## Section A

### Question 1.

What was the objective of Lomov's visit to Chubukov's house? (The Proposal)

[2 Marks]

**Answer:** The main objective of Lomov's visit to Chubukov's house was to propose marriage to Chubukov's daughter, Natalya. Lomov, a wealthy and somewhat nervous neighbour,

had come with the intention of asking for Natalya's hand in marriage. Despite their quarrelsome nature and tendency to argue over trivial matters, Lomov was sincere in his purpose. The proposal, however, almost got lost amidst the frequent petty arguments between the characters. Lomov's visit highlights the social customs and personal dynamics of the characters, especially the awkwardness and tension involved in the marriage proposal.

**Question 2.** Anand was blamed for a number of things. Mention any two.

**Answer:** Anand was blamed for two main things. First, he was blamed for not telling the truth about the theft, which made others suspicious of him. Second, he was blamed for causing trouble and misunderstanding among the people around him, which affected his reputation.

These blame points show that Anand became a victim of misunderstanding and wrong assumptions by others.

**Question 3.**

Walt Whitman speaks of the human race with a tinge of sarcasm. Which are the two reasons that you agree with? (Animals)

**Answer:** Walt Whitman uses sarcasm to highlight the cruel and selfish behavior of humans towards animals. Firstly, he points out that humans often subject innocent animals to unnecessary suffering for their own willfulness and amusement, showing a lack of empathy and respect for other living beings. Secondly, Whitman sarcastically criticizes how humans claim superiority over animals while being responsible for their pain and exploitation. These reasons reveal the irony in human actions, as they consider themselves civilized yet act cruelly toward animals.

**Question 4.** How did Custard prove 'the cowardly dragon' tag to be untrue?

**Answer:** Custard, the dragon, was called 'cowardly' by Belinda and her friends because he seemed afraid and gentle. However, Custard proved this tag wrong when he bravely protected his friends. When an enemy appeared, Custard jumped up, snorting and clashing his tail fiercely just like irons in a dungeon. His sharp teeth and spikes showed his courage, and he chased the enemy away. Through this brave act, Custard showed that he was not a coward but a true protector of his friends.

**Question 5.**

What role did Ebright's mother play in his success? (The Making of a Scientist)

**Question 6.** How was the hack driver recognised?

Since 'first' is a specific ordinal number, the definite article 'The' should be used. - For the second sentence, the correct preposition to use with years is 'in' rather than 'at'. Hence, 'graduated in 1886' is correct. - In the third sentence, the verb form is wrong. 'had start' should be changed to the past participle form 'had started' to agree with the past perfect tense. - In the last phrase 'admissions of medical colleges', the correct preposition is 'in' as admissions happen in colleges, not of colleges. These corrections maintain grammatical accuracy, especially with article usage, prepositions, and verb tense, important aspects of noun phrase structure.

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## Section C

### Question 9.

Read the passage given below :

1. Milkha Singh, also known as The Flying Sikh, was an Indian track and field sprinter who was introduced to the sport while serving in the Indian Army. He is the only athlete to win gold in 400 metres at the Asian Games as well as the Commonwealth Games. He also won gold medals in the 1958 and 1962 Asian Games. He represented India in the 1956 Summer Olympics in Melbourne, the 1960 Summer Olympics in Rome and the 1964 Summer Olympics in Tokyo. He was awarded the Padma Shri, India's fourth-highest civilian honour, in recognition of his sporting achievements.
2. The race for which Singh is best remembered is his fourth-place finish in the 400 metres final at the 1960 Olympic Games. He led the race till the 200 m mark before easing off, allowing others to pass him. Singh's fourth-place time of 45.73 seconds was the Indian national record for almost 40 years.
3. From beginnings that saw him orphaned and displaced during the partition of India, Singh became a sporting icon in the country. In 2008, journalist Rohit Brijnath described Singh as "the finest athlete India has ever produced".
4. He was disappointed with his debut performance at the 1956 Melbourne Olympics. "I returned to India, chastened by my poor performance in Melbourne. I had been so excited by the prospects of being part of the Indian Olympics team, but, hadn't realized how strong and professional the competition would be. My success in India had filled me with a false sense of pride and it was only when I was on the track that I

saw how inconsequential my talents were when pitted against superbly fit and seasoned athletes. It was then that I understood what competition actually meant, and that if I wanted to succeed on the international arena, I must be prepared to test my mettle against the best athletes in the world.”

5. Then he decided to make sprinting the sole focus of his life. “Running had thus become my God, my religion and my beloved.” “My life during those two years was governed by strict rules and regulations and a self-imposed penance. Every morning I would rise at the crack of dawn, get into my sports kit and dash off to the track, where I would run two or three miles cross-country in the company of my coach.”

On how he pushed himself through the tough days of vigorous training. “I practiced so strenuously that often I was drained of all energy, and there were times when I would vomit blood or drop down unconscious through sheer exercise. My doctors and coaches warned me, asked me to slow down to maintain my health and equilibrium but my determination was too strong to give up. My only focus was to become the best athlete in the world. But then images of a packed stadium filled with cheering spectators, wildly applauding me as I crossed the finishing line, would flash across my mind and I would start again, encouraged by visions of victory.”

Based on your reading answer any five questions from the six given below :

(1) What is Milkha Singh known as ? What realization did Milkha Singh have when he was on the track during the Melbourne Olympics ?

[1 Marks]

**Answer:** Milkha Singh is known as 'The Flying Sikh'. During his participation in the Melbourne Olympics, he realized that the competition was much stronger and more professional than he had expected. He understood that his talents, which had brought him success in India, were not enough on the international stage and that he needed to prepare himself better to compete with the best athletes in the world.

**Key Points:** Milkha Singh known as The Flying Sikh - Realized competition was very strong at Melbourne Olympics - Felt his talents were insufficient compared to international athletes - Understood the need for better preparation and hard work on the international level.

His strong desire to succeed pushed him to train rigorously despite physical hardships, constantly inspired by the vision of victory and the cheers of the spectators. This passion and determination fueled his efforts to achieve excellence in athletics.

## Question 10.

Read the following excerpt from a Case Study. J.K. Rowling – A Journey

The story of Joanne Kathleen Rowling's near magical rise to fame is almost as well known as the characters she creates.

Rowling was constantly writing and telling stories to her younger sister Dianne. "The first story I ever wrote down was about a rabbit called Rabbit." Rowling said in an interview. "He got the measles and was visited by his friends including a giant bee called Miss Bee. And ever since Rabbit and Miss Bee, I have always wanted to be a writer, though I rarely told anyone so.

However, my parents, both of whom come from impoverished backgrounds and neither of whom had been to college, took the view that my overactive imagination was an amusing personal quirk that would never pay a mortgage or secure a pension.

A writer from the age of six, with two unpublished novels in the drawer, she was stuck on a train when Harry walked into her mind fully formed. She spent the next five years constructing the plots of seven books, one for every year of his secondary school life.

Rowling says she started writing the first book, Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone, in Portugal, where she was teaching English.

At first nobody wanted to publish Harry Potter. She was told that plot was too complex. Refusing to compromise, she found a publisher.

In 1997 Rowling received her first royalty cheque. By book three, she had sky rocketed to the top of the publishing world. A row of zeroes appeared on the author's bank balance and her life was turned upside down. Day and night she had journalists knocking on the unanswered door of her flat.

Rowling's quality control has become legendary, as her obsession with accuracy. She's thrilled with Stephen Fry's taped version of the books and outraged that an Italian dust jacket showed Harry minus his glasses. "Don't they understand that the glasses are the clue to his vulnerability."

(1) Explain J.K. Rowling's 'near magical rise to fame'.

[1 Marks]

**Answer:** J.K. Rowling's rise to fame was 'near magical' because although she faced many difficulties, she never gave up on her writing dreams. From a young age, she loved creating stories. Despite her parents' skepticism, she kept writing. The character of Harry Potter came to her fully formed while she was on a train, and she spent five years developing the plots of seven books. Although many publishers rejected Harry Potter at first, calling the plot too complex, Rowling refused to compromise and finally found a publisher. Her first book's success brought her fame and financial success, making her rise to the top of the literary world almost magical.

**Key Points:** J.K. Rowling loved writing from childhood - Persisted despite parents' lack of support - Created Harry Potter character on a train - Spent five years planning seven books - Faced rejection from publishers but didn't give up - Finally got published and achieved great success
