Indra Dewi was a much-valued and respected member of the Mursala team. Although a non-amateur, she contributed to its success, helping in many ways as cook and on general support duties. Our thoughts and condolences go out to her family and to Agus, and to the whole team on their tragic loss.

THE RANDOM WIRE

HELLO MON

Well, here I am, back from a great week in Nassau, New Providence, The Bahamas. My wife and I spent Easter week at a resort in Nassau, and I got a chance to be a mini dx-pedition.

We had a room on the fourth floor of a six story building, with a balcony overlooking both the resort pool and the ocean. What a view! Plus, it was a direct shot north for radio waves to head to the North East Ohio area!

I took along a small portable 100 watt HF rig as well as a small power supply, a keyer, and a portable HF antenna with a built in antenna tuner. It was a very simple set-up. The antenna being just a fifty-four inch telescoping antenna set into a basic tuner. But it tuned up well on the bands I operated on, so I was happy.

I set everything up on the balcony off our room and with the weather cooperating, was able to just leave the station set up there the whole week. At night I would throw a towel over everything just to be on the safe side. I left instructions for the maid to just leave everything on the balcony as it was. They have a tendency to move things around.

CQ DX, CQ DX, CQ DX

My first day of operation was actually Easter Sunday. I began operating on ten meters, and my first contact was a New York station. I made several contacts in the U.S. and Europe that day, but kept things short because of the holiday.

I had informed several of the C.A.R.S. members which I thought might have an opportunity to operate during the hours I would be operating of the time I would be on the air and which frequencies I would be using. I had picked 28.495 MHz as my primary operating frequency, with a couple of alternatives in case that frequency was in use.

Then I began....CQ DX, CQ DX, CQ DX, this is Charlie Six Stroke Whiskey Bravo Eight November calling CQ from Nassau in the Bahamas...sitting on my balcony in eighty some degree weather, the sun shinning down on me in my swimming trunks, watching the people at the pool and the waves rushing up on the beach, with a nice cold gin and tonic on the table next to my log. Was this ham heaven or what? My wife was taking a nap prior to dinner, so I didn't have to worry about bothering her or viceversa.

I made several stateside contacts, and several in Europe and I heard John Lane KB8IUH calling me. I answered him, but for some reason he could not hear me. Now, that was not a good omen. Suddenly I heard a familiar voice coming back to me. It was Carl Beduhn K8AV, who is a long time C.A.R.S. member. I had a short qso with him and then I heard, Ron Borkey K8VJG calling me. WOW! This was GREAT! I talked to Ron and he said he was going to give Gary Dewey NI8Z a call and tell him I was on the air, which he did, but alas, Gary was not at home. I then heard K8CRF calling me. Now that was a familiar call sign...the Cleveland Rain Forest station at the Cleveland Zoo! It was Sean Carey W8SCC operating the Rain Forest station. I made several more contacts that day, both from the U.S.A. and Europe, and called it quits around five thirty P.M. as I had to get ready to go eat dinner.

THE THIRD DAY

Tuesday afternoon I began calling cq again, and had some contacts from Europe, but only a few from stateside. Conditions were really bad. I later learned that there was some solar activity affecting band conditions and that propagation was poor on all the bands for DX operation. But I kept trying and was able to several contacts that day.

WEDNESDAY, SHOPPING

Wednesday was a cloudy cool day, and we took a trip to town to see the sights and do some souvenir shopping. That pretty much shot the whole day, and by the time we got back to the resort, it was time to get ready for dinner, so no HF operation that day. As I learned later, it was just as well because of the poor propagation.

THURSDAY AND FRIDAY

Conditions were pretty much the same both Thursday and Friday, with only a few contacts from the lower states, and some from Europe. I did make a contact with a fellow named Ivor GIOAIJ, from Belfast, Ireland. This guy was a real character. I had heard him on the air talking to a couple of other stations and he was a real comedian! As it turns out, he will be at the Dayton Hamvention and we have plans to meet at the Northern Ohio DX Association Hospitality Room. That should be an interesting and fun meeting. Some of the countries I made contact with were Argentina, Poland, Italy, Ireland, Croatia, Spain, Portugal, Newfoundland (where they had a couple of stranded polar bears), Nova Scotia, France, Trinidad, Dominica, and Texas. Well, they think they are a separate country, don't they? The states I made contact with besides Ohio were New York, Minnesota, Kansas, Wyoming, Michigan, and Texas.

I know several of you tried to at least hear me, but to no avail. Gordon KC8IOU looked for me, and Roger N8TCP said he heard another station talking to me but he could not hear me. Oh well...better luck next time guys. And there WILL be a next time.

PACKING IT ALL IN

Friday evening I had to tear down the station and pack it all up in my carry-on bag...21 pounds worth...as we were leaving early Saturday morning for home. It was a fun experience and although conditions did not exactly cooperate with me, I enjoyed operating as a DX station for those few days.

I am looking forward to doing it again, perhaps from the Bahamas, or perhaps from another Caribbean island We enjoyed our stay in the Bahamas...it is clean, the people are friendly and the weather was warm and sunny. I understand we picked a good week to get away, as the weather here was cold and wet and miserable. We came back home to warm weather and sunny skies.

That's about it for this month. Hope to see you at the May meeting, just before the big Dayton Hamvention weekend. Wednesday the meeting, Thursday we will be heading for Dayton, and Friday, the Hamvention opens bright and early at eight thirty! Hope to see many of you at Dayton as well.
