Your Great Parks: The Tiniest Friends!

Great Parks manages 21 parks and nature preserves, spanning 17,000+ acres across Hamilton County. With that information, imagine how many



different species of plants and animals call it home. The critter that I want to spotlight is none other than the Cricket Frog!

If you haven't heard of them before now, cricket frogs are some of the smallest frogs that we have in Ohio. On average, cricket frogs are 5/8 to 1-3/8 inches in length. These itty-bitty frogs can be identified by their moist, warty skin, the dark triangular shape between their eyes, and a Y-shaped figure on their back. The coloration of the Y-shape may be bright green (seen pictured above) or different shades of brown or gray. Because the cricket frog's surroundings influence its color and pattern, there is often a bit of variation. It tends to be lighter in color in bright lights and high temperatures.

Other frogs, like the American Bullfrog, Northern Green Frog, and Gray Treefrog, are found throughout almost all of Ohio. The cricket frog tends to be more restricted to the western two-thirds of the state. These frogs prefer sparsely vegetated edges of permanent bodies of water, like ponds and wetlands, with high exposure to sunlight. Feeding primarily on insects, these habitats are essential to cricket frogs since their prey is attracted to the standing water. The females will lay roughly 200-400 eggs in small clusters and attach them to the stems of the aquatic plant life in the ponds and wetlands they call their home.

Cricket frogs become more active in the early spring but do not begin their singing until late spring to early summer. Over the past couple weeks, you may have heard their songs in our parks like Glenwood Gardens, Miami Whitewater Forest and Winton Woods, to name a few. The cricket frog's call consists of a series of sharp clicking notes almost like the sound of two marbles quickly being tapped together. The size of the frog and the sound of their call are where they get the name cricket frog.

These frogs may not be as big and popular as some of the others, but they are just as important to the ecosystem as any other animal you'd find in the Great Parks. So, the next chance you get - whether it be while completing your daily tasks, going for a walk or simply sitting by an open window - keep an eye and ear out for these amazing little frogs and their singing.

Congratulations to Joe and Taylor on the birth of their beautiful son!






Shout Outs
