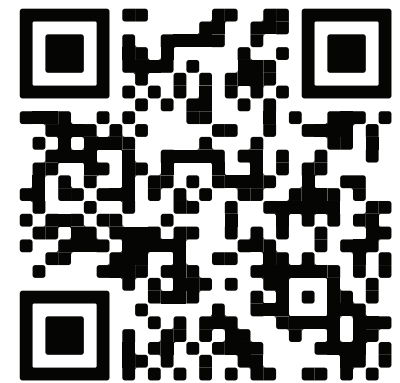

1904

Establishment of the Hebrew Free Loan Association, the precursor to JFLA.

1930s

JFLA's crucial role in supporting businesses during the Great Depression.



1950s

Introduction of Education Loans to support students with rising education costs.

1970s-1980s

Expansion of services to immigrant communities, including Iranian Jews and Russian immigrants.



Today, JFLA stands as one of the world's oldest micro-lending institutions, having touched tens of thousands of lives over its 120-year history.

From supporting businesses during the Great Depression, assisting students with education loans, extending aid to immigrant communities, and stepping

Through every initiative, JFLA remains true to its original founding principle of providing "a hand-up, not a handout," ensuring people's self-sufficiency and sense of dignity.

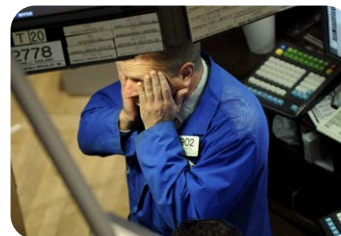


1980s

After the Northridge quake, provides loans to those impacted by the natural disaster.

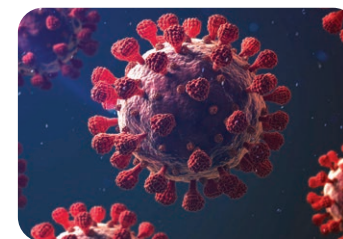


2008

New Named Loan Funds

Horvitz Teachers' Loan Fund

As a former teacher, David Horvitz understands the issues that can derail a normally self-supporting teacher. Together with his wife Michelle, they generously established the Horvitz Teachers' Loan Fund to help teachers throughout greater Los Angeles address emergency needs such as housing, transportation, medical and dental care, and debt consolidation.

Robert and Ethel Lewis Emergency Housing Fund

Since 2018, Eileen Lewis has volunteered weekly as a Kitchen Aide at the Downtown Women's Center. She sees firsthand how easy it is for these women to fall off the edge. "The women are generally middle-aged and previously led typical lives - they raised families, went to work and took care of infirm relatives. But the domino effect often catches up with them. If a woman can't repair her car or get needed medical care, then she may not be able to get to work. Then she can't pay rent. And then she's unhoused." Moved and inspired by these women and wanting to honor her parents, Eileen created the Robert and Ethel Lewis Emergency Housing Fund to help people stabilize their lives.

Dr. Reba Braff-Simon PhD and Dr. David J. Simon MD PhD Loan Fund for Nursing Students

Reba Simon was impacted by amazing nurses both during her late husband's illness and then years later, during her own. While creating her estate plan, she wanted to leave a legacy that would support future nurses so others could receive that same impact when they needed it most. Her bequest to JFLA establishes a loan fund that benefits nursing students and fulfills that wish.

Impact Story: Emergency Housing



Erfan's Emergency Housing Story

Erfan is a single mom of two teenagers. Despite working full-time and having two additional part-time jobs, Erfan struggled with mounting expenses: car repairs, taxes, gas, and bills. JFLA's support was life-changing for Erfan. Her loan helped her pay off debt and manage her increased rent payments.

This assistance not only relieved her immediate financial stress but also renewed her hope and confidence. Grateful for their support, Erfan highly recommends JFLA to anyone in need, as JFLA's help transformed what seemed insurmountable into a manageable challenge.



Impact Story: IVF



A Dream of Growing Through IVF

Renee and her husband longed to expand their family beyond their beautiful 4-year-old daughter. After two years of trying to conceive naturally, they turned to IVF, facing a daunting financial burden without insurance coverage.

Their situation improved when a friend told them about JFLA. With the zero-interest, zero-fee loan, they could afford one round of IVF. After the egg retrieval and genetic testing, they had one genetically normal embryo. The transfer succeeded, and they are now 11 weeks pregnant.

Renee and her husband are profoundly grateful to JFLA and recognize that their dream of growing their family would not have been possible without the fertility loan.



Impact Story: Small Business



Wellness Bank

The Wellness Bank faced significant challenges during the COVID-19 pandemic, including an 8-week closure to transition to telehealth services. Despite efforts to adapt, mounting expenses and delayed reimbursements led Denise to seek support from JFLA. A JFLA small business loan enabled her to negotiate a new lease, reduce costs, and hire a new therapist.

This year, Denise returned to JFLA to refinance her loan for a move to a new location, covering contractor fees, security deposits, and equipment upgrades. With JFLA's help, Denise has been able to sustain and expand The Wellness Bank's services, continuing to serve the Manhattan Beach community.



Impact Story: Ogen



Lending Beyond Borders: JFLA's response to October 7

As the world faced the aftermath of the October 7th Hamas terrorist attacks on Israel, JFLA responded with action. In coordination with other Free Loans throughout the United States, JFLA proudly contributed \$500,000 to a total loan of \$3.4M to Ogen, the Free Loan Association based in Jerusalem.

The funds from JFLA will allow Ogen to help Israelis who were drastically and personally impacted by October 7th. JFLA's loan to Ogen helped dozens of individuals and small business owners who were impacted by the war. One client was the owner of a small carpenter shop who was deployed multiple times over the last year. The loan from Ogen helped keep his business going and his staff employed.

Mission to Israel

In July 2024, Executive Director Rachel Grose, President of the Board Brandon Levin, Board Member Joel Glucoft, and distinguished guests embarked on a profound journey to Israel. Their mission: to support our partner agency Ogen that is located in Jerusalem, and Israelis who were deeply impacted by October 7th.

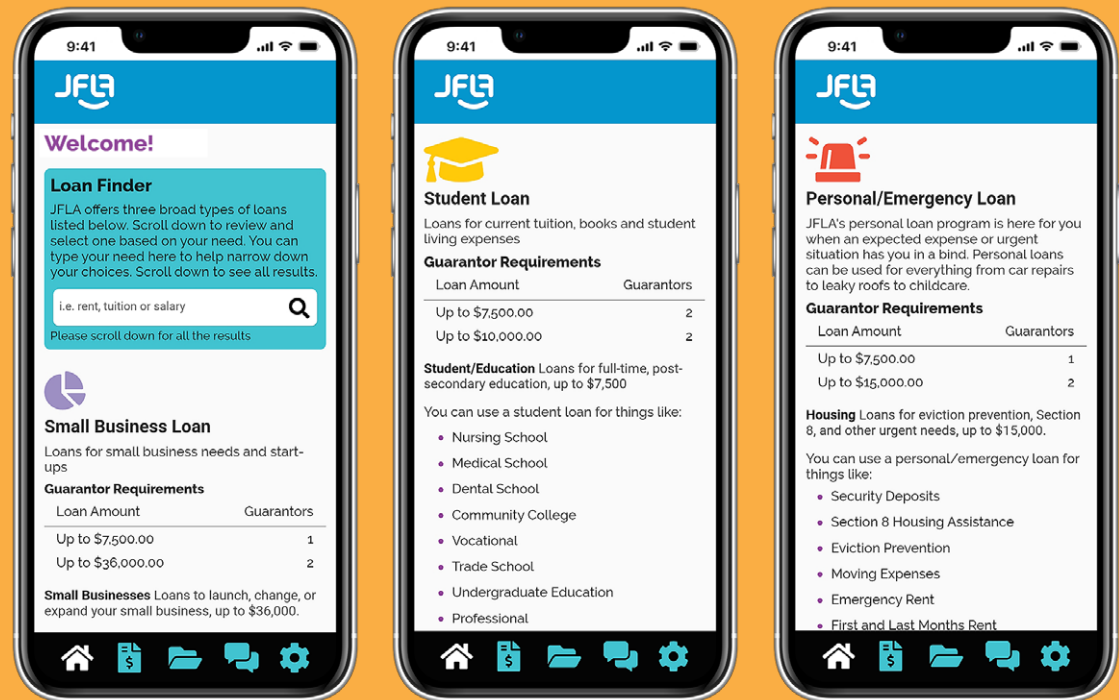
The JFLA App
