Rights

Rights are claims or entitlements that individuals and groups regard as necessary for leading a life of respect and dignity. They differ from moral principles in that they are enforceable and necessary for well-being.

In the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, political theorists identified three natural rights of man: the right to life, the right to liberty, and the right to property. These rights are guarantees that human beings seek to lead a minimally good life. Every individual possesses intrinsic value and must have equal opportunities.

The United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adopted on December 10, 1948, recognizes claims that the global community sees as fundamental human rights and opportunities.

Constitutions represent the highest law of the land, and constitutional recognition of rights gives them primary importance. Rights are often protected by the courts to ensure individual life and liberty.

Types of Rights

Political Rights: These rights allow citizens equality before the law and participation in the political process. They include the right to vote, the right to run for office, and the right to hold public office.

Economic Rights: These rights ensure that citizens, especially those with low incomes, receive housing, medical facilities, minimum wages, and social security.

Cultural Rights: These include the right to primary education in one's mother tongue and the right to establish institutions for teaching one's language and culture.

Relation Between Rights and Responsibilities

Rights compel individuals to consider not only their personal needs but also what is good for society as a whole. They require respecting the rights of others.
