International export controls and sanctions have a global reach. They apply to products, technology, 'know how', software and materials when they are moved around the world, affecting academic institutions as well as companies.

Regulatory compliance is never a popular subject, not least with research staff who rightly place a high value on academic freedom. But, as universities expand their research partnerships overseas, the risks of breaching export controls or sanctions need to be taken seriously.

On top of potentially heavy financial and criminal penalties, violation can inflict severe reputational damage and lead to pressure on universities to curtail overseas links, with serious consequences for research partnerships, funding and overseas student and staff recruitment.

Challenges for universities

- Controls can apply to international exchanges of research **before** it is published, a fact many are unaware of.
- Narrowly-defined areas of work in certain disciplines are subject to controls; identifying projects to which controls apply requires expertise.
- Controls apply to exports of hardware items and to 'invisible transfers' of software and technology or 'know how'.
- Particular risks lie with activities that are not readily captured by routine processes— for example, informal exchanges with former foreign students, precontract collaborative work, or staff downloading data from UK servers while overseas.
- The increasing scale of research partnerships with China at a time of heightened political sensitivities over China's access to Western technology and critical infrastructure has presented additional risks for many universities.
