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St. Claire Regional and Morehead State University Sponsor SOAR's Health Impact Series Event

St. Claire Regional and Morehead State University sponsored SOAR's Health Impact Series event at the Morehead Conference Center on Wednesday, August 6. The event directed at finding solutions to healthcare concerns in Appalachia, was the conclusion of a three-day series that featured speakers, Thomas Frieden, MD, MPH, Director, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and U.S. Representative Hal Rogers, 5th District of Kentucky.

"Our people have long suffered from high rates of cancer, diabetes, heart disease, obesity and other health disparities, so Dr. Frieden decided to make a house call to eastern Kentucky," said Congressman Rogers. "This is a rare chance to bring a world-renown leader in health care to our doorstep. We will look to Dr. Frieden for help in diagnosing our high risks, as well as his prescription for how we can improve healthy living and mortality rates."

“SOAR is about improving health and quality of life in our community. We have a lot of good ideas on how to achieve that but we just need to think of them. That is the title of today’s program,” said Congressman Rogers. “We’re here to come up with ideas.”

Mark J. Neff, SCR President/CEO, welcomed everyone to the event and introduced the first round of speakers. Neff said, “It is important that we have events like this where healthcare leaders can combine ideas and come up with creative solutions to positively change the health of rural Kentucky.”

Dr. Anthony Weaver, Assistant Dean of Morehead’s Regional Site, moderated the morning panel of speakers comprised of Raynor Mullins, DMD, College of Dentistry, UK; Boyd Buser, DO, Dean, University of Pikeville, Kentucky College of Osteopathic Medicine; Dr. Ron Waldrige, KY One and the Kentucky Academy of Family Physicians and Dr. Kevin Pearce, UK Associate Dean for Rural and Community Health. Each panel member spoke about the successful new programs, along with the problems they faced at their institutions. They also spoke about the various efforts to address shortages of healthcare professionals in eastern Kentucky.

William Melahn, MD, SCR VP, Medical Affairs, moderated the afternoon panel of healthcare experts on state and national healthcare issues. The panel included Dr. Judith Monroe, CDC Deputy Director; Dr. Frieden; Dr. Stephanie Mayfield Gibson, Commissioner, KY Cabinet for Public Health and Dr. Michael Karpf, EVP for Health Affairs, UK. The panel answered a variety of questions that arose from the audience and made one thing very clear; the state and the CDC were here to help change the health of Kentucky.

During the event, Congressman Rogers presented Health Impact Awards to recognize local individuals and groups that have demonstrated “great work” with health awareness and prevention efforts.

One of these awards went to the Rural Physician Leadership Program (RPLP), which was developed jointly with the University of Kentucky College of Medicine, St. Claire Regional Medical Center and Morehead State University. Medical school students in the RPLP take the first two years of basic science education at the University of Kentucky’s main campus and then receive the majority of their third and fourth year clinical experiences at St. Claire Regional and other sites in rural northeastern Kentucky.

Another Health Impact Award was presented to the Gateway Wellness Coalition (GWC) - a collaboration of St. Claire Regional, Morehead State University and Gateway District Health Department. The GWC identifies community health needs and implements strategies to address pressing health issues in Bath, Menifee, Morgan and Rowan counties. They have launched programs such as “Walking 4 Wellness,” supporting improvements in the local farmers market and area walking trails.

According to the Kentucky Department for Public Health, the prevalence of heart disease is 84 percent higher, diabetes is 47 percent higher and obesity is 26 percent higher in Kentucky’s Appalachian region compared to the United States. From 2006-10, the region’s lung cancer mortality rates were also the highest in the nation; 67 percent higher than the national average.

Overflow Crowd Hears Fiscal Woes of Hospitals

July 25, 2014 — State Auditor Adam Edelen came to Morehead Wednesday as part of his effort to check the fiscal health of Kentucky's rural hospitals.

He learned that many are on life support. At least one has expired recently and all of them are in danger of choking to death on silly paperwork and bureaucratic indifference.

It was the fourth of 10 public hearings on the topic and the auditor said it was his largest audience to date as more than 100 persons jammed the CHER building meeting space.

"We're learning more and more at each stop and this was the best yet," Edelen said. "This kind of information is invaluable to our goal of understanding the problem so that we can make sensible recommendations."

The auditor asked for candid comments and that's exactly what he heard as a chorus of public officials, health care professionals and others shared their concerns in plain language.

The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS) drew most of the heat for its seemingly illogical administration of the state's Medicaid program.

One speaker recounted the requirement of a pre-authorization for a family physician to remove excess wax from a child's ear.

Another spoke of the "ridiculous" delay in treating a pregnant woman in obvious distress because her ultra-sound had to be approved in advance.

Yet another said she had been asked why a patient couldn't have received a blood transfusion at home instead of at the hospital.

Two hospital CEOs shared their growing frustration with trying to comply with billing and other requirements of five separate managed care organizations (MCOs) which CHFS hired to run Medicaid.

Mark J. Neff, President and CEO of St. Claire Regional Medical Center (SCR), said hospitals are "at the mercy" of the five MCOs and that Kentucky is in "desperate need" of a standardized set of billing rules which CHFS could impose.

"We were told that this organizational model would

result in managed care but the reality is that it is only managing payments,” Neff said.

He also predicted that every small hospital in the state would go out of business if the federal government stops making DSH (disproportionate share hospital) grants which allow hospitals like St. Claire Regional with a high percentage of Medicaid and Medicare patients to recover some of their unreimbursed expenses.

Neff said SCR is determined to continue serving its 11-county market but fiscal pressures already had forced the elimination of 100 jobs, a budget reduction of \$3 million and a 50 percent reduction in retirement benefits for its more than 1,100 employees.

Steve Gavalchik, CEO of Morgan County ARH at West Liberty, shared similar concerns about the multiple billing systems and the frustration of being told by MCOs that certain costs of running a hospital are not reimbursable.

“We know that a community’s physical health is intertwined with its economic health and that a local hospital is critical to both,” Gavalchik stated. “If we lose these small hospitals, we can forget about any serious economic development in our communities.”

Nicholas County Judge-Executive Mike Pryor said that his community’s hospital went bankrupt in May because it couldn’t afford to hire enough staff to do all of the paperwork required to get paid.

The closing of the 14-bed Nicholas County Hospital put 80 persons out of work.

Pryor said the county’s ambulance service also shut down and had to be taken over by county government.

“We’re trying to find someone to start an urgent care center or some other emergency treatment option so that our sick and injured can be stabilized for transport to a hospital,” the judge-executive added.

Fleming County Judge-Executive Larry Foxworthy said he is concerned about the financial pressures on that county’s hospital which was built five years ago.

State Rep. John W. Stacy, D-West Liberty, thanked Edelen for his efforts to help rural hospitals which are open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to save lives.

“I can’t imagine living in a community that loses its hospital,” he added.

Danny Blevins, director of Rowan County EMS, reported that ambulance service agencies are forced to raise rates on those who can pay because of insufficient payments for other patients.

Tom Lewis, director of the St. Claire Foundation, expressed his concern about talk in Washington of reducing or eliminating the income tax deduction for private gifts to hospital-related foundations.

Edelen promised that the study would be released to the public as soon as it is finished later this year.

Employee S.A.F.E. Program has been Revised

As a reflection of our mission to proclaim God's goodness, St. Claire Regional provides the St. Claire Assistance Fund for Employees known as the SAFE Fund to assist our staff in need of financial assistance for unforeseeable, short-term crisis situations.

SAFE is funded by donations from SCR employees.

Due to the increasing generosity of SCR staff members, SAFE is in a position to revise its policies.

While many of the requirements for eligibility remain the same, the payment limits for eligible staff has been raised. The changes to the SAFE policy are highlighted below.

A staff member at St. Claire Regional is eligible to receive funds from SAFE if the individual meets the following criteria:

- Has been employed by St. Claire Regional for a minimum of 6 months.
- Is full time or part time as defined by SCR Human Resources.
- The applicant/household has not received money from the fund within the past 2 years.
- The applicant/household has not received a total of \$1500 from the fund in the preceding 5 years.
- In general, has not received an active disciplinary action in the past 12 months. Active disciplinary actions include written warnings and suspensions.

The maximum for an individual request is now \$750.00 (up from \$500). A maximum of \$1500.00 (up from \$1000) may be given to an individual/household within any "rolling" five-year period.

SCR staff who had met the lifetime maximum in the past, may now be eligible once again.

The SAFE Fund is a discretionary fund, not a general benefit. Each application will be evaluated on an individual basis and funds may be allocated at the discretion of the SAFE Committee based on short term emergencies or crisis situations. **"Short-term crisis situation"** is defined as an unavoidable or unexpected situation that finds a staff person totally unprepared to maintain or meet the additional financial burden.

Examples of crisis situations include, but are not restricted to the following:

- Loss or catastrophic damage of the home through fire, flood, wind (not covered by insurance)
- Sudden personal illness or illness of spouse or dependent child resulting in financial burden
- Pharmacy bill for one-time or short-term medication (not covered by insurance)
- Death of an immediate family member

In general, a **"short-term crises"** does not include payment of routine, foreseeable expenses, such as consumer credit card payments or the like.

Funding for the continuation of this valuable program is provided by SCR staff and individual donations. We are so grateful for all those who donate to SAFE and have helped make this change in policy possible.
