

Agriwater - Cleaning of irrigation system - BACTERIAL RESULTS

Technical Case Study - Ref 5.1.15



In Photo A, sections of the Agriwater treated and untreated irrigation pipes were placed on petri dishes. The left petri dish was from a treated pipe and had less bacterial growth and contamination compared to the untreated pipe on the right. The treated pipe in Photo B were also visually cleaner than the untreated pipe in Photo C. These results showed that the Agriwater treatment of water effectively cleaned the irrigation system.

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



Photo D compares the filters from the dripper lines. The Agriwater treated filter on the left showed hardly any bacterial film growth compared to the untreated filter on the right.
