
HARRIET TUBMAN AND THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD

Co-commissioned by the Kennedy Center, LIVE WIRE! The Electricity Tour premiered in Washington, DC in September 2014. Doktor Kaboom explores the fundamentals of electrical energy and the history of humanity's adventures into its potential. At the dawn of the 19th century, mankind first harnessed the power of electricity. The world changed and the journey still continues.

Topics covered include: safety, Tesla, Edison, Faraday, lightning bolts, current, voltage, conductive and non-conductive media, electrical arcs, light emission, sparks, resistance, magnetic fields, electric generators, mechanical energy to electrical energy, electromagnetic coils and conductors.

Featuring Rodney Whitaker and the Dr. Phillips Center Jazz Orchestra November 27—December 1, 2017—Walt Disney Theater at Dr. Phillips Center for the Performing Arts

Let Freedom Ring features compositions by Jazz artists who participated in the Civil Rights Movement and shows how their works were tied to specific historic events. By telling the stories behind events such as Brown vs. The Board of Education and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s most famous speech "I Have a Dream," listeners discover how music can be used to send cultural and political messages of both protest and celebration. The concert is presented in memory of Martin Luther King, Jr. and features the music of artists such as Dave Brubeck, Charles Mingus and Duke Ellington.

Let Freedom Ring introduces students to the major events and texts connected with the Civil Rights Movement. Specific lesson plans and assessments are included in a separate document for teachers. This yearly concert will demonstrate how the Civil Rights Movement impacted the world of Jazz.
