Explanation: Tamil is included in the Eighth Schedule of the Indian Constitution as one of the scheduled languages. The Eighth Schedule recognizes officially 22 languages, which include Tamil, among others. Magadhi, Rajasthani, and Bhojpuri are not recognized as scheduled languages in this context.

Question 2.

In which one of the following organs of India are women taking advantage of reservation?

Explanation:

The correct option is Municipality. In India, local government bodies, including municipalities, have a constitutional mandate to reserve at least one-third of all positions for women. This reservation provides a significant opportunity for women to participate in governance at the local level, unlike in the legislature and judiciary where their representation remains quite low.

Question 5.

I. It is now compulsory for all the political parties to file income tax returns.

II. It is now compulsory for all parties to have one-third women candidates.

III. It is now compulsory for all the political parties to hold their organisational election.

IV. It is now compulsory for all candidates to disclose information about pending criminal cases against them through affidavit.

Explanation:

Only II, III and IV are correct. The context mentions that political parties are required to hold organisational elections (III) and candidates must disclose pending criminal cases (IV). It suggests that making a quota for women candidates (II) is a recommended reform but not yet legally mandated, while filing income tax returns (I) is mentioned but not as a compulsory task for all parties in the context provided.

Question 24.

Describe any two features of forest soils .

These soils are rich in organic matter due to the decomposition of plant materials, thus providing essential nutrients for growth. In hilly and mountainous regions, forest soils can also exhibit coarse grain textures in upper slopes and are generally acidic, especially in snow-covered areas, leading to low humus levels.

Question 25.

Why did the Indian Government restrict foreign trade and foreign investment between 1947-1991 ? Explain.

Answer: The Indian Government restricted foreign trade and investment from 1947 to 1991 primarily to protect the nascent domestic industries from foreign competition. After gaining independence, the government aimed to promote self-sufficiency and foster industrial growth without the threat of overwhelming foreign imports. Importing essential goods like machinery was allowed, but barriers were established to safeguard local producers. This was crucial in nurturing India's economic foundation during its formative years, given the vulnerability of local businesses at that time.

Question 26. Analyse the impacts of Gandhi-Irwin pact on the Indian freedom struggle.

Answer: The Gandhi-Irwin Pact of 1931 had significant impacts on the Indian freedom struggle. Firstly, it marked a temporary halt to the civil disobedience movement, allowing for a brief cessation of conflict between nationalists and the British government. The agreement led to the release of political prisoners, which revitalized the morale among Congress supporters. While many radical nationalists criticized Gandhi for not securing a commitment for political independence, the pact did open channels for negotiation. Gandhi's participation in the Round Table Conference in London was crucial, as it put the Indian struggle on the global stage. Although the conference ultimately did not yield substantial results, it symbolized a formal recognition of Indian aspirations for self-rule. The backlash from the British government after the pact, however, highlighted the ongoing repression faced by Indians and underscored the urgency of the independence movement. Overall, while the pact had limitations, it played a vital role in shaping the trajectory of the freedom struggle during this period.

Question 27.

Analyse the role of Alluri Sitaram Raju in the Indian National Movement.

Raju's inspiration came from Gandhi's Non-Cooperation Movement, promoting khadi and denouncing alcohol. However, he advocated for armed resistance, believing that true liberation would only be

achieved through force. His leadership galvanized tribal revolts, highlighting the struggle of forest communities, culminating in the 1924 rebellion, which was eventually suppressed with his arrest. His legacy endures as a symbol of resistance and empowerment for marginalized tribes in India.

Question 28.

How have industrialisation and urbanisation impacted water supply? Explain.

Answer: Industrialisation and urbanisation have significantly strained water supply in various ways. As urban centres expand due to population growth and rising living standards, the demand for fresh water increases dramatically. Moreover, untreated sewage and industrial waste are often discharged into water bodies, resulting in pollution and degradation of water quality. Consequently, the supply of clean, fresh water for domestic and agricultural needs is severely impacted, leading to shortages and health concerns for urban populations.

It ultimately supervises the functioning of formal credit sources, enhancing the banking sector's reliability and efficiency.

Question 31.

'Sharing of power between the Union Government and the state Government is basic to the structure of the Indian Constitution'. Analyse the statement with suitable argument.

Answer: The statement emphasizes the fundamental nature of federalism in the Indian Constitution, where power is divided between the Union Government and state governments. A landmark Supreme Court judgment has reinforced this by making it challenging for the Central Government to dismiss state governments arbitrarily, enhancing state authority. The Constitution also recognizes the uniqueness of states, with some enjoying special statuses. Ultimately, this structure aims to balance unity and diversity in India, as federalism allows for regional governance while maintaining a cohesive national framework.

Section D

Question 32. The Revolutionaries During the years following 1815, the fear of repression drove many liberal-nationalists underground. Secret societies sprang up in many European states to train revolutionaries and spread their ideas. To be revolutionary at this time meant a commitment to oppose monarchical forms that had been established after the Vienna Congress, and to fight for liberty and freedom. Most of these revolutionaries also saw the creation of nation-states as a necessary part of this struggle for freedom.

(1) Analyse the reasons for many liberal-nationalists going underground after 1815.

[2 Marks]

Answer: After 1815, many liberal-nationalists opted to go underground due to the fear of severe repression from the conservative regimes established after the Vienna Congress. The suppression of revolutionary ideas and the crackdown on dissent prompted these individuals to form secret societies, where they could safely train and organize without facing persecution. Moreover, the desire to overthrow monarchical rule and advocate for fundamental freedoms drove them to embrace secrecy as a

necessary strategy to fight for the establishment of nation-states that would guarantee equal rights for all citizens.

Question 33. Iron Ore Iron ore is the basic mineral and the backbone of industrial development. India is endowed with fairly abundant resources of iron ore. India is rich in good quality iron ores. Magnetite is the finest iron ore with a very high content of iron up to 70 percent. It has excellent magnetic qualities, especially valuable in the electrical industry. Hematite ore is the most important industrial iron ore in terms of the quantity used, but has a slightly lower iron content than magnetite (50 - 60 percent). In 2018 - 19, almost the entire production of iron ore (97%) accrued from Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Karnataka and Jharkhand. The remaining production (3%) was from other states.

(1) Which is the most important industrial iron ore?

The steel industry, which is vital for infrastructure and manufacturing, heavily relies on iron ore, making it a backbone of industrial growth.
