Comedienne Caroline Rhea goes for colors that put a smile on your face

ctress Caroline Rhea is known for her exuberant personality. This and her career in standup comedy, her own network talk show, and six years on Sabrina, the Teenage Witch have won the star a legion of fans. The most loyal may be Rhea's best friend, interior designer Amanda Nisbet—they have been pals since they were

both six. When Rhea took the leap and purchased her 4,500-square-foot home, she naturally chose Nisbet to decorate it. The two women share a passion for color. And Rhea has always loved her friend's sense of style. "The first time I realized she had good taste was when she stole my favorite magenta pencil in the fourth grade," says Rhea.

Left Rhea leads a hectic life, so she wanted relaxed furnishings, such as the breakfast room's distressed antique pieces. Their number one design priority was to create a bright environment that would welcome Rhea after hectic days in the limelight, and color was key. "I told Amanda that I wanted my home to be a haven in Los Angeles, because the city can be so challenging," remarks Rhea. "I wanted the bathrooms to be luxurious, and I wanted a closet that I could spin around in. The rest I left up to her, because she knows me so well."

hea was initially attracted to the home's easygoing Colonial-style architecture, "because it reminded me of the house where I grew up in Canada," she says. Nisbet, therefore, used the architecture as her starting point. "The house, built in 1922, had such good bones that I didn't need to do much structural work," says the designer. "It was mainly about adding color and fun for Caroline."

The kitchen and bathrooms had not been refurbished since 1973, so Nisbet began here, updating them with new, white beadboard cabinets in the kitchen and wainscoting in the bathrooms to amplify the home's Colonial charm. Fanciful roman fabric window shades printed with an oversize kiwifruit pattern echo the kitchen's green walls and lend the room a dash of whimsy. In the adjoining breakfast room, distressed purple and green chairs accompany

an old pine farm table with painted legs and an antique pine hutch.

Rhea loves having company, thus guest bedrooms were high on her wish list. One of the three guest bedrooms in the house sleeps four children; it's a space created with her two young nephews and godson, Travers, in mind. Soft lavender walls, garden gate-inspired single beds, and small-scale furniture produce a fresh, accessible retreat for her diminutive overnighters.

Because visitors are often in residence, Rhea asked Nisbet to make her own master suite a private sanctuary. The walls are painted a whispery periwinkle blue, and the mix of old and new furniture—including a carved









pine headboard with a warm, variegated patina—reflects Rhea's casual sense of style. "Caroline is not pretentious at all, so her bedroom and the whole house are unpretentious," says Nisbet. "She's a fun person: That was the crux of the design scheme, to keep it happy and to make it a wonderful place for her to come home to and entertain in."

abrics in the house, most of them designer, may be their most upbeat in the living room, where cerise, yellow, and white upholstery covers Barbara Barry sofas and chairs, and yellow-and-rose drapes cloak the windows.

Rhea collects fellow actor Martin Mull's paintings and can rarely resist porcelain—a passion handed down by her mother, Margery, who is an avid collector of British porcelain. A variety of shelves and niches in the main rooms means there are display spaces

to suit each of her pieces. In the living room, built-in bookcases are painted a crisp white to match wide crown molding. The walls are a bright mango hue. Varying shades of yellow, Caroline's favorite color, coat the dining room and sunroom walls.


Opposite To create a whimsical haven for Rhea's nephews and godson, Nisbet designed garden-gate headboards and kept the furniture small and low.

Above The guest bathroom, with its clawfoot tub and beadboard wainscoting, is a study in vintage appeal.





isbet varied her treatments of the many ceiling-height picture moldings on the first floor—painting them the same color as the walls in the living room to make the walls seem higher, trimming them in white in the sunroom and dining room for contrast.

Molding also decorates a banquette built into a niche in the hall separating dining room from sunroom. Above this seat is a glassless interior window that brings in light from the sunroom.

The sunroom light derives from a long bank of French doors and fixed transoms, which replace one small

"A good decorator makes you feel as though you've had a say in the design, even when you would not have chosen the things that were chosen," Rhea says of her friend's talent.

With a new television show in the works and a standup comedy tour on her plate in the coming year, Rhea is grateful to have such a soothing place to call home. "The house is really about tranquillity," she explains. "Things in life always resonate from childhood, I think, and when your best friend is decorating your home, it takes on an even greater degree of comfort."
