## INTRODUCING COHORT 2 ~ EASTERN OREGON PMHNP

In 2019, NEOAHEC was awarded a Healthy Oregon Workforce Training Opportunity (HOWTO) grant of nearly \$1 million to increase the Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner (PMHNP) workforce in eastern Oregon.

Based in Eastern Oregon, the OHSU PMHNP distance education program gives learners the flexibility to learn from home, and have clinical experiences in their communities. Again this year, significant scholarships will be available for tuition and other expenses.

In the third year of this generous HOWTO grant, NEOAHEC is excited to announce that a second cohort of students has accepted admission into the OHSU PMHNP program. Welcome to the program Chelsea Matthews - La Grande, Oregon, Nikki Billman - Union, Oregon, and Toni Bleick, Irrigon, Oregon.

Our region is vastly underserved (as are most rural areas) when it comes to mental health and I plan on making an impact in this area for those whom are struggling the most.



I chose to enter the PMHNP program first because I have grown up and personally lived with mental illness. Addiction touched my life in the death of my sister due to heroin overdose, and most of my life has been spent around those struggling with addiction. I had familiarity with OHSU as I received my BSN from them, and they had a local rural program.
