### The Philadelphia Orchestra

The world-renowned Philadelphia Orchestra strives to share the transformative power of music with the widest possible audience, and to create joy, connection, and excitement through music in the Philadelphia region, across the country, and around the world. Through innovative programming, robust education initiatives, a commitment to its diverse communities, and the embrace of digital outreach, the ensemble is creating an expansive and inclusive future for classical music and furthering the place of the arts in an open and democratic society. In June 2021 the Orchestra and its home, the Kimmel Center, united. Today, The Philadelphia Orchestra and Ensemble Arts brings the greatest performances and most impactful education and community programs to audiences in Philadelphia and beyond.

Yannick Nézet-Séguin is now in his 13th season with The Philadelphia Orchestra, serving as music and artistic director. His connection to the ensemble's musicians has been praised by both concertgoers and critics, and he is embraced by the musicians of the Orchestra, audiences, and the community. In addition to expanding the repertoire by embracing an ever-growing and diverse group of today's composers, Yannick and the Orchestra are committed to performing and recording the works of previously overlooked composers.

Your Philadelphia Orchestra takes great pride in its hometown, performing for the people of Philadelphia year-round, at the Kimmel Center for the Performing Arts, around the community, over the airwaves, and online. The Kimmel Center has been the ensemble's home since 2001, and in 2024 Verizon Hall at the Kimmel Center was officially rededicated as Marian Anderson Hall in honor of the legendary contralto, civil rights icon, and Philadelphian. The Orchestra's award-winning education and community initiatives engage over 50,000 students, families, and community members of all ages through programs such as PlayINs; sideby-sides; PopUP concerts; Our City, Your Orchestra Live; the free annual Martin Luther King, Jr., Tribute Concert; School Concerts; sensory-friendly concerts; open rehearsals; the School Ensemble Program; All-City Orchestra Fellowships; and residency work in Philadelphia and abroad.

Through concerts, tours, residencies, and recordings, the Orchestra is a global ambassador and one of our nation's greatest exports. It performs annually at Carnegie Hall, the Mann Center, the Saratoga Performing Arts Center, and the Bravo! Vail Music Festival. The Orchestra also has a rich touring history, having first performed outside Philadelphia in its earliest days. In 1973 it was the first American orchestra to perform in the People's Republic of China, launching a now-five-decade commitment of people-to-people exchange.

Under Yannick's leadership, the Orchestra returned to recording with 14 celebrated releases on the Deutsche Grammophon label, including the GRAMMY® Award—winning Florence Price Symphonies Nos. 1 & 3. ### **Music and Artistic Director**



Yannick Nézet-Séguin is currently in his 13th season with The Philadelphia Orchestra, serving as music and artistic director. An inspired leader, Yannick, who holds the Walter and Leonore Annenberg Chair, is both an evolutionary and a revolutionary, developing the mighty "Philadelphia Sound" in new ways. His collaborative style, deeply rooted musical curiosity, and boundless enthusiasm have been heralded by critics and audiences alike. The *New York Times* has called him "phenomenal," adding that "the ensemble, famous for its glowing strings and homogenous richness, has never sounded better."

Yannick has established himself as a musical leader of the highest caliber and one of the most thrilling and sought-after talents of his generation. He became the third music director of New York's Metropolitan Opera in 2018. In addition, he has been artistic director and principal conductor of Montreal's Orchestre Métropolitain since 2000. In 2017 he became the third-ever honorary member of the Chamber Orchestra of Europe. He served as music director of the Rotterdam Philharmonic from 2008 to 2018 (he is now honorary conductor) and was principal guest conductor of the London Philharmonic from 2008 to 2014. He has made wildly successful appearances with the world's most revered ensembles and at many of the leading opera houses.

Yannick has shown a deep commitment to expanding the repertoire by embracing an evergrowing and diverse group of today's composers and by performing the music of underappreciated composers of the past. In 2018 he signed an exclusive recording contract with Deutsche Grammophon. Under his leadership The Philadelphia Orchestra returned to recording with 14 releases on that label, including *Florence Price Symphonies Nos. 1 & 3*, which won a GRAMMY® Award for Best Orchestral Performance in 2022.

A native of Montreal, Yannick studied piano, conducting, composition, and chamber music at Montreal's Conservatory of Music and continued his studies with renowned conductors, most notably Carlo Maria Giulini; he also studied choral conducting with Joseph Flummerfelt at Westminster Choir College. Among Yannick's honors are an appointment as Companion of the Order of Canada; Companion to the Order of Arts and Letters of Quebec; an Officer of the Order of Quebec; an Officer of the Order of Montreal; an Officier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres; *Musical America*'s 2016 Artist of the Year; ECHO KLASSIK's 2014 Conductor of the Year; a Royal Philharmonic Society Award; Canada's National Arts Centre Award; the Prix Denise-Pelletier; the Oskar Morawetz Award; and honorary doctorates from the University of Quebec, the Curtis Institute of Music, Westminster Choir College of Rider University, McGill University, the University of Montreal, the University of Pennsylvania, Laval University, and Drexel University.

# Soloists



Martha Graham Cracker is famously "the tallest, hairiest drag queen in the world," and she performs regularly in Philadelphia and at Joe's Pub in New York with her very tight band. She has also performed at the Guthrie Theater, the Afterglow Festival in Provincetown, and the Oberon in Boston. She made her Philadelphia Orchestra debut at the 2022 Pride Concert. Her album of original songs, *Lashed but Not Leashed*, is available on all platforms. Her alter-ego, Dito van Reigersberg, is a co-founder of Pig Iron Theatre Company

and has performed in almost all of Pig Iron's productions since its founding, including the OBIE-winning original pieces *Hell Meets Henry Halfway* and *Chekhov Lizardbrain*. He also dreamed up Pig Iron's most recent endeavor, *Poor Judge*, a dance-theater cabaret based on the songs of Aimee Mann.



Tenor **Freddie Ballentine** made his Philadelphia Orchestra debut earlier this week. He was the 2021 recipient of the Kennedy Center's Marian Anderson Award and is an alumnus of both the Cafritz Young Artists of Washington National Opera and the Los Angeles Opera's Domingo-Colburn-Stein Young Artist Program. Highlights of the 2024–25 season include debuts with the New World Symphony and the Austin, Utah, and Detroit operas. He returns to Dutch National Opera for the world premiere of Philip Venables's

We Are the Lucky Ones, gives recitals with pianist Kunal Lahiry in Berlin and Seattle, and appears in concert with the Pacific Vocal Series in California. Next season he returns to the Metropolitan Opera as Sportin' Life in Gershwin's Porgy and Bess and makes his Bavarian State Opera debut as the Third Jew in Strauss's Salome.



Tenor **Stuart Skelton** is one of the finest heldentenors on the stage today. He made his Philadelphia Orchestra debut this past Sunday as the title role in Wagner's *Tristan and Isolde*, which he also sings with Marek Janowski and the Dresden Philharmonic this season. Other highlights include the title role in Wagner's *Parsifal* and Beethoven's *Missa solemnis* with Tokyo's NHK Symphony, Wagner's *Die Walküre* with the Sydney Symphony, and the first act of *Die Walküre* at the Teatro Comunale Bologna. His first solo album, *Shining* 

*Knight*, presents works by Wagner, Griffes, and Barber with Asher Fisch and the West Australian Symphony. His recording catalogue also includes *Tristan and Isolde* with Mr. Fisch and the West Australian Symphony and Janáček's *Glagolitic Mass* with Edward Gardner and the Bergen Philharmonic.

# Soloists



Baritone **Brian Mulligan** is renowned as an interpreter of classic works by Wagner and Strauss as well as the most challenging 20th- and 21st-century operas. He began his 2024–25 season in the title role of Wagner's *The Flying Dutchman* with the Radio Philharmonic Orchestra, returned to the Lyric Opera of Chicago as Don Pizarro in Beethoven's *Fidelio*, and made his role debut as the Wanderer in Wagner's *Siegfried* with the Hangzhou Philharmonic. He made his Philadelphia Orchestra debut earlier this week as Kurwenal

in Wagner's *Tristan and Isolde*. Other recent performance highlights include Wotan in Wagner's *Die Walküre* with Yannick Nézet-Séguin and the Rotterdam Philharmonic. A graduate of the Juilliard School, Mr. Mulligan was awarded a Richard Tucker Career Grant, a Sara Tucker Study Grant, and the George London Award.



Bass **Tareq Nazmi** made his Philadelphia Orchestra debut as King Marke in Wagner's *Tristan and Isolde* earlier this week; he also sings the role at the Grand Théâtre de Genève this season. Other season highlights include a house and role debut as Gremin in Tchaikovsky's *Eugene Onegin* at the Dresden Semperoper; a return as Gurnemanz in Wagner's *Parsifal* at the Tokyo Spring Festival; Verdi's Requiem with the Orchestra dell'Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia; and Pater Profundus in Mahler's Symphony No. 8 with the

Vienna Symphony. As a lieder singer he recently performed with pianist Gerold Huber at the Schubertiade Hohenems, in Munich and Cologne, and at London's Wigmore Hall. Mr. Nazmi began his career at the Opera Studio of the Bavarian State Opera, where he was a member of the Munich ensemble until 2016.



ANNA Crusis Feminist Choir is a trailblazing ensemble with a proud 50-year legacy as the longest-running feminist choir in the United States. Renowned for its powerful social justice–focused repertoire celebrating LGBTQ+ and marginalized communities, ANNA's diverse membership raises vibrant voices in solidarity. This acclaimed choir has graced stages across the tri-state area and as far as Cuba, performing alongside esteemed artists like Demi Lovato and Hugh Jackman. As founding members of both GALA

Choruses and the Sister Singers Network, ANNA amplifies the transformative impact of feminist and LGBTQ+ choral movements worldwide. ANNA's unwavering commitment to amplify underrepresented perspectives continues to inspire audiences and foster greater understanding through the universal language of song. Miriam Davidson has served as artistic director since 2012. In 2024 she was named an LGBTQ+ Power Player by *Metro Philadelphia*.
