The Miami Design District is chock full of furniture showrooms and art galleries, but an addition to the neighborhood is an artful amalgam of both.

Avant Gallery, which owner Dmitry Prut moved from its Miami Beach location, is filled with rare vintage furniture, authorized limited edition furniture, contemporary art and chic lighting,

Prut, a limited edition collector himself, deems his offerings curated. The collecting bug bit him early, as he was fascinated with Cribs on MTV, the reality show featuring tours of celebrity homes. "I marveled at the beautiful homes, many of which highlighted collections," he says. "I learned of [designer] Verner Panton through the show. His vision blew me away."

Along with Panton lighting and furniture, the new store — 2½ times larger than the Miami Beach locale — will display carpets by Dima Loginoff; signed and numbered pieces by Marcel Wanders; and bathroom fixtures by Milanbased Rapsel, which includes a glow-inthe-dark sink and the Arne bathtub, inspired by Arne Jacobsen's Egg chair.

With prices ranging from \$250 for a sculpture to \$50,000 for his most

expensive chandelier, Prut calls his wares affordable luxury. "This year has been pretty scary in terms of what's going on in the world," he says. "I think the home is becoming a sanctuary from which to escape all of the negativity, and we offer furnishings that inspire a positive emotional connection in collectors."


