Question 31.

How did food promote long-distance cultural contacts in the pre-modern world? Explain

Additionally, food served as a medium for cultural exchange, with recipes and cooking techniques reflecting the merging of traditions. This exchange contributed significantly to the development of global agricultural economies and cultural diversity.

Section D

Question 32.

Read the following source and answer the questions that follow :

Print and Censorship

The power of the printed word is most often seen in the way governments seek to regulate and suppress print. The colonial government kept continuous track of all books and newspapers published in India and passed numerous laws to control the press. During the First World War, under the Defense of India Rules, 22 newspapers had to furnish securities. Of these, 18 shut down rather than comply with government orders. The Sedition Committee Report under Rowlatt in 1919 further strengthened controls that led to imposition of penalties on various newspapers. At the outbreak of the Second World War, the Defense of India Act was passed, allowing censoring of reports of war-related topics. All reports about the Quit India Movement came under its purview. In August 1942, about 90 newspapers were suppressed.

(1) What method did the colonial government employ to keep track of Indian newspapers?

[1 Marks]

Answer: The colonial government employed the method of continuous tracking of all books and newspapers published in India, implementing numerous laws to control the press. For instance, under the Defence of India Rules during the First World War, newspapers were required to furnish securities, while subsequent legislative measures allowed the government to confiscate newspapers deemed objectionable or seditious.

(2) Analyse the impact of 'Sedition Committee' on Newspapers.

Answer: The Sedition Committee, established in 1919, had a significant impact on newspapers in colonial India by imposing stringent controls and penalties on the press. It strengthened the existing regulatory framework, leading to increased government censorship. Many newspapers were forced to furnish securities, and 18 of 22 newspapers chose to shut down rather than comply with these oppressive regulations. The Rowlatt Act created an environment where the government had

extensive rights to censor any seditious content, leading to heightened restrictions on journalistic freedom and the suppression of nationalist voices.

(3) How did the colonial government's laws affect the press?

Answer: The colonial government's laws severely restricted press freedom by imposing strict regulations and censorship. For instance, under the Defense of India Rules during the First World War, many newspapers were shut down instead of complying with government orders. The implementation of the Sedition Committee Report in 1919 led to increased penalties on newspapers, while the Defense of India Act allowed censorship of war-related news and led to the suppression of around 90 newspapers during the Quit India Movement in 1942. Such measures aimed to control and suppress dissent, significantly affecting the operation of the press in India.

Question 33.

Read the following source and answer the questions that follow :

Project Tiger

Project Tiger Tiger is one of the key wildlife species in the faunal web. In 1973, the authorities realized that the tiger population had dwindled to 1,827 from an estimated 55,000 at the turn of the 20th century. The major threats to tiger population are numerous, such as poaching for trade, shrinking habitat, depletion of prey base species, growing human population, etc. The trade of tiger skins and the use of their bones in traditional medicines, especially in the Asian countries left the tiger population on the verge of extinction. Since India and Nepal provide habitat to about two-thirds of the surviving tiger population in the world, these two nations become prime targets for poaching and illegal trading.

“Project Tiger”, one of the well publicized wildlife campaigns in the world, was launched in 1973. Tiger conservation has been viewed not only as an effort to save an endangered species but with equal importance as a means of preserving biotypes of sizeable magnitude. Corbett National Park in Uttarakhand, Sunderbans National Park in West Bengal, Bandhavgarh National Park in Madhya Pradesh, Sariska Wildlife Sanctuary in Rajasthan, Manas Tiger Reserve in Assam and Periyar Tiger Reserve in Kerala are some examples of the tiger reserves in India.

(1) Why was ‘Project Tiger’ considered a significant step for Tiger Conservation?

[1 Marks]

Answer: ‘Project Tiger’ was considered a significant step for tiger conservation because it aimed to protect the dwindling tiger population from threats like poaching and habitat loss. Launched in 1973, it recognized the necessity of conserving not only tigers but also the biotypes they inhabit, ensuring ecological balance. Given that India and Nepal host two-thirds of the world’s tigers, Project Tiger was critical in addressing illegal trading and preserving this key species in the faunal web.

(2) What role did India play in the global tiger population?

Efforts include establishing numerous national parks and reserves to protect these majestic animals from poaching and habitat loss.

(3) Mention any two major threats to the wildlife species.

Answer: Two major threats to the wildlife species, particularly the tiger population, are poaching for trade and shrinking habitat. Poaching has greatly reduced the number of tigers due to illegal hunting for their skins and bones, while shrinking habitat due to human encroachment has diminished the area in which tigers can live and hunt.

Question 34.

Read the following extract and answer the questions that follow :

Linguistic diversity of India

How many languages do we have in India? The answer depends on how one counts it. The latest information that we have is from the Census of India held in 2011. This census recorded more than 1300 distinct languages which people mentioned as their mother tongues. These languages were grouped together under some major languages. For example, languages like Bhojpuri, Magadhi, Bundelkhandi, Chhattisgarhi, Rajasthani and many others were grouped together under 'Hindi'. Even after this grouping, the Census found 121 major languages. Of these, 22 languages are now included in the Eighth Schedule of the Indian Constitution and are therefore called 'Scheduled Languages'. Others are called 'Non-Scheduled Languages'. In terms of languages, India is perhaps the most diverse country in the world.

(1) How many languages were recorded as mother tongues in the 2011 Census of India?

Answer: The 2011 Census of India recorded more than 1300 distinct languages as mother tongues.
