Section A

Question 1. Mention any two causes that led to the Civil Disobedience Movement.

[2 Marks]

Answer: Two significant causes that led to the Civil Disobedience Movement were the refusal of the British government to reduce revenue demands during the economic depression and the widespread resentment towards colonial laws, especially the salt laws. The economic hardship faced by peasants made them unable to pay taxes, leading to

increased participation in the movement. Additionally, the desire for greater political rights and respect for Indian autonomy motivated many to join the struggle against British rule.

Question 2. How is the chemical industry in India diversified? Explain.

[2 Marks]

Answer: The chemical industry in India is diversified through the production of both inorganic and organic chemicals. Major inorganic chemicals include sulphuric acid and caustic soda, vital for various industries. The rise of agro-industries enhances agricultural productivity by providing fertilizers and pesticides. Additionally, Indian companies have improved competitiveness by adopting new technologies and collaborating with multinational corporations. The widespread establishment of manufacturing units across the country further supports this diversity.

Question 3. Differentiate between ruling and opposition parties.

[2 Marks]

Answer: Ruling parties are those elected political parties that hold the majority of seats in the legislature, enabling them to form the government and implement policies. In contrast, opposition parties consist of those elected representatives who did not win a majority and play a critical role by questioning the government, criticizing its policies, and presenting alternative views. Opposition parties ensure a balance in governance by voicing diverse opinions and mobilizing public sentiment against the ruling party's decisions.

Question 4. Classify industries on the basis of raw materials.

[2 Marks]

Answer: Industries can be classified based on the raw materials they use into four main categories: agro-based, mineral-based, marine-based, and forest-based. Agro-based industries utilize plant and animal products like cotton, sugar, and dairy. Mineral-based industries use minerals and metals, such as iron and steel. Marine-based industries rely on sea products for goods like fish oil. Lastly, forest-based industries utilize materials from forests, including timber for furniture and paper production.

Question 5.

Read the following source and answer the questions that follow :

A House Loan

Megha has taken a loan of Rs. 5 lakhs from the bank to purchase a house. The annual interest rate on the loan is 12 percent and the loan is to be repaid in 10 years in monthly installments. Megha had to submit to the bank, documents showing her employment records and salary before the bank agreed to give her the loan. The bank retained as collateral the papers of the new house , which will be returned to Megha only when she repays the entire loan with interest.

- From which source of credit Megha has taken loan ?
- Explain the terms of credit given in the source.

Answer: Megha has taken a loan from a formal source of credit, specifically a bank. The terms of credit for this loan include an amount of Rs. 5 lakhs, an interest rate of 12 percent annually, and a repayment period of 10 years through monthly installments. Additionally, Megha was required to submit documents proving her employment and salary, and the bank retained the house papers as collateral, which will be returned only after complete repayment of the loan with interest.

Section B

Question 6. Explain why the banks do not lend credit to certain borrowers.

[3 Marks]

Answer: Banks do not lend credit to certain borrowers primarily due to the lack of collateral and proper documentation. Many potential borrowers, especially from poorer segments, cannot provide the necessary collateral required to secure a loan. The stringent documentation processes further complicate access to credit for these individuals. Additionally, banks often assess the creditworthiness of borrowers based on income stability and repayment history, which many poor borrowers lack. This leads to a reliance on informal sources of credit, resulting in high-interest rates and unfair lending practices. Consequently, banks are hesitant to provide loans, fearing defaults and financial risk.

Question 7.

"The effects of Non-Cooperation Movement on the economic front were more dramatic." Support the statement with examples.

Answer: The Non-Cooperation Movement significantly impacted the Indian economy, primarily by promoting indigenous products and diminishing the influence of British goods. Notably, there were widespread boycotts of foreign cloth, which resulted in the burning of British imports in public bonfires. Additionally, liquor shops faced picketing, demonstrating mass discontent against colonial commodities. The movement also prompted a considerable number of Indians to withdraw their support from British educational institutions and the legal system, as many lawyers, including influential figures such as Motilal Nehru and C.R. Das, ceased their practices. This collective action not only fostered nationalistic sentiments but also encouraged self-reliance, marking a shift towards local alternatives in trade and reinforcing the call for Swaraj.

Question 8. Explain how the rise of political parties is directly linked to the emergence of representative democracies.

Question 10.

Nationalism in India

Modern nationalism in Europe came to be associated with the formation of nation-states. It also meant a change in people's understanding of who they were, and what defined their identity and sense of belonging. New symbols and icons, new songs and ideas forged new links and redefined the boundaries of communities. In most countries, the making of this new national identity was a long process. How did this consciousness emerge in

India? In India and as in many other colonies, the growth of modern nationalism is intimately connected to the anti-colonial movement. People began discovering their unity in the process of their struggle with colonialism. The sense of being oppressed under colonialism provided a shared bond that tied many different groups together. But each class and group felt the effects of colonialism differently, their experiences were varied, and their notions of freedom were not always the same. The Congress under Mahatma Gandhi tried to forge these groups together within one movement. But the unity did not emerge without conflict.

(1) How was the growth of modern nationalism intimately connected to the anti-colonial movement?
