 Renter Protections, Washington State Residential Renters: Landlords cannot charge late fees for late or unpaid rent that was due between March 1, 2020 and December 31, 2021. Landlords cannot evict tenants without a reason. They must have a "good cause" and provide the amount of notice required by law. A landlord cannot start an eviction for unpaid rent without first offering a tenant a reasonable repayment plan and the opportunity to participate in mediation. For the repayment plan to be considered reasonable, a tenant's monthly repayment amount cannot be more than one-third of their monthly rental charges at the time they were unable to pay. If a tenant does not accept the terms of a reasonable repayment plan within 14 days of its offering, their landlord may start legal proceedings in court to evict them. Tenants who earn less than twice the federal poverty level (\$25,760 for one person or \$53,000 for a family of four) can have a lawyer represent them for free if they receive eviction notices.  Eviction Delay, Oregon State Residential Renters: Landlords and courts must delay eviction for nonpayment of rent, late charges, utility or service charges, or any other rental fees for 60 days if tenants provide documentation of application for rental assistance.  Mortgage Pause or Reduction for Single-Family Homeowners: Single-family homeowners insured by the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) who are struggling because of the COVID-19 pandemic can request a 6-month mortgage payment pause (forbearance). Homeowners who are still struggling and already received a mortgage forbearance between July 1, 2021 and September 30, 2021 can request one additional 6-month forbearance. Homeowners with government-backed loans who are struggling may request loan modifications to reduce monthly mortgage payments.  Residential Foreclosure Moratorium, Oregon State: Lenders may not foreclose on homeowners in distress if homeowners notify their lenders that they cannot make payments due to income loss related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Lenders may not charge homeowners who provide notice of economic hardship late fees, penalties, or attorney fees for nonpayment during this time.
