

Madam Secretary-General Campaign United Nations

2026

In 2026, the United Nations has another opportunity to break barriers and elect its first-ever female Secretary-General. With a potential regional rotation favoring Latin America, several highly qualified women leaders from the region could step into this role.

Momentum is Building

Growing Support:

Eleven countries explicitly called for a female Secretary-General during UNGA79,

including Brazil, Canada, Chile, Ecuador, Germany, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Liechtenstein, Namibia, Norway, Slovenia, and Spain.

A Strong Joint Statement:

Following UNGA79, Slovenia, Mexico, and Spain—joined by 78 other Member States—delivered a statement urging greater representation of women in UN leadership.

Ambassador Samuel Žbogar of Slovenia emphasized the need for Member States to nominate and back female candidates in 2026.



Key Considerations from GWL Voices:

1 Who Decides?

The Secretary-General is elected by the UN Security Council—not by a referendum or popular vote. The influence of key Member States is critical.

From Local to Global:

Mobilizing national governments to support and nominate distinguished female candidates will be crucial in this election.

Visibility Matters:

While the 2016 election saw significant media and social media campaigns, they did not translate into success for any of the seven female candidates. **Strategic advocacy must go beyond awareness.**

United Call to Action:

GWL Voices emphasizes the need for a **clear and unified message**—urging Member States to support a woman for the UN's top leadership position.
