

Never connect or disconnect the external power supply while the primary circuit is connected to live parts.

Never connect the ouptut to any equimement with a common mode voltage to earth greater than 30 V.

Always wear protective clothing and gloves if hazardous live parts are present in the installation where the measurement is carried out.

This transducer is a built-in device, not intended to be cleaned with any product. Nevertheless if the user must implement cleaning or washing process, validation of the cleaning program has to be done by himself.

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Definition of typical, minimum and maximum values

Minimum and maximum values for specified limiting and safety conditions have to be understood as such as well as values shown in "typical" graphs.

On the other hand, measured values are part of a statistical distribution that can be specified by an interval with upper and lower limits and a probability for measured values to lie within this interval.

Unless otherwise stated (e.g. "100 % tested"), the LEM definition for such intervals designated with "min" and "max" is that the probability for values of samples to lie in this interval is 99.73 %.

For a normal (Gaussian) distribution, this corresponds to an interval between -3 sigma and +3 sigma. If "typical" values are not obviously mean or average values, those values are defined to delimit intervals with a probability of 68.27 %, corresponding to an interval between -sigma and +sigma for a normal distribution.







Figure 3: Total error in temperature






Figure 2: Supply current function of temperature




Figure 4: Electrical offset thermal drift




Figure 6: Typical linearity error at 25 °C




Figure 7: Detail of typical common mode perturbation (1000 V step with 6 kV/µs, $R_{\rm M}$ = 100 Ω)




Figure 9: Gain function of frequency




Figure 8: Typical step response (0 to 1000 V)






Figure 10: Phase shift function of frequency

To calculate the total output RMS noise in a frequency band f1 to f2, the formula is:


 $\sqrt{(171 \times 10^{-6})^2 - (78 \times 10^{-6})^2} = 152 \,\mu\text{V}$

with $U_{no}(f)$ read from figure 12 (typical, RMS value).

Example:

What is the total output RMS noise from 100 to 1 kHz? Figure 12 gives $U_{no}(100 \text{ Hz}) = 5 \text{ mV}$ and $U_{no}(1 \text{ kHz}) = 30 \text{ mV}$. Therefore, the total output RMS noise voltage referred to primary is 30 mV.

Terms and definitions

Simplified transducer model

This model is valid for primary voltage $U_{\rm p}$ between $-U_{\rm p}$ max and $+U_{\rm p}$ max only.

This is the absolute maximum error. As all errors are independent, a more realistic way to calculate the error would be to use the following formula:



Total error referred to primary


The total error $\varepsilon_{\rm tot}$ is the error at $\pm U_{\rm P\,N},$ relative to the rated value $U_{\rm P\,N}.$

It includes all errors mentioned above

- the electrical offset $U_{\rm O\,E}$
- the sensitivity error ε_s
- the linearity error ε_{I} (to U_{PN}).

Using the voltage cycle shown in previous figure, the electrical offset voltage $U_{\rm O\ E}$ is the residual output referred to primary when the input voltage is zero.

The temperature variation $U_{{\rm O}\,\tau}$ of the electrical offset voltage

$$U_{\rm OE} = \frac{U_{\rm P(3)} + U_{\rm P(5)}}{2}$$

 $U_{\rm O~E}$ is the variation of the electrical offset from 25 °C to the considered temperature.

Sensitivity and linearity

$$U_{\mathsf{O}T}(T) = U_{\mathsf{O}E}(T) - U_{\mathsf{O}E}(25^{\circ}\mathsf{C})$$

To measure sensitivity and linearity, the primary voltage (DC) is cycled from 0 to $U_{\rm p}$ then to $-U_{\rm p}$ and back to 0 (equally spaced $U_{\rm p}/10$ steps). The sensitivity *S* is defined as the slope of the linear regression line for a cycle between $\pm U_{\rm PN}$.

The linearity error $\varepsilon_{\rm L}$ is the maximum positive or negative difference between the measured points and the linear regression line, expressed in % of $U_{\rm PN}$.

Delay times

The delay time $t_{D 10}$ @ 10 % and the delay time $t_{D 90}$ @ 90 % with respect to the primary are shown in the next figure. Both slightly depend on the primary voltage dv/dt.

They are measured at nominal voltage.




Figure 15: delay time $t_{D 10}$ @ 10 % and delay time $t_{D 90}$ @ 90 %.


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

Rail DIN mounting

1. Place DVC on DIN rail adaptor support respecting the **2 Poka-Yoke** features



- 2. Tighten the 2 PT screws from the adaptor kit (torque = 0.4 N·m ±20 %)
- 3. Place DIN rail lower edge inside DIN rail adaptor support lower notch
- 4. Help the blue spring lock to move up with a flat screwdriver
- 5. Then **rotate** transducer to place it on the rail




- 6. When placed, relax the force applied with screwdriver
- 7. Manually test that transducer is well fixed.

Remarks

- $I_{\rm S}$ is positive when $U_{\rm HV+}$ $U_{\rm HV-}$ > 0 V
- The primary cables have to be routed together all the way (< 30 m)
- The secondary cables also have to be routed together all the way
- Installation of the transducer must be done unless otherwise specified on the datasheet, according to LEM Transducer Generic Mounting Rules.
