians feel the same as me, because that's why we became pediatricians."

Her down-to-earth approach has kept her in the practice of pediatrics for more than 24 years. Dawood has children of her own and says she uses the advantage of this experience in her career. Dawood said working with children has always been the best part of the gig.

"The benefits of being a pediatrician and working with children easily outweigh the monetary benefits," she added.

The other friend she's proud to have kept for years is SCFHP. Dawood is appreciative of SCFHP's help getting her patients the care they need.

“ The care for a patient is a triangle: the patient, the provider, and the insurance," Dawood said. "I can't take complete care of a patient myself, which is why I appreciate the network of support from SCFHP. **”**



Partner spotlight: Enhanced Care Management and Community Supports help our members

Partnerships are vital to services we provide at SCFHP. They have helped us lead the way in innovative care, including care outside the doctor's office. With one of our trusted partners, Gardner Health Services, we're able to provide mental health care and housing support – two elements critically linked to good health.

"Gardner Health Services has been involved in Enhanced Care Management (ECM) since 2022 and Community Supports since last year," Rafael Cardoza, the director of Gardner's ECM program, said. "We provide a comprehensive assessment so we can capture the whole picture of what our patient's needs are and then come up with a care plan to address all those needs and assign a lead care manager. Over time, we see so much gratefulness from the patients that we serve. It's been very rewarding and a lot of hard work."

One such patient is Josefa Chavez, an SCFHP Medi-Cal member, who has been receiving services from Gardner since 2022. Since Chavez's 2013 stroke, she has had mobility problems, and she and her son have bounced around different housing situations. The problems, she said, were mounting until Gardner stepped in with their care team, with Jovani Quinones as one of her care managers.

"The experience here is great," Chavez said. "Before Gardner, I got medical help, but I didn't get the other help I needed. We were homeless for a long time until

Through Gardner, she has been able to get services to help with mental health, housing, and dental and vision care, receiving glasses and dentures.

"I got the greatest people here," she said. "I've been waiting for someone to help me. And they came. Thank God I found them."

Quarterly Partner Convenings: playing a vital role in health care collaboration

In the rapidly changing realm of health care, effective collaboration and communication among stakeholders are essential.

SCFHP has recognized this necessity and implemented Quarterly Partner Convenings as a foundation of its strategy to improve community health outcomes. Our first convening, which was held in January 2024, welcomed more than 40 community leaders and agencies to learn about our organization, different ways to partner with each other, and information about our board funds.

At the heart of these meetings lies SCFHP's commitment to being a local leader in improving the health of diverse communities. By bringing together system partners on a regular basis, SCFHP creates an environment where collaboration can thrive. This approach not only enhances the organization's visibility but also allows for a more comprehensive and coordinated effort in addressing complex health challenges.

"As we reflect on our mission to improve the well-being of our members, we recognize our unique role in the Santa Clara County safety net system and in the lives of our more than 294,000 members," said Christine M. Tomcala. "That is why we are opening our doors to partners each quarter at our

facilities – to witness leadership, collaboration, and improvement in the health of our community. We hope this meeting is a welcoming space where we can invite partners into our mission, cultivate relationships, and open possibilities that advance our shared work."

A focus of these quarterly meetings is informing partners about SCFHP initiatives related to health equity and social determinants of health. By sharing updates on managed care, Medi-Cal, CalAIM and more, SCFHP ensures that stakeholders are aligned and working towards common goals. This knowledge-sharing aspect is crucial in a field where policies and best practices are constantly evolving.

SCFHP actively encourages dialogue and seeks input from partners on strategies to improve the health and well-being of its members and the broader community. This collaborative approach to problem-solving leads to more innovative and effective solutions, as it draws upon the diverse expertise and perspectives of all its participants.

As health care continues to face complex challenges, SCFHP is leading the way in collaborative efforts to create sustainable and effective health systems.





PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Our staff and partners helped our members achieve better health outcomes through our many programs. This section highlights select program achievements from fiscal year 2023-2024.



PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY UNWINDING

Ensuring continuous coverage for our community

During the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency (PHE), beneficiaries enrolled in Medi-Cal were able to maintain their coverage regardless of any changes in their circumstances. When the PHE ended in March 2023, states across the country were required to resume eligibility renewals, leaving many SCFHP members wondering if they would keep their health coverage.

To ensure members were supported throughout the unwinding period, SCFHP joined forces with a broad range of community-based organizations led by Working Partnerships USA. By implementing a comprehensive outreach campaign, SCFHP and our partners mobilized a robust network of resources to ensure that members received timely, actionable guidance to help them maintain their essential health coverage. The campaign utilized health and resource fairs, press conferences, media outreach, flyers, social media, text messages, a dedicated webpage, newsletters, bus ads, and billboards and more to reach Medi-Cal beneficiaries.

A key component of SCFHP's strategy was our text messaging program, which sends timely reminders to members via their cell phone 30 days before their Medi-Cal renewal date. These text messages prompt members to update their contact information and return their renewal packets to the County Social Services Agency, helping prevent any loss of coverage by keeping them informed and engaged.

The combined outreach efforts resulted in an overall 80% approval rate for Medi-Cal renewals, which aligns closely with pre-pandemic levels. The County Social Services Agency also reports a significant increase in the timely renewal packet return rate, signaling more awareness and understanding of the importance of completing the paperwork.

NCQA HEALTH EQUITY ACCREDITATION

A Milestone for SCFHP

Tomcala. “In a community as diverse as Santa Clara County, recognizing that everyone has different cultural, racial, gender identity, and language needs is an important aspect of delivering quality health care. This accreditation was truly a team effort, and an excellent example of how the dedication and collaboration of our staff and partners can make a difference to our members.”

The Health Equity Accreditation program emphasizes three pivotal areas: promoting health equity, enhancing cultural competency, and ensuring continuous improvement. Achieving this Accreditation builds trust among members, partners,



and stakeholders. This recognition also opens doors to new partnerships and participation in value-based care programs, positioning SCFHP as a leader in equitable healthcare delivery.

“The prevalence of racial and ethnic disparities has been a barrier to improving the quality of health care of many Americans for too long,” said NCQA President Margaret E. O’Kane. “Organizations achieving Health Equity Accreditation are leaders in closing this gap, and NCQA commends them for their dedication.”

The NCQA Health Equity Accreditation program marks a significant advancement in the fight for health equity. SCFHP’s success underscores its dedication to health equity while providing a framework for continuous improvement and community engagement. As health care evolves, accredited organizations like SCFHP are poised to lead the way in reducing disparities and enhancing health outcomes for all community members.

INTRODUCING THE SOUTH COUNTY COMMUNITY RESOURCE CENTER

Exciting new development to foster hope, unity, and well-being

Reaching members where they live, work, pray, and play is key to overcoming longstanding systemic barriers that disproportionately impact communities of color. Since opening the Blanca Alvarado Community Resource Center (CRC) in East San José in 2020, we've welcomed more than 20,000 visitors annually through our doors for health and wellness classes and programs, application assistance, and resource navigation.

"Our current community resource center has become a pillar of support in addressing health disparities in East San José," said Christine M. Tomcala. "So when our members in South Santa Clara County asked for a Community Resource Center, we listened. Our new center in Gilroy will enable us to reach many more of our members in South County to connect them to the resources and services they need."

Demographic data shows that more than 20,000 members, making up 18% of residents in Gilroy, Morgan Hill, and San Martin, call the South County home.

Based on the success of our Blanca Alvarado CRC, we made sure we listened to our community first to inform our approach and develop trust. In 2023, SCFHP surveyed hundreds of residents in South County for their thoughts about their health and social needs. We found that many residents believed there is a lack of resources in the area.

In response, our staff, Governing Board, Resident Advisory Group, and system partners worked together to plan for a new resource center in Gilroy to respond to the community's needs.

"I am very excited for the future opening of the SCFHP Community Resource Center in Gilroy," said



Lucy Navarro, a member of the SCFHP South County Resident Advisory Group, which was formed for residents to provide input on the upcoming center. "Finally, our families will have a place where they will be heard, to be taken care of, and to have a person follow up on their individual cases. I also feel very happy that we, as SCFHP Resident Committee Members, have the opportunity to participate in defining the Center's focus areas."



SCFHP receives state and federal funding for its Medi-Cal and Medicare programs. In fiscal year 2023-2024, SCFHP invested over \$2B of that funding into the local economy. 96 cents of every dollar paid for benefits and services for our members, and 4 cents of every dollar funded administration. From our reserves, SCFHP financially supports dozens of community organizations and public agencies each year that help bring equitable health care to our members.

Martha's Kitchen touts itself as a "little soup kitchen" in Willow Glen. Soon, though, it won't be so little anymore.

That's because Martha's Kitchen will be using \$1 million in SCFHP Board-Designated Funds toward both the purchase and renovation of its new permanent location.

"This amazing donation will help us triple the capacity of our programs, allowing us to provide even more meals to those in need, expand our food rescue initiatives, and strengthen our partnerships with the 65 community partners we support monthly. Today, between its hot meal and grocery programs, Martha's Kitchen provides 230,000 meals and rescues approximately 60,000 pounds of food monthly. OUR BOARD-DESIGNATED SPECIAL PROJECT FUND

Through our Board-Designated Special Project Fund for Community-Based Organizations (CBOs), SCFHP has supported the following projects in fiscal year 2023-2024



Funding will provide one year of support to SCCC's Gilroy Safe Parking Pilot Program to give unhoused residents a safe place to sleep in their vehicles. SCCC's program will return at least 10 unhoused clients to stable housing within the year and provide skills required to retain housing without the need for future assistance. Additionally, SCCC will work to identify and remove barriers to continue progress toward a better life; including benefit access, transportation, parenting classes, childcare, and mental health treatments



Funding will provide one year of Cancer CAREpoint's Client CARE Coordinator Service. The service conducts one-on-one intake interviews with cancer patients to assess their non-medical needs and makes referrals to both internal and external services. Internal services include individual and group counseling, financial assistance, wellness classes, wigs, and comfort and support kits. Client CARE Coordinators also connect patients to community partners to help address food insecurity, financial assistance, and other safety-net services

MEET TWO STUDENTS AWARDED THE SCFHP 25TH ANNIVERSARY HEALTH CAREER SCHOLARSHIP

When we announced our 25th Anniversary Health Career Scholarship in 2022, we hoped it would provide opportunities for Medi-Cal members to advance in careers that would benefit the health of our community. Little did we know how inspirational our recipients' stories would be, once we learned about the personal experiences and hardships that have driven them to pursue health care careers. Here are two of those stories.

Katrina Green

Katrina Green is a 21-year-old student from San José. She is currently studying Medical Assisting and Health Science at both San José City College and Evergreen Valley College. She eventually aspires to become a nurse, and plans to start an externship in 2025.

Her worldview expanded to health care at an early age, after seeing her mother endure prolonged sickness.



“My mom has been sick a lot, and I grew up wanting to care for her,” Katrina said. “When I was little, I didn’t know what first responders were. But I realize now that I wanted to be my mom’s own first responder, and that inspired me to get into health care.”

If all goes well, Katrina will finish in fall 2025 with her associate’s degree in Health Science and Medical Assisting. After that, it’s off to a licensed vocational nurse program. Katrina will be the first in her family to graduate from college and enter the medical profession.

“The scholarship means a lot, not just for me but for my family,” Katrina said. “They’re really appreciative I’ve gotten this award. I’m really grateful I got it.”

Marissa Mendoza

Marissa Mendoza, a student at Gavilan College in Gilroy, also has faced hardship in getting to this stage in her life. Marissa is a nursing major who hopes to become a registered nurse and eventually a nurse practitioner. Marissa plans to use the scholarship money to help apply for nursing programs and help with everyday expenses.

According to Marissa, the money is a welcome respite from stacking bills and living expenses: due to clinicals and in-person courses, it’s nearly impossible to keep a full-time job, be in the classroom, and work clinicals at a local hospital.

“It’s tough, it’s hard, it’s long hours,” Marissa said. “But it’s really rewarding.”

Marissa’s father was diagnosed with cancer, and her son suffers an autoimmune disease. She said both incidents “lit a fire” within her to pursue nursing.

“That kind of really pushed me harder,” Marissa said.



“I was using what I learned in school to help care for my dad, and I was connecting with patients at school at the same time. It helped me have more empathy for patients.”
