Section A

Question 1. Mention the views of Mahatma Gandhi on Satyagraha.

[2 Marks]

Answer: Mahatma Gandhi viewed satyagraha as a powerful weapon of truth not reliant on physical force but on the strength of non-violence. He believed that true struggle against injustice necessitated active participation, drawing from the essence of truth and love. Gandhi emphasized that satyagraha could unite Indians, allowing them to resist oppression without seeking vengeance. His philosophy promoted the idea that moral

strength could triumph over brute force, thus fostering a spirit of unity among diverse communities.

Question 2. Explain the major concerns of the Jute Textile industry.

[2 Marks]

Answer: The Jute Textile industry faces several major concerns including fluctuating prices of raw jute due to reduced global demand, competition from synthetic materials, and inadequate investment in modernization. After the partition, jute mill ownership remained in India, but the majority of jute-growing areas went to Bangladesh, leading to supply chain issues. Additionally, there are challenges related to labor costs and environmental factors which impact production. Farmers also suffer from low prices for their crops.

Question 3. Mention the two conditions that democracy must fulfill to achieve a harmonious social life.

Answer: To achieve a harmonious social life, democracy must fulfill two essential conditions. First, it must accommodate social diversity, ensuring that different groups can coexist peacefully without any group feeling marginalized. Second, it should enhance the dignity and freedom of citizens, allowing them to have equal participation and voice in decision-making processes, which helps prevent feelings of resentment and promotes mutual respect among all citizens.

Question 4. Analyse the situation in which credit pushes the borrower into a situation from which recovery is painful.

Answer: Credit can sometimes lead borrowers into a debt trap, as seen in Swapna's case. While credit can enhance earnings, it may also result in dire consequences if circumstances go wrong, like crop failure. Without adequate support during losses, borrowers like Swapna may have to resort to selling assets, which worsens their financial situation. Thus, the success of credit hinges on risk management and support structures for borrowers facing potential hardships.

Question 5.

Question 7.

Question 9.

This capacity to handle diversity without suppressing dissent enhances the legitimacy and support for democratic governance. Hence, the fundamental ability of democracy to evolve and adapt based on citizens' feedback reinforces its significance as a governance model.

Question 10.

The Sense of Collective Belonging

This sense of collective belonging came partly through the experience of united struggles. But there were also a variety of cultural processes - fiction, folklore and songs, popular prints and symbols, all played a part in the making of nationalism. The identity of the

nation, as you know, is most often symbolised in a figure or image. This helps create an image with which people can identify the nation. It was in the twentieth century, with the growth of nationalism, that the identity of India came to be visually associated with the image of Bharat Mata. The image was first created by Bankim Chandra Chatterjee in a hymn to the motherland. Later it was included in his novel Anandamath and widely sung during the Swadeshi movement in Bengal. Moved by the Swadeshi movement, Abanindranath Tagore painted his famous image of Bharat Mata. In this painting, Bharat Mata is portrayed as an ascetic figure; she is calm, composed, divine and spiritual. In subsequent years, the image of Bharat Mata acquired many different forms, as it circulated in popular prints, and was painted by different artists.

Question 15. How does the credit vary substantially between formal and informal lenders? Explain with examples.

Answer: Credit varies significantly between formal and informal lenders primarily in terms of interest rates, documentation requirements, and the means of repayment. Formal lenders, such as banks and cooperatives, typically offer loans at lower interest rates and require collateral, detailed documentation, and a clear repayment plan. For example, cooperative societies provide members with affordable credit options to support their agricultural activities. In contrast, informal lenders, like moneylenders, charge exorbitant interest rates without requiring collateral or extensive paperwork. This leads to higher costs for borrowers. While informal loans may be accessible without documentation and

often involve personal relationships, they can trap borrowers in cycles of debt due to harsh repayment practices. For instance, a farmer seeking quick cash might turn to a moneylender who can charge rates as high as 30% or more, often leading to financial distress. On the other hand, formal loans, although more difficult to obtain for poorer households due to strict criteria, foster economic development by providing affordable rates to those who can meet the requirements. The disparity in credit access reinforces economic inequality, as wealthier individuals benefit more from formal credit, while poorer individuals are left reliant on costly informal sources.
