It was a tremendous project and we look forward to more partnership work with the NWT Literacy Council and Ilitaqsiniq - Nunavut Literacy Council.

CAFN's application for their multi-year project was successful. We are partners and are working closely with Yukon College and the Dan Ts'ananan project team to reach the project goals of creating learning and employment opportunities for CAFN citizens who are struggling with employment. We are grateful for this opportunity to work on such an important project that will positively change people's lives.

Many thanks to the Yukon Government and the City of Whitehorse for their continued support of the Family Literacy Centre (FLC). We continue our interesting and eclectic programming at the centre and again hosted many special events in partnership with the Canada Games Centre. Our outreach program continues to be very successful. Yukon Imagination Library is still flourishing: Yukon families are fully engaged and love the program.

2017-2018 Highlights

Northern Alliance for Literacy and Essential Skills (NALES)

The Yukon Literacy Coalition partnered with the NWT Literacy Council and Ilitaqsiniq - the Nunavut Literacy Council on a collaborative agreement with the Northern Alliance on Literacy & Essential Skills (NALES) to complete various projects. The project began in December 2014 and ended in June 2018.

The goal of this project was to strengthen literacy and essential skills (LES) development and to improve market outcomes across the north. The team reached out to Aboriginal youth and adults, both men and women, who were out-of-school or unemployed with low levels of literacy and essential skills. Through this project, Aboriginal youth and adults had an opportunity to develop more transferable skills, become more employable, increase their access to the labour market, and experience more success within the northern economy. As part of this project YLC undertook two initiatives:

- I. Tagish Kwan Photo Parlour: The Yukon Literacy Coalition, in partnership with Carcross Tagish Management Corporation (CTMC) and with generous support of the Yukon Government developed a social enterprise initiative as a means to both train and employ underemployed Carcross Tagish First Nation citizens and provide social benefits to Carcross.
- 2. Na-Cho Nyak Dun Burger Shack: The Yukon Literacy Coalition, in partnership with Nacho Nyak Dun First Nation, designed and implemented a 3-month summer training program providing hands on, workplace-based training, providing the participants (the summer staff of the First Nation owned and operated Burger Shack) with transferable skills and knowledge in the service/hospitality sector.



During the last phase of this project, the Yukon Literacy Coalition, in collaboration with the NWT Literacy Council and Ilitaqsiniq - the Nunavut Literacy Council developed "A Northern Approach: A Guide to Embedded Literacy and Essential Skills". This resource guide explains what a northern approach to embedded LES programming entails and it confirms effective practices and lessons learned for embedded LES programs in a northern context. It will be available fall of 2018.

Changing Systems - Women, Learning, and Violence

We are pleased to report that the Changing Systems - Women, Learning, and Violence project is complete. This research project was designed to support Indigenous women in Whitehorse and the surrounding areas who are "at risk of experiencing violence," to explore how their familiarity with violence impacts their involvement in education, and their vulnerability to further violence. This project was very moving and informative. We thank all of the people who worked with us, the people who gave their time in interviews and focus groups, and the funders who generously supported us. We intend to continue researching and supporting this important work.

Dan Ts'ananan - Our People Working Together Program

We are working as partners with Champagne Aishihik First Nations and Yukon College on a 40-month project -Dan Ts'ananan. Our work includes designing and facilitating community-wide workshops, working closely with Job Coaches and the Cultural Support team to assist in LES skill development and assisting the project team in a number of other ways. We are very excited about this opportunity.

Family Literacy Day: Jan 29, 2018

Family Literacy Day this year was held at Shipyards Park with an outdoor, physical literacy component. We had live entertainment, a fire dancer, dog musher, outdoor weenie roast and hot cocoa at the fire pits, down-hill sledding, snow shoeing, skating, and kick sleds. We offered a story time, craft and warm up in our cozy Pioneer Hotel, along with free food and refreshments with an obstacle course and live music in the Frank Slim building. We had a great turn out with families from Whitehorse and Yukon communities.

Our community partners this year were the Child Development Centre, Whitehorse Library, Association Franco-Yukonnaise, Imagination Yukon Library, the City of Whitehorse and Alayak Dog Mushing.

The Family Literacy Centre

The Family Literacy Centre (FLC) continues to provide rich and diverse literacy-based programming to children and families both in Whitehorse and across the Yukon Territory. Regular summer programs continue from the Pioneer Hotel in Shipyards Park, while Fall, Winter, and Spring programs run from the Family Literacy Center at the Canada Games Centre. FLC Outreach this year has included trips to culture camps, events, and festivals throughout the Yukon.

All FLC programs have been very popular, with increased attendance in most cases. Patrons of varied ages and abilities engage in programming and enjoy the centres' facilities. Example programs include "123 Rhyme With Me:" a singing and movement program that encourages learning and play through music, and "Little Chefs:" a preschool program that blends stories, various foods, and cooking skills. "Free-Play Drop-In" remains popular and continues to provide opportunities for a broader audience to visit the FLC. A multitude of users enjoy Drop-In. Community user groups with family literacy-based mandates continue to book the FLC for private use.

Carrie-Anne McPhee joined the FLC team December 2017, replacing Lisa Moore. Carrie-Anne is a long-time educator and literacy advocate and says she greatly enjoys her work with YLC. As in previous years, YLC has employed a Summer Training and Employment Program (STEP) student for both the 2017 and 2018 summer sessions. These students engage in a range of jobs and continue to be an asset to FLC summer programming.

The Free Book Store at the Pioneer Hotel has increased in popularity and has provided hundreds – if not thousands – of books to both citizens of Yukon and travellers from around the world. FLC staff members continue to use the Book Bike to distribute free books throughout the streets of Whitehorse, during the summer Arts in the Park festival, and for special events.

Pioneer Hotel

The Pioneer Hotel continues to be a beloved spot for our regular and new or visiting families during the summer. The outdoor surroundings lend to offering exciting physical literacy programming. We continue to be open late on Thursdays for the Fireweed Market which is a great success in attracting new demographics to our space. The extensive Free Book Store is visited frequently by all ages. We have many community partners that use our space in collaboration and as individual users.

With the nice weather the book bike frequently makes the community rounds and attends the Kids Day at Arts in the Park every Wednesday.



Community Outreach

We continue to increase community partnerships across the Yukon. In the fall and winter months we partner on a weekly basis with the House of Learning at Kwanlin Dun First Nation to offer after-school literacy programming. We brought family literacy programming to the Carcross Tagish First Nation Daycare and the CTFN Healthy Moms Healthy Babies group in Carcross. We attended luncheons at the Duska Head Start daycare at Kwanlin Dun First Nations. We continue to partner year round on a monthly basis with the Whitehorse Healthy Moms Healthy Babies group. We also brought programming to some of the local Whitehorse schools literacy nights such as Elijah Smith and Takhini Elementary.

In the summer months we bring family literacy programming to Fireweed Market Night, Arts in the Park, Adaka Festival, Kluane First Nation Harvest Camp, Teslin Tlingit First Nation Ha Kus Teyea, Teslin Tlingit Brooks Brook Culture Camp, Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in Moosehide Gathering, Champagne Aishihik First Nations Annual General Assembly, Ta'an Kwäch'än Council Annual General

Assembly, Chickadees Preschool and Macaulay Lodge Intergenerational Programming. We also host many of the day camps and daycares at the Pioneer Hotel throughout the summer.

Financial Literacy

We continue to use our Northern adapted learning modules for our Financial Literacy workshops, meeting the learners where they are at and tailoring each workshop to be relevant and meaningful to participants. In August 2017 YLC conducted a Financial Literacy workshop to Challenge Employment in Whitehorse. In September 2017 a one-day Financial Literacy workshop was delivered to CAFN Takhini River Subdivision citizens. In November 2017 an evening Financial Literacy workshop to moms and their children was given in Haines Junction with CAFN. In May 2018 a two-day Financial Literacy workshop was delivered to LSCFN citizens in Carmacks. We have many upcoming Financial Literacy workshops planned for the fall and winter. We continue to receive requests from across the Yukon for our workshops.

The YLC continues to be one of the cross-Canada networks for the Financial Consumer Agency Canada. Prosper Canada invited us to be a part of their Tax Time Study in 2017. YLC conducted research with participants across the Yukon and NWT. This information later helped inform Canada's Federal Government policy in offering free tax filing via telephone for low income Canadians.

YLC attended the Financial Consumer Agency of Canada's conference on Financial Literacy in Montreal in November 2017. We were then asked to be guest speakers at the ABLE Financial Empowerment Conference in Vancouver in May 2018 to speak to our work offering Financial Literacy to rural, remote and First Nation communities across Yukon.

The Yukon Imagination Library

The Yukon Imagination Library (YIL) continues to provide quality literature to children across the Territory, and membership increases steadily both for long-time residents and newcomers to Yukon. Many titles have been added recently, including board books for infants and toddlers, books with Northern-specific content, and books authored by Canadians. Currently, one of the newest and most popular titles is written by Canadian Astronaut Chris Hadfield.

YLC staff continue to manage local YIL accounts and assist families that require help to engage in the program. As a result, families that face challenges or technological barriers are more likely to both sign-up for, and retain membership. The positive feedback we receive for this service is consistent and high.

In light of recent global concerns regarding private data, the Imagination Library has initiated tougher security and privacy settings. There have been no reported breaches of privacy or internal reasons for concern.

The Family Literacy Centre's own Imagination Library collection continues to grow as titles are added to the service. YIL stories are utilised in programs and story times, and frequently serve as inspiration for activities. As YIL books are often included in donations, YLC is able to provide them to daycares and other relevant organizations across Yukon, and to offer them to the general public via our Free Book Store.


