

# VISITING THE KING'S THEATRE



You will be coming to see Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, a pantomime at the King's Theatre, Glasgow.

This is a different story from the film, so it might have some bits you don't know.

This is the King's Theatre, where Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs takes place.

It is on Bath Street in Glasgow.

You will see a Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs banner and posters outside.

# VISITING THE KING'S THEATRE



This is the main entrance to the theatre, where a staff member will check your e-tickets.

You may have to show them inside your bag. You may have to wait in a queue and it can be quite busy and noisy sometimes.



When you arrive, you will need to show your e-tickets to an usher.

An usher is someone who works for the theatre.

They will be wearing a white shirt with a striped black and white tie.



When you arrive, there will be people standing near the doors dressed in a black. These are security guards. They may need to look in your bag to make sure you are not carrying any alcohol or anything dangerous.

Don't be frightened of them, they are there to keep you safe!

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This is the Stalls Bar, where you can buy a drink or some snacks. It might be busy and crowded.



This is the Merchandise counter, where you can buy merchandise. It might be busy and crowded.

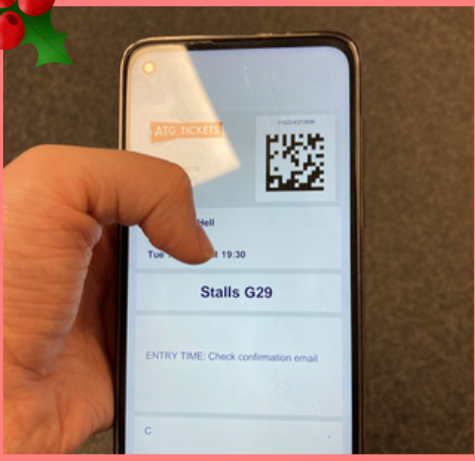


There are toilets at the theatre on all levels. If you need to use the toilet that's fine, just ask an usher to help you.

These are signs to show you where the toilets are.

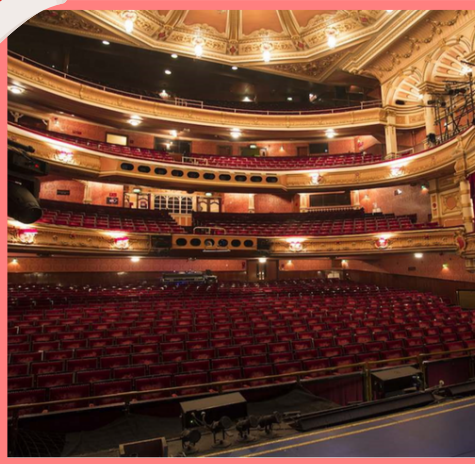


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You will need to use your e-ticket to find your seat.

Your ticket will tell you what level you are sitting on, the letter of the row that you are sitting in, and your seat number.



The inside of the theatre where the seats are is called the auditorium. It is very big and there are lots of seats.



You will need to use your e-ticket to find your seat. Your ticket will tell you what level you are sitting on, the letter of the row that you are sitting in, and your seat number.

When you reach the auditorium an usher will look at your tickets and tell you where your seats are.



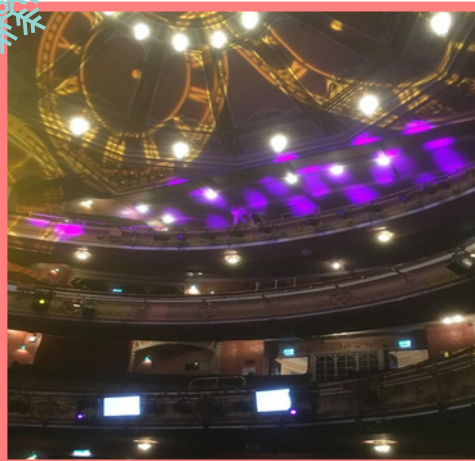
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This is the Stalls Level. It is on the ground floor of the auditorium. (You will need to go downstairs to get there).



This is the Dress Circle Level. It is the middle level of the auditorium (You will need to go upstairs to get there).



This is the Upper Circle level. You will need to go up lots of stairs to get there.

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When you get to your seats you can sit down and relax. There will be lots of other people sitting near you and it will be quite noisy. You can cover your ears if you want to.

The show lasts for approximately 2 hours including a 20 minute break in the middle which is called an 'interval'.



When it is time for the show to start you will hear a voice asking everyone to turn off their mobile phones. This voice will come from a speaker.

The theatre will get darker and everyone will be quiet. You will also need to be quiet as during the show.



The person on stage may ask you to clap, sing and dance. You are allowed to join in, but you don't have to if you don't want to. At the end of songs, the audience will probably clap.

You can join in if you want to, but you don't have to.

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There will be a break in the performance which will last 20 minutes.

You could use the toilet in this time, or buy a drink or some snacks.

There might be queues for the toilets and the kiosk and bars.



There will also be members of staff walking around with ice creams and programmes for sale.

There may be a queue.



After the interval, everyone will come back and sit down in their seats again.

It will get darker and quieter again just like at the beginning of the show.

The actors will come back on the stage and finish telling the story.



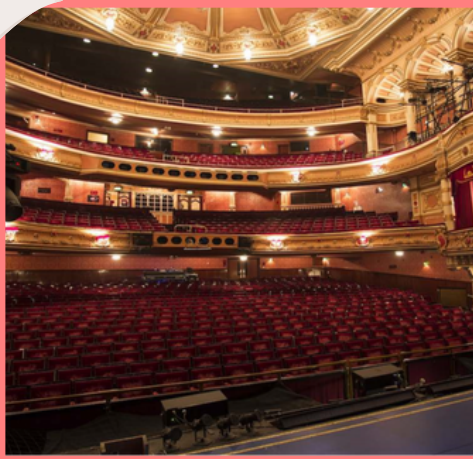
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At the end of the show, all of the actors will come out on stage and bow. People will clap so the actors know how much they liked the show.

They may also stand up to show they liked the show.

You can clap and stand up too, but you don't have to if you don't want to.



After this, the lights will come back up and you will leave the theatre.

You might not leave the same way that you came into the theatre.
