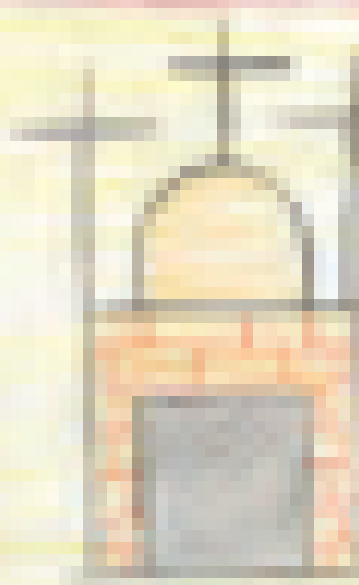

## Secularism and the Indian Constitution

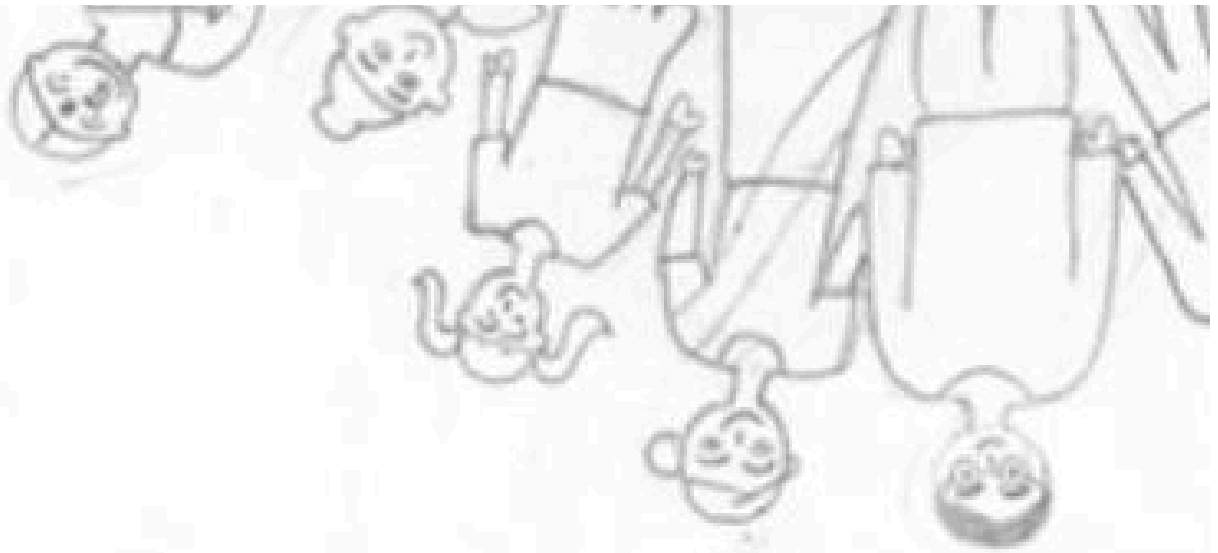

### Importance of Secularism in Democracy

### Constitutional Mandate for Secularism

---

The Indian Constitution mandates a secular State to ensure:

1. No religious community dominates another.
2. No members dominate others within the same religious community.
3. The State neither enforces any religion nor restricts religious freedom.

The State maintains distance from religion, avoiding promotion of any religion in government spaces like courts, schools, and offices.
