

- A Roadside Stand Summary

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"A Roadside Stand" is a poem that highlights the harsh realities faced by poor, rural people who try to earn a living by selling their goods at a roadside stand. The poem contrasts their difficult lives with the indifferent and insensitive attitude of city dwellers who pass by without stopping or even acknowledging their struggles. The poet expresses deep sympathy for these impoverished people and draws attention to the unequal development between cities and villages, which leads to dissatisfaction and unhappiness among rural inhabitants.

Key Elements

- **Theme:** The poem reflects on the deprivation and neglect faced by rural people and their desire for acceptance and economic support from city dwellers.
- **Message:** It is a plea for compassion and assistance for the helpless individuals who work hard but see no improvement in their lives.
- **Form and Style:** The poem consists of 56 lines divided into 6 stanzas, with a sympathetic tone and an abab rhyme scheme.

showing the indifference of city people. The phrase "greedy good-doers, beneficent beasts of prey" criticizes those who pretend to help but actually exploit the poor.

Solved Example

Question: What is the significance of the phrase "selfish cars" in the poem?

Answer: The phrase "selfish cars" is a transferred epithet that refers to the car owners who stop at the roadside stand not to buy anything but to ask for directions or other favors. It highlights the lack of genuine concern for the roadside sellers and their plight.
