Journey to the End of the Earth Summary

"Journey to the End of the Earth" is a prose piece by Tishani Doshi that describes her expedition to Antarctica aboard the Russian research vessel Akademik Shokalskiy. The journey began in Chennai, India, and involved crossing nine time zones, six checkpoints, three oceans, and three ecospheres, taking over 100 hours. Antarctica, the coldest, driest, and windiest continent, was once part of the supercontinent Gondwana about 650 million years ago. Geological shifts caused Gondwana to break apart, isolating Antarctica and making it a unique place for scientific study.

The author reflects on the vastness and isolation of Antarctica, noting its unspoiled environment and simple ecosystem. Despite being unpopulated, Antarctica is affected by human activities such as global warming, which threatens its delicate ecological balance. The ice cores of Antarctica hold carbon records dating back half a million years, providing valuable data about Earth's past climate.

The "Students on Ice" program, led by Canadian Geoff Green, takes high school students to Antarctica to educate them about environmental issues and global warming. These students, as future policymakers, witness firsthand the effects of climate change, such as retreating glaciers and collapsing ice shelves, inspiring them to act responsibly towards the planet.

Answer Key
