She has taught stage management to students in undergraduate programs and mentored young stage managers at a variety of professional theaters and academic programs. She is passionate about communicating this collaborative experience to liberal arts students so they can grow in whatever capacity they are interested—as actors, designers, directors, or stage managers. Janet is the director of production and building services at Des Moines Performing Arts. Previously she has stage managed Iowa's longest running show, *Triple Espresso*, as well as shows around the country, including in Los Angeles and New York.

During his time as co-director of the high school musical, the Forest City community abundantly supported him with sold-out shows. In 2018, Scott was the recipient of the IHSMTA Impact Award and was inducted into the IHSSA Hall of Fame.
