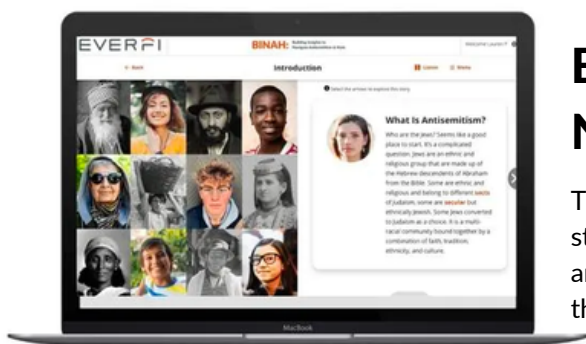
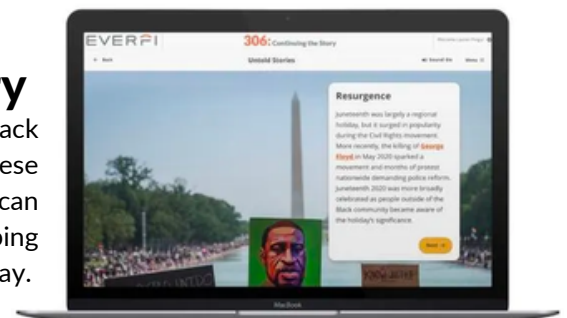


## 306 - African American History

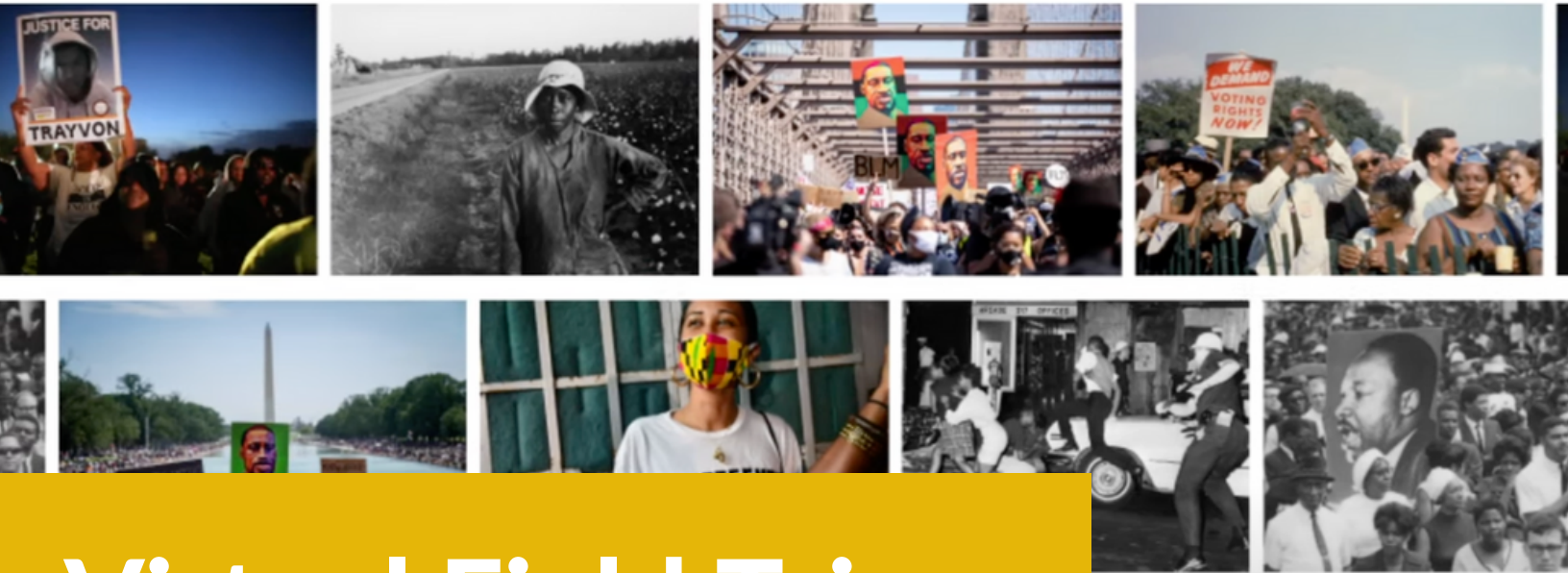


## BINAH: Building Insights to Navigate Antisemitism & Hate
