We at St. Claire Regional are committed to maximizing the roles PAs play on our healthcare teams, because we know we are stronger when we all work together—and the result is world-class care for our patients.



St. Claire Regional recognizes Emergency Nurses Week Oct. 9-15 and Emergency Nurses Day[®] on Wednesday, Oct. 12. Emergency nurses are recognized for compassionately connecting with and caring for their community of patients and coworkers during a year when the Zika virus, opioid and heroin and the mental health crisis made national headlines.

Since 1989, the Emergency Nurses Association (ENA) has recognized the second Wednesday in October as Emergency Nurses Day, a day honoring emergency nurses for their commitment to patient care. In 2001, ENA expanded the celebration to devote an entire week to honoring emergency nurses, because one day is simply not enough to recognize all contributions made by emergency nurses.

Here at SCR, we currently employ 35 emergency nurses. On average, our emergency nurses see 90 patients a day, treating minor injuries (breaks and sprains) to life-threatening problems.




Hospice volunteer program hosts food drive

Each new school year brings in a fresh class of medical students, and this year was no different. Ten University of Kentucky Rural Physician Leadership Program (UK RPLP) students began their third year of medical school at St. Claire Regional (SCR) on July 1. UK and SCR have been educational partners for over 50 years. The UK RPLP program is the most recent endeavor in this relationship, which began in 2010.

These students were more interested in an alternative mode of training than a traditional medical training program. Traditional medical training is performed at tertiary care centers and emphasizes treatment of critically ill patients with advanced diseases. The UK RPLP mode of medical training emphasizes commonly seen diseases, outpatient and continuity care, rural and community health issues, and cooperative arrangements with other hospitals.

Who are we?

The UK RPLP program is an educational program designed to identify and train physicians who desire to serve as clinicians and leaders in rural settings. The UK RPLP is unique to UK and is designed to train physicians in all specialties who can provide healthcare leadership. The program provides an excellent preparation for surgery, medical specialties, psychiatry, family medicine or any other specialty of medicine practiced in a rural area.

What makes us different than regular UK medical students?

In this four-year medical school program, UK RPLP students complete their first two years of medical training in Lexington, following the same curriculum required for all UK medical students. During the third and fourth years of medical school, UK RPLP students complete the majority of their clinical training at SCR and other healthcare providers in Northeastern Kentucky. Community physicians hold academic appointments at the UK College of Medicine and serve as teachers, preceptors and mentors.

UK RPLP students also have the opportunity to complete a Certificate in Health Systems Leadership at Morehead State University. This program focuses on health systems, business practices and health policy.



UK RPLP's mission is to increase the number of physicians who are trained to provide high quality healthcare and leadership, who are knowledgeable about community health, and who have an interest in practicing in rural areas of the Commonwealth or beyond.

Are there scholarships or loans specific to the UK RPLP?

Students in the UK RPLP qualify for various scholarships offered by UK College of Medicine. Student service staff in Lexington and Morehead assist students in exploring their financing options. While there are scholarships and loan repayment programs available for students who practice in medically underserved areas, there are no specific scholarship funds available for UK RPLP students.

Students enrolled in the UK RPLP pay the same tuition and fees as students enrolled in the regular MD program in Lexington.

Are UK RPLP students required to stay in Morehead after Medical School?

No. Many rural medical school training programs require students to return to complete an obligatory amount of time for being trained locally. The UK RPLP does not require students to return or stay in Morehead after completing their training. We always hope that each will want to come back, but there are no requirements.

How does someone apply to UK RPLP?

If you know of someone interested in medical school and enjoy rural areas and one-on-one education, we hope they consider the UK RPLP. If interested, applicants will apply to the UK College of Medicine through the AMCAS (medical school application program) and select "Other Special Programs." Preference is given to in-state rural applicants, but anyone with a rural health interest is welcome to apply. The UK RPLP is currently taking up to 10 students each year with hopes of expanding that number over the next few years.

People to People – Building bridges for improved healthcare

Enawgaw Mehari, MD, and his organization People to People recently hosted the 8th Global Ethiopian Diaspora Conference on Health Care and Medical Education. In addition to his two most recent awards, Mehari previously received the Patient Advocate of the Year award from the American Academy of Neurology Foundation in 2010, and was recognized for his efforts in fighting HIV/AIDS in 2008 from the Society of Ethiopians Established in Diaspora.

Education Sept. 17. Mehari, a native of Ethiopia, was recognized for his leadership in founding People to People (P2P), a non-profit organization that works to improve healthcare and reduce the spread of diseases in Ethiopia and around the world. He was also recognized Oct. 1 at the 3rd Annual African

vested interest in preventing the spread of HIV/AIDS in Africa. Due to the combined effects of poverty and the AIDS virus, more than 5 million children have been orphaned, leaving many to fend for themselves in what are often called "child-headed households." In 2004, P2P opened the Amanuel

Boarding Care Center, a boarding school in Amanuel, Ethiopia, for orphaned girls who have lost their parents to HIV/AIDS. Mehari says programs like these give children who were born into unfortunate situations individual paths to success, which in turn

and other professionals. With the help of several United States universities, Mehari, P2P president, founded the organization in Kentucky in 1999 to foster what he calls a triangular partnership, with a focus on giving back to the country he grew up in. He says P2P's mission is to improve the health, education and success of the world's citizens, with a primary focus in Ethiopia, a country that has been ranked the second poorest in the world. After years of public service, the organization has grown to be so successful that it has been granted a special consultative status with the United Nations, and now has chapters in the United States, Ethiopia, Canada, Sweden, Finland Germany and Switzerland.

Since its humble beginnings, P2P has worked diligently to build health and community-based programs that improve the lives of Ethiopians. Whether it be through formal training or simply making information more widely available, Mehari says education is a major key to success. P2P has run the gamut when it comes to fostering education in Ethiopia, from creating a youth center with a research library and internet access, to establishing its own neurology degree program. Thanks to P2P and its partner, Mayo Clinic, Ethiopia is now home to 27 of its own neurologists — 20 of which graduated from the program.

Mehari says that a person's potential is often greater than the opportunities life affords them. "It's important that we build a bridge, and reach out to give these people the same opportunities many of us have been given," he says. "In a world that is constantly transforming before our eyes, it is imperative that we do not allow others to get left behind."

While it doesn't limit itself to one particular cause, P2P has a

benefits Ethiopia as a whole. Currently, four girls who attended the boarding school are in medical school and another seven are in college for engineering. "For me, that's the highlight; it makes it all worth it." Mehari says. "Because if it wasn't for that school, these girls would be homeless or maybe even worse. But look at them now."

While many of the projects P2P is involved with largely focus on improving life in Ethiopia, that's not always the case. For a little over a decade, a local extension of their efforts known as People's Clinic of Morehead has touched the lives of thousands of people right here in Northeastern Kentucky. The People's Clinic, operated by local physicians, nurses, medical technicians and other community volunteers, provides free healthcare to individuals and families who could otherwise not afford it. "Being involved with an organization like this, you become the voice of the poor," Mehari says. "You become an advocate, and that is what warms my heart. I don't need or want any money, personally. The greatest payment comes from helping others."

While he may have been born in Ethiopia, since moving to Morehead to practice medicine more than 15 years ago, Mehari says he realizes he's now at home. "I love it here," he says. "The community has embraced me and People to People. That's why our headquarters is right here in Morehead. Morehead is like my town, you know?"

Mehari says his St. Claire Regional family has been instrumental to the success of both P2P and himself. In addition to serving as a training location for Ethiopian physicians, SCR has also sponsored a variety of P2P's efforts. "Everyone here has been outstanding in supporting my initiatives," he says. "A special thanks to Mark J. Neff and Greg Bausch for all they have done, and to the medical community at large."

And while P2P may not be a faith-based organization, the core of its mission remains close to the philosophy of Dr. Claire Louise Caudill when she founded St. Claire Regional more than 50 years ago. "I believe medicine should not be commercialized, but compassionate," Mehari says. "We are one world, one people."
