CONDITIONS OF ENTRY - A Level

A very positive attitude to learning is essential. English and Maths GCSE – minimum grade 4 but preferably grade 5 and above, plus at least 3 other GCSE's at grade 5 or above. Please note that individual subjects will have specific entry requirements, so it is crucial that our subject details are read carefully please.

BTEC Level 2

A very positive attitude to learning is essential; especially during year 11.

ADMISSIONS POLICY

First priority will go to students who are currently on roll at Friesland School and can satisfy the conditions of entry for a particular course. However over 20% of Year 12 students will be external candidates. These students will be accepted on the basis of interview, using the following criteria for selection:

- 1. Young people who meet the necessary criteria who live within the normal catchment area of Friesland School.
- 2. Ability to cope with the courses applied for.
- 3. Availability of space on courses applied for.

Friesland School operates a policy of equal opportunity by which we do not discriminate on the grounds of sex, race, religion, physical disability or sexuality. The Sixth Form has disabled facilities.

'My name is Rachel, I studied at Friesland all the way from year 7 to year 13 and I am now studying Engineering at Jesus College, Cambridge.

Cambridge first crossed my mind in year 11 when I was encouraged by my

teachers to apply for a summer school. The residential was set up by the university to try and inspire children from state schools and low income areas to apply. I spent 3 days living in Cambridge and attending classes with other people from similar backgrounds and I loved it.

They made it clear on this summer school that the most important thing for a potential applicant is to demonstrate their passion for their subject and their teachability, these were more important than the straight A* record you would expect. So in preparation for my application, I read around my subject and did work experience rather than focusing solely on my grades. Everyone who applies has a strong academic record, you need other subject specific activities that aren't just GCSEs and A levels.



The interviews feel more like a conversation than an interrogation. I was given a sheet of problems and was asked to work through them out loud. Whenever I got stuck I could ask for help, and the interviewers would step in if they could see that I was going down the wrong path. I showed I was interested when they explained where I went wrong and I asked them questions about how they would have approached it.

Since I had my A levels lowered by the COVID grade assigning algorithm, I narrowly missed my offer, coming out with A*AAA when I needed A*A*AA, but the college emailed me to say they would like to confirm my place regardless. This is testament to the fact that you don't need straight A*s to go to a top university, if you demonstrate your diligence and love for your subject, this matters much more'. Rachel Gould

'I was first attracted to think about applying to Cambridge when I went on a residential trip run by Murray Edwards and I really liked the campus/ vibe and the talks given.

When I started to prepare for applying

to Cambridge, I read a few of the books suggested for incoming students, I did past papers for my admissions assessment and listened to the news a lot more to increase my awareness of current affairs.

When I finally went for my interview at Cambridge, it was a lot more relaxed than I expected, the waiting room was full of students who were really friendly and it calmed my nerves. I had an hour assessment beforehand with some questions and I had to talk about them in the interview. In the other interview I was just given maths questions and asked to attempt them (thinking out loud). It was all about my subject and was quite an enjoyable experience.

So for the next few years I will be studying Economics at Fitzwilliam College'.

'Hi, I'm Charlie and I'm studying Mathematics, Girton College, Cambridge.

The idea of applying to Cambridge had been there since a trip to Oxford in year 11, then in year 12, I visited both

of them and decided on the place, more intense style (short terms of hard work), and the prestige appealed to me. I have no clear career plans so thought it'd be the best thing to do.

To prepare for applying to Cambridge I knew I'd have to sit STEP exams, so I did questions from STEP and other similar papers such as the MAT on the side throughout year 13 by finding questions/papers online and also sat the TMUA in October. This preparation was very useful for the interview.

The interview process at Cambridge, in my case, was very comfortable and I actually enjoyed the interviews once they started, since the interviewers only asked questions which were Maths problems to solve bar, one personal question about rock climbing!

Can I change my mind regarding my subjects once I've started lessons?

Yes, we understand that making choices can be complex and we will give you the time and space, within our timetable, to make the right choice for you.

At what point do I have to make a final decision about what I want to study?

This is a process which begins with your application, followed by an interview.

Then a timetable is created based on the choices selected and finally ends with five option blocks being constructed to meet the wishes of most students.

Would it be worth studying 4 subjects at the beginning, perhaps with the intention of dropping one?

A minority of students study four subjects for two years but most students will study three subjects plus perhaps the Extended Project Qualification in Year 13. We do allow students with suitable grades to start with four subjects and reduce to three if this works best for them.

Do I have to accept my place straight away in order to secure a place?

Our advice is to accept places from further education establishments that you think

might be right for you and then make your final decision when you receive your results in August.

When would the option blocks be finalised?

We usually aim to publish our option blocks in May.

Do I have to stay in the 6th form during the day if I don't have any lessons?

We will treat you as young adults so you are free to leave the site if you don't have lessons.

Could I request to be in a form with a friend?

Yes you can.

How many lessons do you have per subject per week?

As a rule you would have four hours per subject in year 12 and five hours per subject in year 13. We expect you to match those hours with independent study across each week to enhance your learning.

What size are classes in the Sixth Form?

This varies but an average class size would be around 12.

I'm not sure what subjects I need to study for the profession I would like to do – can I get some further advice?

Absolutely. Our Director of Sixth Form and Careers Adviser are available for advice.

Do I have to wear a uniform?

No. You can where what you want as long as it doesn't 'offend' anyone else!

What grades do I need to be accepted to Friesland Sixth Form?

Please look carefully at our prospectus and subject details for the answers. The simple answer is that for most level 3 courses you want to achieve 5's and above.

Can I do private study at Sixth Form when not in lessons?

Yes we have dedicated quiet areas with computer access.

How different from school is Sixth Form?

You will be treated as a young adult and be in an environment where everyone wants to be there. We encourage students to work hard and enjoy themselves.

Can I receive financial support to assist me with my studies?

Possibly. There is a national bursary scheme which we will provide all the details for.

What do students do after leaving Friesland Sixth Form ?


There is a very wide ranging answer to that question but most go on to do whatever they choose to do because their grades are strong enough to put them in a position of choice. For example, all three students who applied for Cambridge last year are currently studying Engineering, Maths and Economics at Cambridge.
