

THE SOCIETY AS PUBLISHER

We are very pleased to announce that the Society is publishing two very significant works of local history this autumn.

The Diaries of Cornelius Ashworth, written between 1782 and 1816 detail the day to day life of a weaver-farmer and provide a unique insight into local life at the turn of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. After an advantageous marriage Cornelius Ashworth farmed at Walt Royd, Ovenden supplementing his income by building, hop-selling and weaving. His surviving diaries have been fully transcribed over the last three years by one of the groups on the research course run by the Society entitled 'Agriculture and History in the Pennine Landscape'. A series of essays accompany the transcription and explore his farming methods, religious life and various trades. The book will be published in November and those subscribing to the book by completing the enclosed leaflet can obtain the volume for the special price of £16 instead of the cover price of £19.



Another course that ran in the late 1960s and early 1970s in Hebden Bridge resulted in the most comprehensive history of the Upper Calder Valley that has ever been published. *Pennine Valley: a History of Upper Calderdale* was edited by Professor Bernard Jennings, and is based on the research work of the Hebden Bridge WEA Local History Group. Published in 1992 and reprinted in 1994 with corrections, this work remains the best local history of the area but has been out of print and very difficult to obtain for many years. The surviving authors and previous publishers have very kindly given the Society permission to reprint the 1994

version of this book with some additional corrections and work on improving the quality of the illustrations. The book will be available in September at a cost of $\pounds14.99$.

Both publications will be on sale at meetings of the Society during this season's lecture series. Enquiries about both publications should be addressed to the Treasurer, Bramble Dene, Moss Lane, Hebden Bridge, HX7 7DS.

It is expected that further publications resulting from the Agriculture and History course will become available during the next twelve months.

THE BATTLE OF BRUNANBURH


The evidence that this battle, which took place in 937AD between King Athelstan and a combined army of Vikings, was fought in and around Burnley in East Lancashire.


Janet Niepokojczycka is a former infant teacher. She is currently a seasonal blue badge guide in Lake District and Scotland.



Jowett Cars A brief history

This evening's topic concerns Jowett Cars: Yorkshire's very own motor manufacturer whose centenary of production was celebrated last year. The talk is *not* purely technical. It involves the evolution of the family firm and its post-war demise. Characters, connivance and true Yorkshire obstinacy all play their parts and go some way towards explaining why these cars are remembered today, with affection or otherwise!

John Atack spent 37 years with Rolls-Royce in various parts of the globe. Some say they are still looking for him. He bought his first Jowett in Hebden Bridge in 1963 and has been the custodian of several others in the meantime. He is the Vice Chairman of the Northern Section of the Jowett Car Club – the oldest one-make car club in the world.

David has always been interested in


history. Although he is a Londoner by birth, he has lived in Halifax for 25


THE STORY OF CASTLE CARR

J.M. CARPENTER AND THE PACE-EGGERS, AN AMERICAN FOLK COLLECTOR IN YORKSHIRE



Carpenter was an American academic who came to Britain in 1928 to collect folk performance material. He assembled the largest collection of such material which had been collected up to that time. He travelled 40,000 miles in search of ballads, songs, plays and customs.

Dr Eddie Cass will talk about what Carpenter collected in Yorkshire and will illustrate his talk with some of his cylinder recordings.

Eddie Cass has been working on the Carpenter collection with his colleagues for ten years. He is currently a

Research Fellow at the Elphinstone Institute, the University of Aberdeen where he is editing the 300 play texts for publication by the University of Mississippi Press. They will be the first volumes in a series which will encompass the whole Carpenter collection.

FAMILY HISTORY GROUP REPORT

We have had several enquiries recently and some new visitors to the group, all of which have resulted in new members to the society. We now have access to the Find My Past web site for members use and this includes the 1911 Census.

The Local History web site has been updated and we have a selection of local photographs dating from the 1890s to the 1960s in the Family History section. Some of these are from the archives and some are personal photographs. Initially these will be of groups of people from in

and around Hebden Bridge and from a variety of past times. We hope that they will be of interest to people with local connections and hope that, in some cases, you may be able to help with identification.

The London Gazette claims to be the oldest continuously published newspaper in the UK, tracing its beginnings back to 1665. It is one of the official journals of records of the British government, in which certain statutory notices are required to be published. The fact that it is used to publish these notices makes it an important source for the family historian, especially as its archive is available online. Information is grouped into almost 20 categories, a few of which include notices about individuals. Using these categories and textual search facilities you can drill down to individual pages of the gazette which are presented in PDF format on the screen. Many of our ancestors were involved in business in one form or another and unfortunately, some of these would get into trouble leading to bankruptcy for the proprietor. Notices of bankruptcy proceedings were required to be published in the London Gazette and can be accessed by choosing the category "Personal Insolvency" then proceeding to "Bankruptcy Orders". At this point, you are able to enter parameters for searching the text - typically a name. The results are presented as a list with sufficient detail for you to determine relevance. Choosing from the list presents a page from the Gazette. The details in the notice include dates and places of hearings and addresses of the bankrupt and of his/her business. If you choose to, you can step forwards and backwards from one page to another.



Book Launch of Mr Andoh's Pennine Diary

Imagine what a Japanese man would make of working and living in Hebden Bridge in 1935!

Koichi Andoh travelled from Japan in 1935 to teach the technique of distinguishing the sex of one-day-old chicks to Hebden Bridge hatchery businesses. He kept a daily diary of his life here - which his son Takayoshi

Andoh discovered in the late 1990s. In 2001 Takayoshi made the journey to Hebden Bridge and a collaboration began between him and Stephen to translate Koichi's experiences. The book brings to life the thoughts and observation of a sometimes homesick man from a very different culture from that of the 1930's Calder Valley.

When Stephen Curry met Takayoshi in 2001 he knew that here was an important story relating to a part of local history that needed to be recorded. For more information visit <u>http://andohsdiary.weebly.com/</u>


NICK WILDING

JOHN BRIGHT - ALIVE & KICKING

followed by a screening of Nick Wilding's film John Bright and the Angel of Death

The Literary & Scientific Society is planning a unique event, a PowerPoint presentation debate with Nick Wilding filmmaker, John Cole historian and Rae Street, Quaker and historical researcher. This is followed by Nick's 40 minute newly up-dated and extremely powerful film 'John Bright and the Angel of Death'.

16h November 2011 is the Bicentenary of the birth of John Bright in Rochdale. Events are being held throughout Britain to mark this important anniversary.



Today, Bright is largely forgotten, but he made a considerable impact in the 19th Century, not only through his seven year campaign with Richard Cobden to reform of the Corn Laws, but also as an opponent of war and slavery. Because of his ten year campaign to extend democracy to more working people, he was given the soubriquet 'the tribune of the people'. However, John Cole will argue that there is another side to John Bright and will question his motives on every issue. To illustrate points, Nick will demonstrate the power of his oratory, with extracts from his speeches and diaries, powerfully portrayed by actor John Stride. There are contributions in the film from Bill Cash, Lord Soper, Sir Bernard Ingham, Sir Cyril Smith, Tam Dalyell and Tony Benn.

What emerges is a highly principled character, who has commanded great respect in his time and since, but who still evokes some strong feelings of passionate hatred in his own hometown.'

This course will teach the skill of reading old handwriting based on practical work in transcribing original wills and inventories held in the Borthwick Institute in York. These have been photographed as part of the three year South Pennines Probate Project funded by LEADER. Suitable for both beginners and those with some experience, documents from different chronological periods can be tackled depending on experience. The art of indexing the documents will also be explained.

Once transcribed and indexed the documents will help us find out more about aspects of local life in the past such as:

- Local families, familial relationships and inheritance patterns
- The local way of life including farming practices and textile working
- The structure and use of houses and farms
