Val Verde Regional Medical Center – Main Entrance

Front door, not a cave – honest.





Pre-Registration

You can go to VVRMC and pre-register to make it easier when baby is coming. The Registration area is inside the main hospital entrance and to the left. Please bring your insurance card and ID





Where to go when baby is coming

Admitting & Registration

- You have a scheduled induction or other procedure
 - You have a regularly scheduled appointment for services
 - Your doctor has sent you for some reason

Emergency Department

- You are having contractions which are regular and 5 minutes apart (this number changes if you are farther away from the hospital)
- Your water broke you will be asked the color, odor, amount and time
- You are bleeding
- You feel sick, dizzy

Getting to the Women's Center



From Regular Registration From ED Registration

- Turn LEFT when you exit.
 Turn LEFT at the end of the hall. The elevator is to your LEFT.
- When you register in the Emergency
 Department, someone




Push the red button to get inside. This is a secure unit to keep you and baby safe.

You will be asked some questions at the Nurses' Station.






Then, you will be taken to a delivery room.



Pre-labor Questions Answered

And some of our Women's Center staff so you will have familiar faces when you come to deliver your baby.



The Women's Center uses the Cuddles system for security. Your baby will have a band on their lower leg with an alarm. If anyone should attempt to take your baby out of the Women's Center, they will be stopped.

Security Measures



You and your baby will have the same nurse. If baby needs to be taken to the nursery for any reason, your nurse will be with her and your support person can go along.









Is outside food allowed?

YES!!! However, you may not want to eat too much during labor just in case you need anesthetic at a later phase.





What are the COVID-19 restrictions?

Until the COVID-19 pandemic is under control, you will only be able to have your support person with you. No other visitors are allowed for everyone's health and safety.



Average number of births per day?

The VVRMC Women's Center currently averages about 65 births per month.





What is the rate of intervention measures?

Intervention measures such as forceps or vacuum extraction are used only rarely. The goal is for every mom to have a natural birth unless it is not safe to do

SO.





Are all rooms private? YES!!!! And, you will not be subjected to a large number of students, interns, etc. coming in your room.



What is the episiotomy policy?

Episiotomies are only done when absolutely necessary.





What is your average number of unmedicated births?

Each birth is different. We make every effort to comply with the wishes of the mother and her birth plan. The decision is yours.



Your Labor Questions Answered

We want you to be as comfortable as possible.







What equipment for birthing is available?

We do not offer any specialized, nonmedical equipment for delivery. However, you can bring whatever you feel will be helpful for you.





Who do I give my birth plan to?

You will create a birth plan and give a copy to your OBGYN. When you arrive at the Women's Center ready to meet your baby, give a second copy to your nurse.

Your Questions about Delivery Answered

Just remember, every birth is different.







Where do I give birth?

You will give birth in a Labor and Delivery room. It has monitoring equipment and more to assure a good experience for you and your baby. After you recover, you and baby will go to another room to rest up for your journey home together.

It is possible you will be in the same room for your entire stay.

All the rooms have private showers and a place where your support person can sleep.



What are my anesthesia options?

The most common is the epidural. Generally, you can receive an epidural when you reach 4 cm dilation. However, every birth is different. But rest assured, anesthesia is available 24/7.



What if I need a C-section?

If you need a Cesarean Section, a surgeon will be called in. About 24% of births at VVRMC are done by C-section. This is lower than the average rate in Texas which is about 30%.





Do you support VBACs?

VVRMC does not support VBACs. But we do support FUN and Red Nose Day!





Can my partner and I have skinto-skin contact with the baby after birth? Absolutely!

Do you offer delayed cord clamping/cutting?

You bet! We try to accommodate your wishes for your birth experience.





Do you have wireless fetal monitoring?

We have both wireless and non-wireless fetal monitoring.



Can I walk during labor?

You are free to move around, walk or, yes, even dance in the halls of the Women's Center while you are in labor. Whatever feels best for you.



Google "dancing during labor." It's a thing! It's a fun thing!



How often are vaginal exams done during labor?

Vaginal exams are kept to a minimum. They are only done as necessary during labor.





Is photography and filming allowed?

Yes. However, with the COVID-19 pandemic, outside photographers are not permitted – unless they are your support person. You may take photos unless you have to have a C-section.



Will I have an IV or HEP?

Yes. Every mom does just in case it becomes necessary. Our IV/HEP protocol is for your health and safety.







Will my baby stay in the room with me?

Yes! You and baby will have the same nurse. If baby has to go to the nursery for a test or procedure, they will be in the care of the nursery nurse.

Your nurse will also be the person who keeps you informed in case baby has to spend some time in the Special Care nursery.









What tests, vaccine, etc. are performed on my baby?

Baby will receive a Vitamin K injection, erythromycin in their eyes and a Hep B vaccination. They will be checked for bilirubin levels. Most of these procedures are state mandated. If you have concerns, speak with your nurse.



How long do my baby and I have to stay in the Women's Center?

For a vaginal birth, you will stay with baby for 24 hours. If you have a Csection, 48 to 72 hours. However, every birth is different and the stay is flexible depending on the birth situation.








Is a breast pump available if I can't feed my baby?

Yes. Should you need to pump breast milk, a breast pump will be provided. However, there is no lactation consultant. Just a lot of nurses with a wealth of breastfeeding knowledge.





Do you give pacifiers and bottles without parental permission?

No. That is your decision to make.







How do I complete the paperwork for my baby's birth certificate?

Someone from Medical Records will come visit with you while you are in the Women's Center to help you fill out paperwork for your baby's birth certificate.





When will I need a postpartum examination? You will need to schedule an appointment with your doctor for 6 weeks after delivery. Don't forget to schedule your appointment after you deliver! Of course, if you are having any problems, call your healthcare provider.

Why you should see your doctor after delivery:

- 1. They will examine you to make sure your uterus is in good shape after birth.
- 2. You can ask any questions you may have about how your body is feeling as you go back to your pre-pregnancy self.
- 3. You can discuss your mental health to be sure you aren't suffering from post-partum depression or anxiety.
- 4. You can get back on birth control.
- 5. You can discuss any issues you are having with a professional.
- 6. Some insurances, like Medicaid STAR Plan, will actually reward you for returning for your post-partum appointment.
- 7. It is the best thing you can do for both your physical and mental health!









Depression & Anxiety During and After Pregnancy

Depression and anxiety both during pregnancy and after giving birth are very COMMON. With a little help, you can feel better. There is nothing to be ashamed about.

1 in every 7 women will experience this. You are not alone! Help is available.

- To keep your child healthy with immunizations to prevent illness.
- To receive information on your child's health from an educated, qualified source-your pediatrician!

- Regular visits create a strong, trustworthy relationship between pediatrician, parent and child.
