


GETAWAY

Antique footstools slide up to the tub to hold bars of chunky soap. OPPOSITE Janet and John Simonson remodeled a long and lean 25×9-foot sloping sunporch into a serene master bathroom. The classic freestanding tub sparkles in its position below a wall of windows. White wooden shutters easily control light and privacy.







FOR 15 YEARS, JANET AND JOHN SIMONSON LONGED

(and saved) for a spacious master bathroom in their 1912 Colonial Revival house in Menlo Park, California. Finally they took the plunge, transforming a rundown sunporch near their bedroom on the second floor. They hired a contractor to bring the space up-to-date, which included removing cracked vinyl flooring and replacing deteriorated Douglas fir floorboards with new ones. Original moldings and baseboards from other parts of the house were replicated to maintain architectural integrity. They kept the original windows for their wavy glass but replated the hardware. Janet stipulated that a pair of pedestal sinks be positioned

under the windows because she fondly remembers brushing her teeth while looking out windows in her grandmother's bathroom, which was configured in a similar way. Positioning the sinks there meant no surface to hang mirrors, so Janet purchased a pair of freestanding mirrors and placed them on either side of the sinks. ¶ The glass-encased shower also received studied attention. "Size is critical with a glass shower. If it's too large, cold air filters in. If it's too small, the glass doors will be difficult to keep clean," she says of the enclosure. A niche in the shower wall holds shampoos and soaps. ¶ After accessorizing the bath with warm antiques, Janet says, "It's not just about taking a bath anymore. It's about having a delightful experience."
