





ASSEMBLY INSTRUCTIONS



STEP 1

Remove lid, handle, and screws from packaging.

STEP 2

Gather a flathead screwdriver, and ideally have some sort of slot to hold the lid in place during assembly (between your legs works great).

STEP 3

Using your fingers, begin threading the screws through the lid holes into the handle. (Lid tabs should be on bottom, handle on top).

STEP 4

Using the flathead screwdriver, tighten the screws in place to firmly attach the handle to the lid.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE



STEP 1

Place the lid on your fire pit when the fire has burned down to ash only, or the fire is out completely.

STEP 2

Never use your lid as a snuffer. Doing so can cause creosote buildup and dripping, as well as lid damage.

STEP 3

The lid is designed to make the fire pit a perfect patio table when the fire pit is not in use.

STEP 4

Using your lid to regularly cover your fire pit will prevent premature aging and damage to the metal.



Always wait until the fire has burned down to ash only, with no wood or large coals left in the fire pit. Putting the lid on your fire pit can damage the lid with the heat causing discoloration and warping, as well as causing creosote drips to form on your fire pit and the surface it is placed on. Creosote cools to a hard, tar-like substance that is very difficult to clean off of any surface, and can cause corrosion and discoloration.

Your lid is manufactured of heavy-duty, high-quality stainless steel, so care should be taken while handling it to ensure that it is not dropped or scraped against any body parts.

Lid edges may be sharp, so care should be taken at all times to ensure that it is handled in a safe manner by individual strong enough to keep it from damaging anyone or anything else in your backyard.

HOW TO BUILD A BETTER FIRE

STEP 1

Prepare your fuel. Paper, cardboard, pine needles, and dryer lint all make great starter materials. You'll also want a good supply of dry kindling and split hardwood.

STEP 2

Build a base of starter material in the center of your fire pit. Add a layer of kindling and a match. No need for lighter fluid. Just like your grandad did it.

STEP 3

Take things one log at a time. After the fire takes, slowly feed it more kindling. Once you've got that good and going, it's time for your split hardwood.

STEP 4

Don't add logs haphazardly. Building tipi, lean-to, or log-cabin style means better airflow for your fire. Remember, the blaze needs to breathe.

STEP 5

As your fire burns, keep it evenly spread throughout the fire pit.



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
