THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND ARE APPARENTLY WORKING ON THIS, BUT IT HAS BEEN UNDER DISCUSSION FOR AT LEAST FIFTY YEARS SO IN THE MEANTIME WE HOPE YOU ENJOY OUR NEW MAY DAY BANK HOLIDAY SLOT. SINCE 2006 WE HAVE NOT USED THE SAME FESTIVAL HUB TWICE, AND 2019 IS NO EXCEPTION - FROM WEDNESDAY 1 MAY YOU CAN FIND US BENEATH THE ARCHES JUST BEYOND THE CUSTARD FACTORY, DISHING OUT BEVERAGES AND SHOWING FILMS (SEE OVER FOR MORE INFO).



BOX OFFICE ONLY COVERS A SMALL PART OF THIS WORK. AND NONE OF IT WOULD BE POSSIBLE WITHOUT OUR SUPPORTERS - IN PARTICULAR ARTS COUNCIL ENGLAND, THE BRITISH FILM INSTITUTE AND BIRMINGHAM CITY UNIVERSITY, FLATPACK IS A CHARITY, AND OUR JOB IS TO BRING PEOPLE TOGETHER, GROW IDEAS AND MAKE THE WEST MIDLANDS A MORE INTERESTING PLACE TO BE. 



OXIDE GHOSTS + Q&A

Wednesday 1 May, 18:00 - 19:30 The Electric \cdot £ 10.00 / £ 8.00

Dir: Michael Cumming, UK 2017, 60 mins

Whether it was risking life and limb asking actual drug dealers for "clarky cat" or persuading an army of celebrities to campaign against the dangers of cake ("a made-up drug"), Chris Morris' 1997 series Brass Eye turned television on its head. Incurring a deluge of complaints and legal threats, much of the show's background has since remained shrouded in myth. This fascinating collage of outtakes helps to pull back the veil, pieced together by Brass Eye director Michael Cumming from hundreds of hours of behind-the-scenes material including a never-broadcast phone interview with Reggie Kray. After the screening Cumming will take part in a Q&A hosted by Stewart Lee.

KING ROCKER - Stewart Lee & The Nightingales

Currently on a breather between stand-up tours, Stewart Lee has resisted the lure of idleness and decided to make a film tribute to the Black Country's unsung post-punk heroes The Nightingales. King Rocker will capture the sights, the sounds, the smells of a hard-working rock band, and ponder on the parallels between frontman Robert Lloyd and Birmingham's neglected fibreglass icon King Kong. The full film won't be finished until later this year, but tonight for the first time you can enjoy a 20-minute teaser alongside a short set by Stewart and a discussion with Lloyd, Lee, director Michael Cumming and producer James Nicholls.



JOSEPHINE FOSTER

Now Flatpack is not strictly a music festival, but when the stars align and certain performers are available during our dates then we'll happily flag down the tour bus and see what's possible. Such is the case with Josephine Foster, a one-of-a-kind singer-songwriter whose creative purple patch has continued with her most recent double album, Faithful Fairy Harmony. Foster's Colorado background included operatic training and funeral singing, and her otherworldly voice remains the central thread in a zigzag trajectory that has taken in twisted folk, Lorca poetry, old-time ballads and Schubert lieder. This special solo set is one of a handful of UK dates, and will be preceded by an afternoon screening of Black Moon chosen especially for the festival and introduced by Foster herself (see p.29).



BERMINGHAM: THE (NOT ENTIRELY) TRUE STORY

OF A MISSPELT CITY

If whilst undertaking research into a city you misspell its name, does that give you free rein to ride roughshod over its true history? Greg McLeod thinks so. In his first solo exhibition, the BAFTA-award winning animator and illustrator attempts to create 1000 illustrations of Birmingham, the city in which he grew up. But all is not quite what it seems... each image has a corresponding title, but you may want to think twice before taking the labels as gospel. Along with his illustrations adorning the walls in Centrala, a new film will play on a loop in the gallery - an animated documentary charting the [un]true history of the city. The exhibition will run throughout the festival, but a special opening with DJs Matt and McGill providing the soundtrack will take place on Friday 3 May between 18:00 - 22:00.

Running concurrently with the show at Centrala, is the sister exhibition Bermingham: Remixed at the Parkside Gallery. Taking inspiration from Greg's illustrations, the exhibition is made up of works by Viscom students at Birmingham City University. Greg's BAFTA-nominated short Marfa will also be on show.



LET'S MAKE A MOVIE

Like many a young teenager, Richard Soames had ambitions to be the next Spielberg, with his remake of *The Matrix* and the slightly more cost-effective version of the Samuel L Jackson vehicle, Snakes in a Car. Sadly for him, Soames never made it to Hollywood, but those old films he made with his brother in their salad days have resurfaced and formed the basis for this live show in which he somehow manages to make a movie within an hour. Funny, clever, and with a hint of familial melodrama thrown in, this theatre-performance-cum-standup-show-cum-filmshoot is a total charmer.



FATHERS

A short film, a live performance piece, and a reading make up this triple bill on the theme of paternity. Celebrated Canadian filmmaker Mike Hoolboom kicks things off with 27 Thoughts About My Father, a contemplative short film made up of vignettes exploring memories of his late dad. Gareth Courage's brand new performance piece 469 DOF - Europe Through the Windscreen then gets its world premiere. Using various ephemera from his father's trips to Europe in the early 1960s in his Austin Mini, the piece uses elements of sound, motion graphics and film to reflect and explore aspects of Birmingham's social and industrial heritage whilst also revealing timely insights into early European integration. To finish, writer and academic Caleb Klaces reads from his forthcoming debut novel Fatherhood (Prototype Publishing) which follows the tender rhythms of the relationship between a father and an infant daughter. A verse fiction about hamsters, natural disasters and parental love, it is an experiment in rewriting masculinity.





INVISIBLE CINEMA

Eight years on from its debut outing at Flatpack 2011, this enduringly popular ramble through Birmingham's celluloid past returns in a new iteration. At the peak of filmgoing during the 1940s the city boasted over 100 picturehouses, and Ben Waddington (Still Walking) plots a path through the city centre pointing out some of the architectural remnants of this boom, now half-hidden behind the facade of a shisha lounge, an amusement arcade or a car park. For this specially extended edition, Ben concludes the walk with the newly discovered lost Walk of Stars. We're delighted to welcome to Flatpack bento artist Mari Miyazawa who will be running two workshops demonstrating how to create Character Bento - the art of turning traditional Japanese lunch boxes into fun, edible characters. Originally a creative ploy by parents desperate to get their kids interested in food, the art of animated bento has become something of an obsession in Japan - and we can see why. We'd have traded in our Frubes and Dairylea Dunkers for rice pandas and katsu rabbits any day of the week. Please note that the 12:30 workshop is intended for younger participants (recommended age 7+, and children must be accompanied by an adult), and the 16:30 workshop is intended for adults.

WE TALKED TO THEM ABOUT KONG, CANNOCK AND CULT STATUS.



How did you end up making a film about The Nightingales?

Stewart Lee: I liked The Nightingales as a teenager, and was thrilled when they reformed in 2004. Rob Lloyd the singer asked me to support them back then and I got to know him. He asked me about making a documentary about the band, and did I think it was a good idea. About two years ago I heard that the director Michael Cumming, who I had worked with on the pilot of Stewart Lee's Comedy Vehicle and a live dvd, was a big Nightingales fan, so I asked him if we should do it together and it went from there. I think I have a plan for the story of the film that I can't quite explain until the footage is there... We don't want it to be just talking heads like all the other rock docs.

Michael Cumming: I found a list of proposed documentary subjects I had written for the BBC in 1988, I was amazed to find that the four subjects were: Ivor Cutler, Ted Chippington, Jake Thackray and...Robert Lloyd & The Nightingales. All rejected, obviously, but it was clearly meant to be.

What happens if the band get belatedly plunged into the mainstream because of King Rocker?

MC: I think the mainstream for The Nightingales is about as likely as me directing Mrs Brown's Boys, but I would love to introduce a wider audience to the band and help them flog some more

SL: Maybe they will get some big fees to appear at middle-class outdoor summer festivals, which will be more in one go than they earned in four decades. And at least there will be some evidence of them. Everyone loves them and wants to help. There's no pop music pot of gold any more anyway.

In his interview Frank Skinner reflects on the mutual envy between commercially successful star and cult hero. Are you any clearer on which is best?

SL: I have had it both ways. I am a commercially successful act but most people have never heard of me. Rob Lloyd seems to want recognition but hates all the compromises it would be necessary to make to achieve it. That's sort of what the film is shaping up to

Nicholas Monro's Kong statue plays an important role, a totem of Birmingham's inability to value its own cultural treasures. Where do you think this comes from?

SL: I don't know. But it seems insane that there isn't a BIRMINGHAM MUSEUM OF METAL full of Led Zep. Black Sabbath, Napalm Death, Judas Priest, Move, Idle Race, Hard Meat, ELO memorabilia. Metal is a religion in the USA and the basis of much of its popular culture and it all started here. Imagine the tourist revenue.

MC: I notice that Wolverhampton now has a 'Music Wall of Fame' and that some of the people on it have fairly tenuous connections with the town. Are The Nightingales - a band whose lead singer and lyricist was born in Cannock and who are largely now based in Wolverhampton - on that wall? They are not. As Bernard Manning once said... 'It's a fucking disgrace'.

Michael - it's slightly terrifying to realise that Brass Eye is over 20 years old. Why do you think it still resonates?

MC: To be honest, I hadn't realised how much love there still was for Brass Eve out there. Before I embarked on my screening tour with Oxide Ghosts in 2017 I used to wake in the early hours of the morning with visions of three people in the audience. What actually happened was that fans spread the word, the cinemas were full and, 18 months later, I'm still getting requests to do screenings. The feeling I get from the O&As is that there hasn't been anything like it since, coupled with broadcasters' reticence to take risks. Chris Morris is a one-off, so it's not surprising to me that the series was so unique.

Stewart - would it be fair to say that you've become more preoccupied with your own West Midlands roots in recent times?

SL: Maybe. I suppose you get to 50, look back, and wonder how you got to where you are now. Like that Talking Heads song, Once In A Lifetime.

A PAGE OF MADNESS + LIVE SCORE

Dir: Teinosuke Kinugasa, Japan 1926, 71 mins Opening the festival this year is the world premiere of a newly commissioned live score by Sinestro Home Video, a six-piece ensemble pulled together by composers Matt Eaton (Pram) and Gareth Jones (Misty's Big Adventure, Grandmaster Gareth). You may remember the group closing Flatpack 2016 in some style with their multi-textured score to Murnau's Faust and tonight they're looking to top that extraordinary performance, accompanying a film which is very close to their hearts. Thought lost for nearly five decades and then rediscovered in the 1970s, A Page of Madness is a stunning, surreal exploration of truth, memory and mental illness. Alongside the band vocalist Atsuko Kamura will play the role of live benshi (narrator and storyteller), recounting the tale of a sectioned woman and her husband's doomed attempts to extricate her from the asylum. The film has recently undergone a sumptuous restoration, and with Sinestro Home Video's terrific new accompaniment it should be a festival opener to remember.


FORECASTING

Dance meets theatre, meets YouTube mash-up in this amazing one-woman [and her laptop] show.

Sublimely choreographed, Barbara Matijević becomes one with her laptop as she assumes 90% of the various characters on her screen - the other 10% remains digital - a hand, a foot, or a face. Careening and gliding around the room, Matijević explores the intersection between performer and the two-dimensional world of odd, self-made films that get put online. The result is a dizzying hybrid experience, shifting from funny to banal, to ingenious to poetic, to occasionally gruesome and violent.





SPACE ODYSSEYS

Over the past four years countless young composers and musicians have emerged from the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire to work wonders with film at Flatpack, and we can add a host of names to that ever-expanding list after this interstellar audiovisual adventure. 50 years on from the first person walking on the moon, we thought we'd honour that milestone and task this year's crop of RBC composers with the challenge of writing and performing new scores to four short films exploring the theme of 'space'. Featuring classics by Walerian Borowczyk & Chris Marker and Charles & Ray Eames, there's also contemporary fare including winner of the Flatpack 2018 Short Film Award, Réka Bucsi's mind-blowing *Solar Walk*. Expect all manner of sonic approaches to these otherworldly live scores.

SOUNDSCREEN

In a similar vein to Waveform (see p.47), Birmingham Contemporary Music Group and Royal Birmingham Conservatoire have joined forces to offer NEXT Music, a yearlong training programme for emerging performers of contemporary music. This event sees the NEXT cohort combining live performance with moving image - the films ranging from the surrealist Franco-Spanish 1929 film *Un Chien Andalou* to Nicole Lizée's spellbinding Alfred Hitchcock mashup. The evening will also feature the world premiere of a brand-new piece of music and video specially created for this performance by multi-award winning composer Lara Poe.

Our third and final collaboration in a short run of events with experimental/improvised music series Fizzle is a celebration of female filmmakers and musicians. We've teamed up three of the UK's leading improvisers with a selection of early short films made by pioneering female directors such as Mary Ellen Bute (featured in the image above), Claire Parker and Alice Guy Blaché, largely overlooked in the annals of film history compared to their male counterparts. Featuring Hannah Marshall on cello, Alcyona Mick on piano (some may recall her fantastic score to *Sunrise* at Flatpack 2013) and Stella Roberts (Dorcha) on keyboard, the musicians will create brand new live scores to the films, incorporating elements of jazz, improv, contemporary classical, electronica and much more.



DANIEL COCKBURN: HOW NOT TO WATCH A MOVIE

Two horror films were released in 1994 which riffed on the power of storytelling: John Carpenter's *In The Mouth of Madness* and Wes Craven's *New Nightmare*. 





The obsolescence of the videotape format means that they are an urgent priority for archives, and in some cases these videotapes contain voices that you wouldn't have heard anywhere else. The community video movement which exploded during the 70s and 80s offered an expressive outlet for groups that were often marginalised by mainstream broadcasters.

The Media Archive for Central England (MACE) are cataloguing and digitising a range of videotape collections from across the Midlands and today's event is a chance to see rarely-screened material and hear the inspiring stories behind it. Curators from MACE will also be hosting a Roadshow and will be on hand to give advice on storing, looking after or depositing your own video (and film) collections in the archive. TRADE UNION RESOURCE CENTRE

+ KAMARA PRODUCTIONS

From the early 1980s TURC acted as a production company and print studio for the trade unions, supported by the local council to train budding filmmakers and make campaigning work about employment rights, identity and immigration which still resonates today. Marian Hall, a vital cog in Birmingham's film scene for many years, will talk about her work at TURC and share some highlights. Also joining us will be Sue Brown and Tina Hamilton, who ran Kamara Productions in Handsworth during the 1990s and made a range of work on cultural and political subjects.

ORIENTAL STAR AGENCIES

In 2017 Oriental Star's shop in Balsall Heath closed, marking the end of nearly fifty decades of trading. As well as a record shop OSA acted as a booking agency, bringing some of Asia's biggest stars to the UK including qawwali singer Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan, whose first performance outside Pakistan was at the Luxor in Balsall Heath forty years ago. Artist Faisal Hussain (True Form Projects) has taken on a sizeable portion of the OSA archive, from concert videos to camcorders, and today will be exploring the story it tells us about diasporic culture.



If you came along to last year's festival you may remember an exhibition of Richard Rogers' photographs, an in-depth study which followed young couple Frank and Val Cook from Ladywood back-to-backs to the MAC and on to London. We've since discovered that Frank and Val are now living in France, and we're happy to welcome them back to Birmingham to talk about this pivotal (and extremely well-documented!) moment in their lives. Another treasure which came to light during our 1968 investigations is a reel of ATV footage from a Victoria Square protest held in the wake of Enoch Powell's 'Rivers of Blood' speech. The march organiser was Avtar Singh Jouhl of the Indian Worker's Association, and he will also be joining us to introduce the film. Birmingham 68 is a Flatpack research project supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund, culminating in a book which we will launch in summer 2019.



BURDEN OF DREAMS

The result is a captivating, darkly comic portrait of obsession and a project riddled with obstacles including, and not limited to, loss of the original star, moving a 320 tonne ship over a small mountain without special effects, an indigenous border war and actual deaths. Chosen by Hew Locke to complement his current Ikon exhibition (p.5), and showing on 16mm with Blank's short Werner Herzog Eats His Shoe (1980).



BLACK MOON

GREG MCLEOD


In the constellation of artists that Flatpack has followed over the years, local boy Greg McLeod holds a special place. As half of the animation studio The Brothers McLeod, he's directed and produced with his brother Myles an impressive run of shorts, five of which have screened at the festival over the years.

Their latest, *Marfa*, had its world premiere at Sundance, followed by over thirty selections at festivals around the world – a notable achievement that recently culminated with a BAFTA nomination for Best British Short animation.

A year after receiving our WTF award for this film, Greg is back at Flatpack to designate his successor, having accepted to step through the looking glass and sit on the jury of our short film competition.

But that is not the only thing bringing him here in May. Bermingham: The (not entirely) True Story of a Misspelt City is an ambitious project, both exhibition and animation film, for which he's making a thousand drawings of the city, depicting its iconic buildings and familiar street corners, in a series of mislabelled sketches that play on the viewer's sense of familiarity... This new creation draws on the animator and illustrator's taste for challenge, sense of observation and unique, interpretive perspective, already at work in his short films.

The exhibition is on for the duration of the festival at Centrala. Pop in throughout the week and get lost in the streets of Bermingham, and appreciate the prolific creativity of your guide (see p.11).





Never preachy, always playful, this satirical comedy is a tour de force in which grotesque comes close to sublime.

A wry, wistful reverie of skinny-dipping, camaraderie and rock and roll.

NARCISSISTER ORGAN PLAYER

"Why my body, why erotics, why the mask?"

Against the backdrop of her colourful performances, acclaimed mixed media and performance artist, Narcissister, reflects upon the impact her mother's life, illness and death has had on her work in *Narcissister Organ Player*, an intimate scrapbook of a documentary. Through pointed and provocative set pieces, animation and calming, heartfelt home videos, the masked artist keeps her face under its shroud and yet bares her soul, tangling her identity with that of her mother and producing her most emotionally vulnerable work yet.

Freed by the versatility and anonymity of the mask, Narcissister has been pushing boundaries and avoiding labels for many years. Some may be unfamiliar with her work outside of her viral audition on America's Got Talent and outing with Marilyn Manson in 2011, yet many will recognise this name from within the experimental art scene for her spectacle-rich approach to explorations of gender, racial identity, and sexuality. Referred to by The New York Times as 'avant-porn' her shows are both extremely exhibitionist but also slyly anonymous, using her body as a vessel to perform a reverse strip-tease yet denying the audience the resolution of seeing her face. For the already converted, this film delicately opens a window into the life (and lives) that inspired the art. For newcomers, a gentle and captivating introduction to an already fascinating performer.






LAURA IRVING: LAMBDA DRIVE

Parking up in our hub this year is Laura Irving's new interactive installation Lambda Drive. Strap in to the front seat, don your headphones and immerse yourself in this short sensory road trip. Inspired to recreate the hypnotic experience of listening to patchy American radio on long journeys through the middle of nowhere, Irving has created a space in which your imagination can take the wheel and experience "all the fun and weird characters of a road trip, burning tonnes of fossil fuel." Making the trip up the M5 are various members of Bristol Experimental Expanded Film (BEEF), a vibrant collective with a predilection for 16mm and analogue technologies. Taking over Centrala's upstairs for the entire evening, their back-to-back programme of performance, film and sound will be designed to ignite your retinas and vibrate your tectorial membranes. BEEF's performers will bring with them all manner of beamers and AV contraptions, and among other things you can expect salt evaporating on projectors, sewing machines combined with tap-dancing and an OHP postcard show.

HYPERPLANAR Featuring an inventive new laser system,

Matthijs Munnik's performance piece Hyperplanar is a live audiovisual exploration of three-dimensional volumes sliced into two-dimensional planes of light. Sounds complicated, right? Well it is, and the results are spectacular - the system has several precision controlled lasers that scan around at high speeds creating hologram like shapes. This new tool becomes the starting point for compositions and live

system itself.

Your new work is the result of participation on the Waveform programme that we ran over the last 12 months, can you tell us about your Waveform experience and the impact it had on the work you've made for the festival?

LI: The impact is really easy to describe - the work wouldn't exist without Waveform! Partly because of the practicalities of funding etc, but mostly because I didn't consider the stuff I liked to potter about with as being 'art'. I think I had a notion (or prejudice) of 'artists' being strange and mythical creatures with whom I'd have little in common. Meeting the other Waveformers dispelled this entirely, and being part of a group of such talented, supportive and down to earth people has given me an entirely different perspective and sense of belonging.

Tell us about the work itself and what audiences can expect to experience?

LI: Lambda Drive is an AV installation - a solo, headphone experience staged in a car-like space. Using a mish-mash of found reel-to-reel tape diaries, mid-century home video and shortwave radio recordings, it hopes to take the imagination on an overnight road trip. Expect highway hypnosis and hallucinogenic head cinema.

WAVEFORM

JERWOOD ARTS

Can you tell us where the sound recordings came

LI: It's a bit of a pick 'n' mix! Some of the audio is stuff that I've found from home-recorded cassettes in charity shops (seeking this stuff is a kind of weird hobby of mine). You'll also hear parts of a conversation that I had with a guy who I found on my doorstep one day after work, got chatting to, and who asked me to record the story of his life (I've no idea where he came from, why he was there, and I've never seen him since). A lot of the radio and car ambience you hear I recorded whilst driving around Colorado a few years ago. Most of the narrations are from reel-to-reel audio letters or short wave radio recordings that other audio nerds like myself have recovered from attics or garage sales, and informally archived on enthusiast sites like WFMU's now defunct 'Beware of the Blog' or the Shortwave Radio Archive. There's usually little known about who the speakers are, but for me there's something fascinating about having a small window into these lives and voices from another time.



KINOMANUAL

kinoMANUAL are Polish duo Maciek Baczyk and Aga Jarząb, makers of nifty, intricate animations, deliverers of hands-on celluloid workshops and audiovisual performers. Tonight they will be creating live visuals from their own work alongside regular collaborators Pin Park, another duo made up of Baczyk and fellow keyboard obsessive Maciek Polak who use EMS synthesisers to make a lovely, motorik sound heavily influenced by 70s German electronica. Please note that KinoMANUAL are performing as part of Dorcha's Takeover (see p.49),



The audience goes on something of a sensory roadtrip. Was this born out of having spent many hours on the road yourself?

LI: Yes! I love that description! I've been fortunate to have taken a few really long solo road trips in the States, and that's certainly what sowed the seed of this piece.

The US still has a really strong culture of analogue and amateur radio, and when you get out into remote areas, you also reach a kind of radio hinterland, where the signals become erratic - and weird snippets of voices and conversations start to collage together in the ether. It seems fitting too, because after a few days of driving by yourself, the subconscious starts to do something similar, throwing up all kinds of memories and fragments because there's not much else to do but reflect.

I wanted to try and recreate that sense in this piece, by making an intimate, hypnotic environment where there's enough happening to keep you somewhat engaged, but enough space for your imagination to take the wheel and lead you somewhere else. So, all the fun and weird characters of a road trip, without the need for creepy rest-stops and burning tonnes of fossil fuel.





Your background is primarily sound and radio, so how challenging was it to create a piece which combined visuals with sound?

LI: Yeah - I'm usually trying to create images with sound - so it's odd to have real pictures to work with!

I'm a complete noobie to working with film and image, so that's not an insignificant challenge to creating an AV piece. It's not that the images in this piece are unimportant, but they are designed to be in service to the sound; in fact many of the abstract images are Cymatics - patterns created when you set a liquid on top a speaker and play a bunch of different frequency sounds.

But, there's also a really nice ignorance-is-bliss feeling to not knowing an approach, or what the tools really do - there's space to be playful in a way that is perhaps more challenging when you know a field well. So it's been fun experimenting and trying things out.

The piece uses a kind of pepper's ghost effect - was that difficult to achieve? Was this something you'd seen used elsewhere and took inspiration from?

LI: When I first started thinking about this piece, I was reading a lot about VR and immersive digital experiences. At first the creative potential of the technology seemed really exciting - but when my husband wanted to spend the majority of our rent money on a VR console, I started to question why we'd need to invest in a plastic box to immerse us in someone else's version of another world, when given the right situation and stimulus, we do this for free using our mind's eye.

So, I started hunting around for ways that an immersive and interactive experience might be achieved using relatively basic kit and people's imaginations. That's when I stumbled on a Wired article about how digital tech companies were using variants of Pepper's Ghost to recreate 'holograms' of dead celebrities. It's essentially a Victorian VFX technique that is incredibly simple to achieve - but I'm not going to tell you how it works, because I love seeing people walking round the installation after they've experienced it, trying to figure it out!




