







### What comes next?



## Car gamesi

Nothing helps a long trip go by more than a couple of fun car games.

### I SPY

- Pick an object in the car and say "I spy with my little eye something that is...",
- Use one word to describe the object. You could say "I spy with my little eye something that is...red" or "bumpy" or "stinky".
- Have everyone take turns guessing what the object might be.
- If no one can guess after a while, add another word to describe your object. "I spy with my little eye something that is red and round".
- Whoever guesses right gets to lead the next round.

### road alphabet

- Use outdoor signs, license plates and objects to spot all the letters of the alphabet.
- Start with "A", as soon as you find something that starts with "A", shout it out! Then try something that starts with "B". See if you can get all the way to "Z".
- If you spot the letter "Q" at any time, shout it out. It is the only letter that doesn't need to be found in order.
- If you love this game and you don't want it to end, try to do numbers 0 to 10 in order.

### BUZZ

See how quickly you can master this numbers game.


You play this game by taking turns counting. The first person says 1, the next person says 2 and so on. The game gets harder when you get to the number 7. Whoever is supposed to say 7, should say BUZZ instead. When you're counting it will sound like "1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, BUZZ, 8, 9...". You also say BUZZ every time there is a 7 in the number, so instead of saying 17, 27 or 37, you say BUZZ. Try to count to 100 without making any mistakes!

You can keep playing this game with any number as the BUZZ number. If you want to make this game harder, say BUZZ for multiples (Multiples are numbers that result in multiplying. For example, the multiples of 7 are 7, 14, 28, 35, 42...).

### 20 QUESTIONS


- Think of a person, animal or thing.

- Here are some examples of questions they can ask: Is it a person? Is it real or imaginary? Have I seen one before? Is it on TV?



- A noun is a person, place or thing. Dog, house, Mom, mud and shoes are all nouns.
- An adjective is a description. Blue, slimy, big, tiny and loud are all adjectives.
- An adverb is a word that describes an action (hint: it usually ends in "ly"). Quickly, slowly, sadly, sleepily and gladly are all adverbs.
- A verb is an action word. Jump, crawl, hop, swing and ski are all verbs.
- An exclamation is something you say when you are excited. Yippee, cowabunga, radical and woohoooo are all exclamations.
