By minimizing restrictions on imports and exports, trade liberalisation promotes competition, increases consumer choice, and can lead to lower prices. However, it can also have adverse effects on developing countries, where local businesses may struggle to compete against cheaper foreign products. Therefore, while trade liberalisation facilitates free trade, it also necessitates careful consideration of its impact on domestic economies.

As a result, local industries may suffer, leading to job losses and economic instability. Furthermore, the advancement of transport and communication technologies enables faster trade, which can paradoxically exacerbate dependency on foreign products, rather than enhancing self-sufficiency. Ultimately, although free trade and globalisation have the potential to foster development, they also risk deepening the economic divide between nations, as the benefits tend to accumulate in the hands of already affluent countries.
