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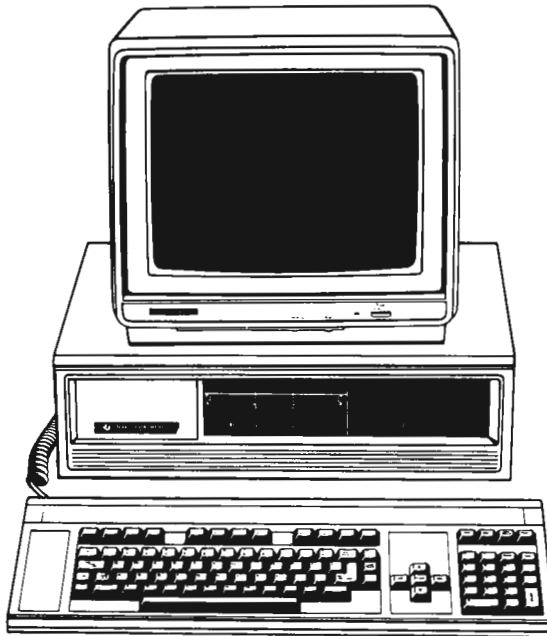
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THE WHITE ROCK MARATHON

14th Annual Dallas White Rock Marathon

The 14th running of the Dallas White Rock Marathon represented a new course, a new outlook and, in an Olympic year, new challenges for the largest marathon in Texas.

NEW COURSE

The 1983 race marked the start of a new era for the race. Since the race began in 1971 with 82 entrants and 61 finishers, White Rock Lake has been the focal point. Some years the course circled the lake twice, others three times. No matter where the race started or finished, the bulk of the running took place around the lake.

This year, in order to accommodate the increasing numbers, the start and finish were moved downtown to the City Hall plaza. The lake remained an integral part of the course, but no longer were faster runners lapping slower runners as they looped around White Rock.

The move required considerable coordination and planning on the part of the race officials, the city, the police and volunteers. In a city built around the automobile, running a marathon through several busy intersections was not an easy task. But it was accomplished

THE HILLS

There is, of course, no way to reach the lake from downtown and return without encountering some hills. Miles 9-10 were tough, but miles 21-23 on the return trip were even tougher. What once was one of the fastest and easiest marathon courses in the United States has been transformed into a very challenging course.

THE NUMBERS

A record 3,636 runners entered



the race, eclipsing last year's mark of 3,559. There were 2,851 finishers, including 2,457 men and 394 women.



THE WINNERS

Kyle Heffner came into the race a heavy favorite to become only the third male to win two Dallas White Rock Marathon titles. Terry Ziegler did it in 1974 and 1975, and John Lodwick turned the trick in 1977 and 1982. Heffner won the race in 1979 in a then-course record 2:14:30. That race was his springboard to national prominence as he posted a 2:10:54 at the Olympic Trials five months later to gain the third spot on the U.S. team that stayed home because of the boycott. Shooting for a berth on the 1984 Olympic squad, Heffner returned to marathoning after a 2-year absence and conquered the new course in 2:13:48, easily out-

distancing Jari Hemmila, a Finnish runner from Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, Okla., who posted a 2:16:10. Porfirio Huerta of Mexico was third in 2:19:08.

Sue Moen was a surprise winner in the women's race. A surprise to everyone running and watching, and a surprise to herself as well. Moen started out in fifth place behind Kathy Pfeifer, Barbara Collinsworth, Bev DeHart and Flora Leon. But the frontrunners started to fall by the wayside and Moen eventually reeled in Pfeifer at 21 miles to take the lead for good. She came home in a personal best 2:49:54. Carol Greene was second in 2:59:18 and Diane Porteous was third in 3:02:16.

SUPER Z

Terry Ziegler hasn't won White Rock since 1975, when he accomplished his unduplicated feat of back-to-back victories, but he's still out there running — fast. The 33-year-old Ziegler finished this year's race in 2:28:24 to place 15th overall. Incidentally, his winning time 9 years ago was 2:26:07. Terry may be slowing down, but not much.

WHO WAS THAT MASKED MAN?

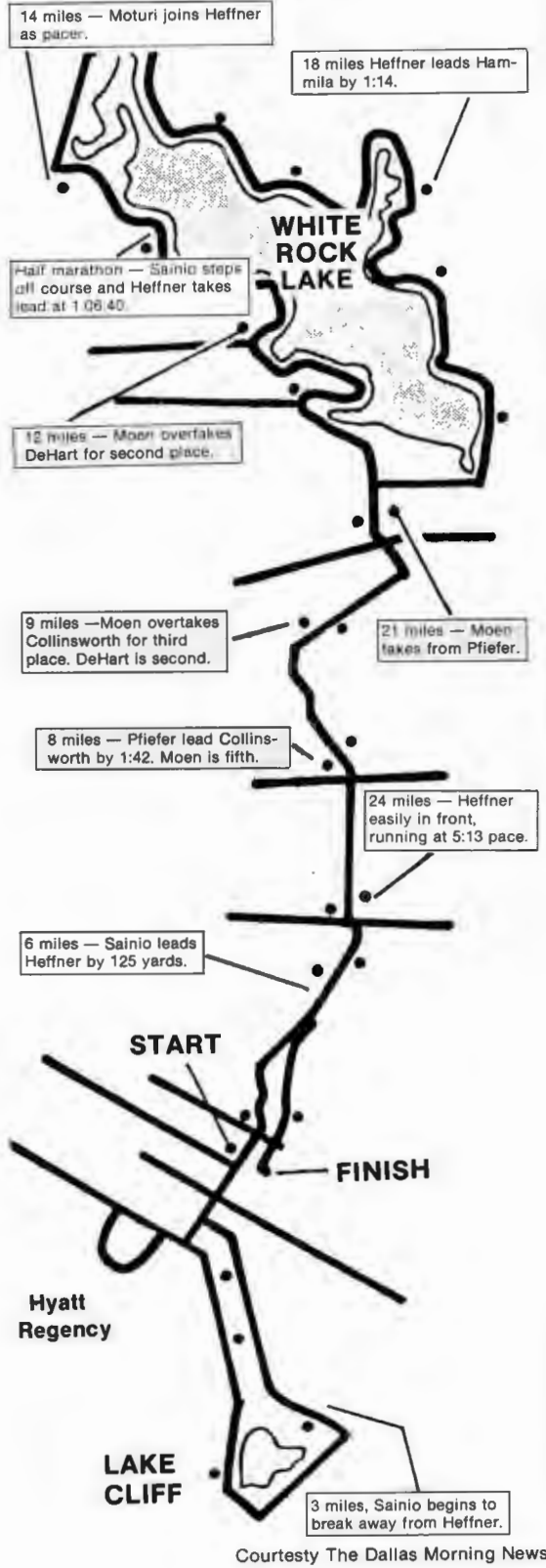
Although the 29-year-old Heffner was the heavy pre-race favorite, he spent the first half of the race chasing a mysterious runner who set a hot pace. Too hot, in fact, for Heffner, who stayed with the runner through a 5:03 first mile but eventually let him break away at three miles. Tuomo Sainio was the mystery man's name, although very few people, including Heffner, had any idea who he was. Sainio, a 21-year-old Finn from ORU, built a lead of about 125 yards, held that through the half-

marathon mark, which he passed in 1:05:25, and then he suddenly stepped off the course. A surprised Heffner passed the smiling Sainio at the midway point. With Ben Moturi, who had joined him at 12 miles, as a pacer, Heffner proceeded to knock off miles at a 5:05 pace. He went through 18 in 1:31:23, 20 in 1:41:34 and 21 in 1:41:34 before slowing to a 5:17 pace on the hills. He was picking up speed when he went through 25 at 2:07:22.

MOEN 'EM DOWN

Moen came into the race with but one thing on her mind and winning wasn't it. At 33, Moen believed this was her last chance to make the Olympic Trials. She needed a 2:51:16 or better to achieve that goal and it didn't matter to her whether she won or finished back in the pack as long as she made the qualifying time, something she had failed to do in several previous attempts. She set her pace at just under 6:30 per mile and stuck with it. Nothing fancy. Just steady running. She was right on target when she hit 10 miles at 1:04:08. At the half she was 1:23:29, and at 20 she was 2:08:11 and on her way. She couldn't believe it as she passed all the favorites and eventually took the lead, the victory and a trip to the Trials.

NEW FACES, NEW PLACES

The race marked the debut of Daniel M. Millet as director. The new course, with all its logistical problems, proved to be quite a challenge, but Millet and his army of volunteers tamed the beast and turned the race into a showcase for the city.

SAY, WASN'T THAT . . .

Yes, that was Johnny A. Kelley, the grand old man of Boston Marathon fame. Kelley was in town for testing at the Aerobics Center, so he decided to run half the race. His 1:42:50 was an unofficial record for men 76 years old.

JUST WILD ABOUT HARRY

Harry Cordellos, the world's fastest blind marathoner, made a return appearance at White Rock. Cordellos, who first ran White Rock in 1977, completed the distance in 3:29:40 with the assistance of first-time marathoner Bill Jones.





KYLE HEFFNER

Kyle and White Rock have a long association dating back to the very first race in 1971. That was Heffner's first marathon and the Richardson High School sophomore struggled to a 3:26 finish. He returned while running for Texas A&M and eventually as a graduate student at North Texas State University. A member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic marathon team, Heffner felt frustrated at not having had the opportunity to compete in the Games. He has started training for the Olympic Trials and used the Dallas White Rock Marathon to put him back in the racing scene. It was his first marathon in two years. The 29-year-old Heffner is employed as an exercise physiologist at the Las Colinas Preventive Medicine Clinic. His splits were:

JARI HEMMILA

Jari had been trying to make it to White Rock for the past three years but something always had prevented him from making the trip. One year he didn't feel in good enough shape, another year he was injured. Finally he decided to take the plunge and come down from Tulsa, where he is a senior at Oral Roberts University. In his first attempt at the marathon he claimed second place. He plans to

return to his native Finland and try to make the Olympics in either the 5,000 or 10,000. His final time was 2:16:10.

PORFIRO HUERTA

Porfirio had been a very busy runner the 12 months prior to White Rock. In that time the 29-year-old Mexican had run Houston-Tenneco, Boston and New York. He then came to Dallas and finished third. A member of the Rodolfo Gomez Track Club, Huerta has hopes of making the Mexican Olympic team in the marathon. His final time was 2:19:08.

MIKE NOVELLI

A former All-American at Rice University, Novelli was running his first marathon. The 26-year-old investment associate for InterFirst



Venture Corporation in Dallas had trained over the course and knew it was tough, and he was correct. The course was just tough enough to keep him from making the Olympic qualifying standard of 2:19:04 by a mere 18 seconds. His fourth-place time was 2:19:22.

SUE MOEN

Sue runs best in very cool weather, so she entered White Rock and a marathon in St. Louis on the same day in hopes one or the other would have the right con-



ditions for her to make the Olympic qualifying standard of 2:51:16, which had eluded her through several previous races. She even called up a Dallas weatherman seeking inside information. Finally she chose Dallas. It was the right choice as she made qualifying time and cracked the 2:50 barrier. Her winning time was 2:49:54. Her splits were:

1 mile 10 miles 20 miles Finish
6:20 1:04:08 2:08:11 2:49:54

CAROL GREENE

At 31, Carol was in this race simply to claim a PR. She got it, but it left her wobbly. She set her goal at 2:57, but she wasn't complaining when she crossed the finish line more than two minutes slower than that. Carol battled a serious side stitch at 18 miles that wasn't helped much by the hills at 21-23. Her final time was 2:59:18.

DIANE PORTEOUS

Diane made the trip from Toronto, Ontario, just for the race. "Hey, it was either here or Huntsville, Ala.," she said. It was her first marathon and she had set three hours as her goal. She came awfully close for a first-timer with her third-place time of 3:02:16. At one point, Diane was in 14th position among the women. "This made the trip worthwhile," she said.

Dallas White Rock Marathon

In this the 14th running of the Dallas White Rock Marathon, the race is Texas' largest and nationally renowned as one of the 10 best organized in the nation. The present course is the 5th variation using the scenic environs of White Rock Lake.

1971

March 6, 1971. The inaugural White Rock saw 82 entrants including 2 women to the starting line. Following a course which circled the lake twice (11.1 miles each loop) and then down 2 miles and back, Little Rock, Arkansas school teacher Ricky Richardson outdistanced Wayne Comer of Houston 2:38:09 to 2:40:11. The noon starting time saw cool temperatures melt away and the famous White Rock winds buffet the runners. Nevertheless 61 runners finished. Annabelle Corboy was the only woman finisher with a time of 4:12:25. Twenty-three runners bettered 3:30 with eight going under 3 hours.

1972

March 4, 1972, Noon saw 143 entrants greeted by a starting temperature in the lower 60's and a 15 mph wind. North Texas State's Paul Hoffman, running an even paced run, blasted to a 2:23:18. At age 19, Paul's run was one of the best at that time ever run by an American Junior. Gary Tuttle, to later set American records at 10 miles, 20 km, and 1 hour, held off



fast-closing Wayne Comer 2:28:13 to 2:28:54. Four of the women finished with Terry Stansky at 3:49:29 leading the way. 109 finished with 46 runners beating 3:30 and 21 cracking 3 hours.

1973

March 3, 1973. Warm weather pushing temperatures to about 70° greeted the 155 runners in the 3rd White Rock Marathon. Wayne Comer, twice a bridesmaid, easily outdistanced the field finishing over 6 minutes ahead of Ronnie Hess in the time of 2:37:45. Four women finished led by Patti Price at 4:27:45. Thirty-three of the 107 finishers slipped under 3:30 and 14 cracked 3 hours.

1974

February 23, 1974. A new starting time of 9:00 a.m. and a new course partially necessitated by



destruction of a part of the lake road greeted 159 runners. Temperatures were in the low 40's and the famous White Rock winds were quiet until about 10:30. Terry Ziegler and Don Kennedy came through the first of three loops at a sub 2:14 pace. At 10 miles they were 51:00 and 51:01. Slowly pulling away, Ziegler came home in 2:19:18 with Kennedy at 2:21:34. Kathy Loper led the three women finishers with 3:13:48. Eighty-three of the 125 finishers were under 3:30 and 34 bettered 3 hours. For Ziegler it marked his 12th marathon and 6th victory, but this one thrust the Oklahoman into national prominence with his first sub 2:20.



1975

February 22, 1975. The cold winds blew and the rain came down in buckets to greet 219 starters. Terry Ziegler repeated as champion with a time of 2:26:07. Mike Albert with a strong finish edged Hank Pfeifle 2:27:43 to 2:28:19. Kathy Loper defending her women's title splashed to 3:00:54 as ten women finished in this Aquathon. Overall 167 runners finished with 123 bettering 3:30 and 46 sneaking in under 3 hours. Dorothy Doolittle, later in the year to run the 10th fastest marathon ever run by a woman (2:51:22), showed her promise with a 3:09:47.

1976

February 21, 1976. A cloudless "Norther" provided 50° weather, but stronger winds again conspired to deny the 240 entrants a perfect day. Don Kennedy was unchallenged from the start and opened up an early lead at the 1/3 point and maintained that margin until he eased in at 2:25:59. Roger Vann ran an even paced 2:26:50 for second place. Dorothy Doolittle, seemingly unaffected by the winds, shattered Kathy Loper's course record with a 2:53:43, leading the 14 women finishers. Overall, 178 finishers with 128 under 3:30 and 56 under 3 hours maintained the course's reputation as fast.

1976

December 4, 1976. The 7th time was a charm, but it came with numerous changes and innovations. The Aerobics Center of Dallas joined the Cross Country Club of Dallas in sponsoring the growing race. Greg Pape, the race director, determined that the first

Saturday in December was historically good marathon weather and the decision was made to switch to that date. 300 marathoners toed the line and were started by the Mayor of Dallas, Robert Folsom. The runners responded to perfect weather (50°; winds under 5 mph) with fantastic times. Jeff Wells of Dallas exploded on the national scene with a sparkling 2:15:11, nosing out his roommate at Dallas Theological Seminary John Lodwick, who was close behind the entire way at 2:16:23. Clint Mericle and Kyle Heffner battled to 2:23:16 and 2:23:39 for 3rd and 4th places. The ladies winner, Jean Ohly of Southern Illinois University, ran 3:07:26 to lead the way for 23 women finishers. The 250 finishers showed 176 bettering 3:30 with 76 under 3:00.

1977

50° at the 9 a.m. start sounds great, but at noon 76° and a 15 mph south wind had played April Fool in December on the 909 marathoners. John Lodwick ran away with an easy 2:16:43 victory with Tom Marino at 2:20:29 and Ron Tabb at 2:22:01 foretelling future success for both. Meanwhile Mari-



anne Pugh and Penny DeMoss led the women with 2:56:55 and 2:56:58. These two ladies were never to be more than a few yards apart and ended in a sprint at the finish.

1978

Race Director Dale Hager saw 2404 marathoners answer the gun in 70° muggy, cloudy conditions. SMU's Tom Marino in true White Rock tradition captured the victory after a 2nd place finish in 1977. Tom's winning time was comfortably ahead of Ed Leddy running for the Adidas Running Club in 2:18:55 to 2:20:26. Karen Bridges of Oklahoma State took more than 5 minutes off the previous ladies record with her 2:48:36. In all, 1825

finishers including 155 women would complete Texas' largest marathon.

1979

2608 starters were treated to perfect conditions at the Tenth White Rock Marathon as Race Director James Thruston sent the runners out into cool, 37°, dry, 40%, and calm, 6 mph weather. Kyle Heffner of Dallas, who would later finish third at the Olympic Trials at Buffalo, New York in 2:10:54, blazed a Texas record 2:14:30. Kyle never led until he caught Fred Torneden at 25 miles. Fred, who finished in



2:14:51 after a "breakaway" from 16 to 19 miles, had led until Kyle's strong finish caught him. Their times both broke Jeff Wells' 1976 record time of 2:15:11. Toni Bernhard of Houston led the 204 women finishers in another new record of 2:47:31. Second place went to Kathleen Whitcomb in 2:50:03 as five women bested three hours.

In all 2144 finishers (including the legendary Arthur Lydiard) representing 82% of the field ran the classic distance. The Tenth White Rock Marathon closed out the 1970's, a decade of excellence, as seven men were under 2:20 and 310 men and women were under three hours.

1980

With 2755 entrants for the 26 mile sauna (temp. 65°; hum. 90%) 2199 finishers (241 women) were a testament to the perseverance of the hardy.

Omaha's Robert Wallace, a 29 year old Australian born runner,

blasted a 2:15:19, 5 minutes better than Ben Moturi and Juan Zetina, NTSU teammates from Kenya and Mexico, at 2:20:24 and 2:20:29. This was the first time that White Rock was captured by foreign invasion.

In the women's race, Martha Sartain, increasing her pace as she went, took over 6 minutes off the prior women's record with her 2:41:14. Karlene Erickson, 15, the leader until 11 miles, was second at 2:49:16 with Hope Wilson third at 2:50:46.

Despite the formidable weather 21 runners were under 2:30 and 284 were under 3:00 including 6 women.

1981

Great expectations and shattered dreams were to be the history for the 12th edition of White Rock. A crisp 44° greeted the 9 a.m. starting gun. Ben Moturi of Kenya and NTSU-ex appeared to have the race locked up after running away from the field with splits of 50:12 at 10 and 1:41:51 at 20 but former team mate Juan Zetina who was 71 seconds back at 15 seemed to

claim apparent victory when he took the lead at 24 only to be run down by OU's David Miley with 1/2 mile to go. Miley would stretch out to a 18-second margin 2:16:12 to 2:16:30. Zetina's show was the closest 1-2 finish in "Rock" history. Moturi after a bout with cramps at 24 claimed 3rd in 2:18:00.

Julie Brown flew in from California, flew through the course in 2:33:39 and flew home all in the same morning. Her time took over 7 1/2 minutes off Martha Sartain's 1980 record. Glenys Quick of New Zealand, running her first marathon, ran 2:35:23 for 2nd. Third went to OU junior Kellie Cathey who ran 2:28:39 with negative splits. These women's times were the 1st, 2nd and 3rd fastest in W.R. history.

New number records in all categories were 3086 entrants and 2446 finishers (including 320 women). The once exclusive sub-3 hour club was opened to 320 men and women.

1982

The White Rock Marthon welcomed home two of its favorite

sons for the 13th edition of the race, which was held under clear sky with cool temperatures and little wind. John Lodwick, a Dallas native and the winner of the 1977 race, and Jeff Wells, the winner of the December 1976 race, returned to Dallas from Eugene, Ore., where both serve as assistant pastors at the Calvary Baptist Church. Lodwick set a blistering pace and eventually wore down Wells and the rest of the 3,559 entrants as he sailed to a course-record 2:12:18.

Joe Sheeran surprised everyone by finishing second in 2:15:11, with Fred Torneden taking third in 2:15:20. Carol Urish led White Rock's largest women's field (455) to the finish line, overtaking Betsey Haydock at 23 miles and posting a 2:47:21 for her first marathon. Haydock was second in 2:50:38 and Sue Moen was third in 2:52:46. There were 2,787 finishers, including 343 women. Mary-Jac Witherpoon became the youngest female finisher in the race's history at age 9. She completed the course in 5:03:39.
