ABOUT THE 1776 NATIONAL TOUR COMPANY GENDER EXPANSIVENESS, PRONOUNS \& LANGUAGE

We celebrate the gender identity of each member of the 1776 National Tour and want to give everyone writing and/or speaking about the show the correct terminology when referencing the company.

## CORRECT LANGUAGE

Correct phrases to use when describing this production or cast:

- The national touring cast of 1776 is comprised of female, transgender, and nonbinary actors.
- The national touring cast of 1776 reflects multiple representations of race, ethnicity, and gender, and who identify as female, trans, and nonbinary.
- This production was cast in a way this show has not been traditionally cast in the past.


## INCORRECT/HARMFUL LANGUAGE

Incorrect phrases to use when discussing or describing this production or cast:

- "All female" or "Ladies"

This cast is comprised of female, transgender and non-binary actors. To eliminate references to our trans and non-binary actors erases the trans \& gender expansive folks in the cast.

- "Gender-bent" or "Gender-bending" or "Gender swapped" The connotation of "gender-bent" is that instead of a show being cast as the "traditional gender" it is cast as the "opposite gender" which inherently reinforces the binary, thus invalidating the gender identities of several of our cast members.


## TERMINOLOGY

Gender identity:
A person's internal sense of their self and their gender.

Trans or Transgender:
A person whose gender identity differs with their gender assigned at birth.

Non-binary:
An umbrella gender identity that does not conform to the false idea that there are two genders, male and female. Some other terms that fall under the non-binary umbrella are agender, genderqueer, gender-fluid, pangender, or gender non-conforming. People who identify as non-binary might also identify as trans.

Cis or Cisgender:
A person whose gender identity aligns with their gender assigned at birth.

## PRONOUNS

Pronouns are the words we use to talk about people aside from using their names (ex: she/her, he/him, they/them, and many more.) Sometimes pronouns correlate with someone's gender identity, and sometimes they do not.

Please use the correct pronouns whenever discussing a member of the company. Each actor's pronouns are listed with their biographies, on the 1776 musical.com website and in the paragraph below.
